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
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

Although the rates have not changed for many years, the inflationary costs experienced by the Charity, particularly energy costs, necessitated a review of rates. Other local hall hire rates are also higher, so the decision was taken to amend hourly hire rates as follows:

Winthorpe Garden Club

Our speaker in May was Steffie Shields, whose talk was entitled: Have Garden, Will Travel. As a child, Steffie lived near Wimbledon Common; she thought of this as the countryside. Aged 8, she was thrilled by the sight of tall, multi flowered pink plants and would dream of being able to photograph the inside of the flowers. Her only problem was having no camera, although her older sister did. It transpired that the plant was rosebay willow herb. Subsequent sightings led to the family referring to it jokingly as RBWH.

We were told that she had twenty-two homes in thirty-two years, as her husband was in the RAF and regular postings were the norm. She admitted that, when first married, her knowledge of plants was limited, but soon discovered which were good 'doers'. A something for nothing ploy was to take three shoots of a plant and stick them in the earth, no preparation or hormone dipping. More often than not these succeeded.

Plants that did well were taken on next home relocation. Amongst favourite plants mentioned were primula Wanda, pink rose Perpetual and the symbolic Peace.

A passion for the work of Capability Brown was sparked on a visit to Alnwick Castle when she found there was no record of his work there. Thus began a mission to research and record his gardens around the country. Twenty eight years later this culminated in her book 'Moving Heaven and Earth'.

As a footnote, now retired, she and her husband found in their garden an apple tree whose small red fruits were subsequently identified as 'Winston' which both thought appropriate. Coming full circle what else should be there but a clump of RBWH?

An expert's view of climate change by Professor Rob Wilby

The Book Club met in the Lord Nelson to discuss their latest read: *Anxious People* by Fredrik Backman. The concensus of opinion was that this book, though well written, lost something in translation and, at times, the story was all over the place. Those who stuck with it were pleased that they had read it. At the next meeting on Thursday, 8th June, we will be reviewing *The Reading List* by Sara Nisha Adams. The book club is open to all WI members.

We opened our monthly meeting on 12th May by toasting His Majesty King Charles III on the occasion of his Coronation, as well as singing the National Anthem, and those who knew two verses sang two verses. Along with the fizz, three Coronation themed cakes, baked by members, were enjoyed before the serious business of the evening was conducted. A card to congratulate His Majesty has been sent on our behalf.

Four birthdays were celebrated. The topic of the evening was to discuss and and vote on the WI's chosen resolution for this year: a bit long winded, but basically to support water quality and designated bathing areas in rivers. A member who had attended a meeting regarding this gave us a brief resumé of what it entailed and comments of other attendees: good ideas had been put forward, without money to back them up. People who had committed to look after designated areas had failed to follow up on their commitment.

As a group we felt that there was a need to clean up the water quality in our rivers, but that this was not a good resolution, as it covered two different topics - clean rivers being one and swimming areas the other. We therefore voted to unanimously reject the proposal.

Our next meeting will be held on **12**th **June**, when the topic will be a talk on "The Hopes and Fears of a Climate Scientist" (an expert's view) given by Professor Rob Wilby. Women as well as men will be welcome at this meeting. All non-members attending will incur a £5.00 charge.

A New Chapter for the Giant Sunflower Competition

Eagle-eyed readers will have noticed that I hadn't written in the last month or two to launch this year's Giant Sunflower Competition. This is because, after discussion with Rob Cook (Head Teacher) and consultation with the staff at Winthorpe Primary School, we have decided to hand over the running of the competition to the school.

Whilst we were keen not to lose this long-established Winthorpe tradition, participant numbers were falling and so the school now has complete freedom to run the competition in ways which will keep our young gardeners interested. Children and staff can think creatively about how to engage interest and build motivation to take part; I'm excited to see what innovative ideas they come up with.

Originally designed to be open to any child living in the parish, in the last 10 years or so the only entries in the competition have been from pupils at the village primary school. Advances in technology in recent years have made the competition easier than ever to administer and run – gone are the days when parents had to phone Mr Finn with their child's entry details! Everything can now be done at the click of a button, so I feel confident that I'm not leaving the school staff with too onerous a task.

Mr Cook is keen to keep the competition alive, as it's such an established school tradition, and we should remember that the sunflower remains the emblem of the school. Hopefully some 'young journalists' will update Focal Point readers on the competition. My role as competition organiser has now ended, but I encourage villagers to contine their own sunflower growing efforts – it is always wonderful to see cheerful sunflowers towering over gardens in the village.

Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

The Parish Council meeting on Thursday 18th May in the Village Hall was well attended by all councillors, as well as two Winthorpe residents. Ahead of the main meeting we held the Annual General Meeting; members agreed that Paul Smith should continue as Chair with Bob Allen serving again as Vice Chair. There are vacancies for two new Parish Councillors to represent Winthorpe Parish: please see the advert at the end of this article for further information.

To pull together all the major activities of the Parish Council during 2022/23, the Chair's Annual Report is now available on the Village Website: click on Parish Council and select 'Parish Council Meeting Minutes' from the drop-down menu.

We held a meeting with National Highways on the 21st April which was very helpful in understanding in more detail their thinking behind their proposals in the recent 'Targeted Consultation'. Those attending were able to clarify and help change some of their thinking, together with developing a stronger relationship with their design team. We will continue to monitor the A46 development and ensure that the impacts of the road are minimised for residents and the parish.

We will be holding our regular meeting with the CEO of The Newark Showground (Simon Eccleston) at the end of May; at this and future meetings we will be joined by the Chair of Collingham PC (Rosemary Fabian). As usual, we have a range of issues to discuss including points around the A46 and Showground traffic issues. If there is anything which you would like us to raise with Simon, please let me know.

Through the Parish maintenance scheme, litter and dog bins will be replaced in Langford and Winthorpe; the grassed area on the corner of Hargon Lane and Gainsborough Road will also be tidied up. We will continue to progress the issues raised and which we have documented in the Maintenance Register.

You may have noticed that we have planted a new Oak Tree on the village green outside the Lord Nelson, and that it is looking sturdy and healthy. The tree is being regularly watered in drier times but, if anybody feels happy to water it, please feel free. As this was planted close to the Coronation of King Charles III, we would be interested to hear from you as to whether you think it would be a good idea to call it 'The Coronation Oak'?

The proposed meeting with our County Councillor (Debbie Darby) in May did not take place; we are now meeting in early June. The intention is to provide feedback on Parish issues and identify any NCC policies or activities which may affect the parish. These include the need for a 40mph zone from Winthorpe roundabout to Langford; parking near the school; the A46 redevelopment; the condition of roads in the area. Please let us know of any specific points which you would like raised.

There have been two planning applications since the last edition of Focal Point which the PC have considered. These are as follows:

- 1 Speight Close, Winthorpe Single storey extensions to front and rear elevations. New boundary fencing and gates. Parish Council view: we're still unhappy with the height of the fencing proposed at the front of the property, which is above 1.0m and could reduce significantly the line of sight for drivers entering and exiting Speight Close.
- Annexe, The Cottage 45 Gainsborough Road Winthorpe Change of use and external alterations to create one independent dwelling including subdivision of residential land associated with The Cottage, 45 Gainsborough Road, Winthorpe. Parish Council view: we are concerned at how much change to the site has already been implemented. This application is retrospective, in that the subdivision of land appears to have already been made, in terms of fencing off the area in front of and alongside the main house. A pair of tall pillars and wrought iron gates have been installed in front of the main house, clearly visible from the main road, with no evidence of permission being granted for this. The plan submitted implies that the boundary division between the two dwellings, to the rear of the main house, is already present and agreed. The change of use request to create an independent dwelling is one step further than the current use of the converted garage, as a short-term rental facility. The plans also indicate major internal alterations to provide a second bedroom and conversion of the ground floor garage space into a living area with large floor to ceiling glass frontage.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place in the Village Hall on the 15th June. In the meantime, if you have any questions, comments or suggestions, please contact me at the following: paul@bridgfordss.co.uk

Following recent resignations from the Parish Council we now have two vacancies for new parish councillors to cover Winthorpe Parish. The successful applicant will hold the post for 4 years and will have a great opportunity to get more involved in the community and contribute to the future of Winthorpe and Langford.

Applicants should contact the Chair of the PC (Paul Smith) on Mobile number 07568 543202 to be considered and for more information. Those applying will be asked to produce a short resume on their background and what benefits they can bring to the Parish Council and the community in general.

Neighbourhood Plan Draft Consultation Release

At long last, The Neighbourhood Plan is now in final draft form and will be submitted to all residents for comment in the form of a consultation from 5th June 2023, closing 6 weeks later on 16th July.

From 5th June the draft plan will be available on the Village Website: select the 'Media' tab and click on 'Neighbourhood Plan'. You will also see a link in the same location to an on-line response form to the consultation, where you will be able to provide direct feedback on the content of the plan. Hard copies of the plan will be available from the Lord Nelson, The Village Hall, Community Centre and all Parish Councillors. It's important to you and your community that as many people as possible look through the plan and comment. Your feedback is vital to help us finalise the content.

Other opportunities to get involved during the consultation period include an afternoon and evening presentation on the content of the plan, which will take place towards the end of June. We will let you know exact dates and times when we deliver leaflets on the consultation to your door, sometime around 5th June.

The Neighbourhood Plan has been in development for over 3 years now, with lots of effort from working group members, focus groups and input from residents via surveys, village meetings etc. It outlines ideas for the parish to develop over the next 10 years and is an important document which will help us to maintain and improve the community values and feeling of Winthorpe and Langford.



THINK AGAIN

The Winthorpe Residents' A46 Consultation Group

We are awaiting a meeting with National Highways, following the targeted consultation exercise held in

April, our intention being to continue to have dialogue and to work with them for the benefit of Winthorpe.

The formal process continues: on 18th May National Highways released an initial report into future highway funding. The A46 remains high priority and is included in the list of proposed schemes between 2025 and 2040. Further environmental surveys continue to be conducted around the village.

Didn't we have a luvverly time the day we went to...... the County Show!

Having completed our usual Saturday morning routine of saxophone lessons (in Balderton) followed by food shopping, we made our way Holmewards at about 11am. The traffic across the A46 was really congested by all the people going to the County Show, so I posted a quick note on our Rock Choir WhatsApp chat group to let folk know it may take them longer than expected to get to the showground. My friend, Ali (who also sings in the choir), was coming to ours at noon for us to travel in just one car to the show.

We got to the showground at around 12.15pm. We were due to sing at 1.30pm. Our choir leader, Ainjiel, just happened to spot us as we walked in and let us know that the performances were running a little late, so our start time had been put back. Consequently, we had a bit of a longer wander around the show prior to meeting up with our fellow singers. At that point, we saw part of the polo demonstration in the Main Ring, having spent quite some time cooing over the wee (officially, miniature) donkeys: seriously cute!

The delayed start of our performance (in the George Stephenson Exhibition Hall - the Community Area), whilst a bit of an inconvenience, meant that we had the opportunity to enjoy a couple of the earlier acts in the performance area and explore the variety of community exhibitors in the hall. The choir from the Association of Ukrainians in Great Britain were beautifully and colourfully dressed in national costume, their music and song hugely evocative of their cultural background. In 1989, when Ceausescu was deposed in Romania and photos emerged of the dire conditions the children in the orphanages were living under, the village of Winthorpe leapt into action to raise money and to set up an aid route in conjunction with someone who was adopting a Romanian orphan. As a consequence of the money we raised, we were able to send two pallets of toys and medicine directly to where it was needed. This inspired other villages to follow our lead and, because we were one of the first, several of us found ourselves on the front page of the Newark Advertiser and the Six o' Clock News.

In our little corner of Nottinghamshire, over the years we have raised money to re-roof three churches, put a new boiler in Winthorpe church and helped to upgrade the electricity and heating in Holme church. We built a new Community Centre; we have sponsored residents, their children and grandchildren when they have run, walked, cycled and anything else they have done to raise money for charity. We have filled shoe boxes, sent aid to Africa and the Ukraine, and helped numerous charities by holding coffee mornings, duck races, village fetes, in addition to charities we may sponsor privately. Last, but not least, we have raised money for three defibrillators without tapping into any of the various grants available.

In addition to the above, we villagers leapt into action when the need arose, to organise a socially distanced party during the pandemic and, more recently, a street party to celebrate the late Queen's Jubilee and our new King's Coronation, all executed with military precision.

It not only takes a village to just raise a child, it just takes a village - a village like ours.
