

I'm rather disappointed that the amount of giving this month from Winthorpe has decreased, whereas the problem of making ends meet continues to be as great as ever, with increased demand still running at 121%. Our most recent delivery to the Foodbank weighed in at 37.1kg, which is down and has taken longer to reach than usual. Thank you so much to those who have given, including those who give regularly, either through their bank or in kind, but to everyone else, I would say, come on Winthorpe – please think of others who are really struggling at the moment!

Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council, on Thursday 20th April in the Village Hall, was well attended by councillors as well as two residents from Winthorpe. We have commented on the recent National Highways 'Targeted Consultation' on three aspects of the A46 Newark By Pass. These are updates and changes to the Langford Hall access road, changes to the Winthorpe Roundabout, and scheme boundary changes at the south end of Hargon Lane. Further information can be found on the National Highways website.

We held direct discussions with National Highways on the 21st May, which was a very productive meeting. This helped to address potential concerns; National Highways also provided some helpful insights into some wider aspects of the plans. We will continue to monitor the A46 development and ensure that the impacts of the new road are minimised for residents and the parish.

We will be meeting with our County Councillor (Debbie Darby) in May, to provide feedback on Parish issues and identify any Nottinghamshire County Council policies or activities, which may affect the parish. These will include the need for a 40mph zone from Winthorpe roundabout to Langford, parking near the school, aspects of the A46 redevelopment, and the condition of roads in the area. If you have any specific points which you would like to be raised, please let us know.

In planning, there have been three applications since the last edition of Focal Point which the PC have considered. These are as follows:

- The Starbucks drive-through near The Friendly Farmer roundabout – Installation of Electric Vehicle Charging points. Parish Council view: no objection, as this is beneficial to the wider community
- 1 Speight Close, Winthorpe – single storey extensions to front and rear elevations. New boundary fencing and gates. Parish Council view: we have concerns about the impact of the front extension and the proposed height of the fencing, which we will be sharing with Newark & Sherwood DC Planning Team
- The Grove, 73 Gainsborough Road – resubmission of an application for an extension of an existing Swimming Pool changing facility to incorporate a gym and additional facilities. Parish Council view: this is the same as our view when the application was submitted previously; briefly we have no objection if the facilities remain solely for domestic use.

Following my comments in the last edition of Focal Point, we're now very hopeful that we will soon have support from Newark & Sherwood DC for the installation of a new sign on The Spinney at the point where each leg branches off. This will help emergency vehicles and delivery drivers to locate properties.

We continue to work through the programme of works for maintenance of Parish Council owned property and land within the Parish. A considerable number of these items have been reported by residents; thank you for your input. We have a register of issues to be completed, which is prioritised and we will be working to complete over the next year.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is the AGM and will take place in the Village Hall on Thursday 18th May. In the meantime, if you have any questions, comments or suggestions, please contact me: paul@bridgfordss.co.uk

Neighbourhood Plan Update – April 2023

I am very pleased to say that at long last we are working towards a final version of the Parish Neighbourhood Plan. As I have mentioned in recent editions of Focal Point, this has taken a little longer than we had hoped; the final version will be tied down during May and we hope to circulate access to the plan to all residents from the 1st June 2023.

The construction of the plan has taken a lot of effort from all members of the Working Group and contains significant information to support the future of Winthorpe with Langford Parish over the next 10 years.

There will be ample opportunity to comment on the plan over the 6-week consultation period, ending in mid-July. It is important that we receive as much comment as possible on the content, so that the Working Group can then work with our consultant's 'Open Plan' to conclude its content and the way it looks before finally submitting it to the planning team at Newark and Sherwood DC.

There will be more information about how you can view and comment on the plan in the next edition of Focal Point. In the meantime, we will be organising Parish Meetings in the Community Centre in mid-June. This will provide you with

the opportunity to understand the direction of the plan, its key themes and policies, and to put any questions to the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group.

THINK AGAIN

The Winthorpe Residents' A46 Consultation Group

The additional targeted consultation conducted by National Highways concluded in mid-April and individual meetings have been held with affected landowners. A further meeting with Think Again has been requested for May to continue the dialogue

and to work in collaboration to achieve the best solution for Winthorpe.

Further press coverage has included information from the outcome of the original statutory consultation and selected views on the additional proposals contained in the targeted consultation. The results of the further consultation will be included in next stages of the planning process. It is unlikely that the process will be fully completed before 2025. Further surveys were conducted by National Highways in early April.



Recipe for May, for the Coronation of King Charles III

If, like me, you don't fancy broad beans out of season and you're looking for an alternative to Coronation Quiche, what could be more British than this scone and Coronation Chicken combination?

Coronation chicken scones

Prep: 25 minutes

Cook: 12 minutes

Makes 12

Ingredients

For the scones:

225g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting

1 tsp baking powder

140g cold butter, chopped into small pieces

150ml milk

1 tbsp nigella seeds

1 egg, beaten

For the filling:

3 cooked chicken breasts, finely chopped or shredded

100g mango chutney

2 tsp mild curry powder

150g pot natural yogurt

75g mayonnaise

small bunch coriander, chopped

small bunch mint, chopped

juice ½ lemon

½ cucumber, peeled into ribbons

1 small red onion, thinly sliced

Method

1. First, make the scones. Line a baking tray with baking parchment and heat oven to 220°C/200°C fan/gas 7. Put the flour and baking powder in a large bowl, add ¼ tsp salt and mix well. Tip in the butter and rub into the flour with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add the milk and nigella seeds and use a cutlery knife to mix the ingredients together until they clump into a soft dough.
2. Tip onto your work surface and knead briefly to incorporate any crumbs. Flour the surface well and roll the dough out to a thickness of about 1½ cm. Use a 7 cm biscuit cutter to stamp out 12 circles – you may need to combine the scraps back together and re-roll to make all 12. Arrange over the baking tray, brush the tops with a little beaten egg and bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. Set aside to cool while you prepare the filling.
3. Mix the chicken, chutney, curry powder, yogurt, mayo, herbs, lemon juice and some seasoning in a bowl. Chill until you're ready to assemble.
4. To serve, split the scones and make sandwiches with the coronation chicken, cucumber and red onion. Fix the scones together with a skewer, if you like.

Memories of Spring, taken from Winthorpe Village Scrapbook

Finally spring came, the snowdrops and violets appeared in the hedgerows and the celandines in the woods. We listened for the cuckoo and watched for the first swallow. My father recorded the dates on the doorpost of one greenhouse. Many of these are now indecipherable but some remain.

Then in May came the flycatchers, chiffchaffs and whitethroats. The blue tit nested in the garden pump, the long tailed tit built its nest of cobwebs, moss and lichen in the shrubbery, goldfinches nested in the pear trees. A kingfisher nested in the gravel pit in the Hall grounds, while farther afield, by the Fleet, we knew where to find mallard, coot, moorhen and snipe. Red squirrels frequented the trees, scattering husks of beech nuts or acorns on to the paths. In spring we could watch the same red squirrels sitting on the sycamore tree across the road, scattering the outer green scale leaves of the buds on to the road below as they sought for the juicy green leaves in the heart of the bud.

At night, as we lay in bed, we could recognise the voices of barn owl, tawny owl or little owl, and often the double bark of the fox. On hot summer nights the nightingale broke the silence now shattered by the harsh sounds of vehicles on the by-pass, or the youth of the village on noisy motor-cycles.

Never again shall we see the dog fox jump over the wall opposite, cross the road, jump over our wall, walk slowly under our window and on through the shrubbery to raid the hen roost at the Grove, leaving clear footprints in the undisturbed snow. Nor are we likely to halt while a hen pheasant emerges from the park side of the Lincoln Road and walks her brood across the road to the safety of the cornfield on the Carr Farm. The heavy "clomp" of the stallion, brasses gleaming in the sun, his mane and tail neatly plaited with bright red ribbons, as he is led to the farm, or the quick light steps of a well-groomed horse, head held high by the bearing rein, drawing a brougham - these are only a memory.
