New directory gives carers seal of approval

People in Newark and Sherwood who need social care and support are being urged to use a new directory of reliable paid workers...

‘Support With Confidence’, which has been set up by Nottinghamshire County Council, is a web-based directory of potential employees who can help older and disabled people with things like:

- getting them out of bed, washed and dressed
- taking them out for trips e.g. the pub or theatre
- walking people’s dogs
- helping out with shopping, housework or the garden.

Everyone on the directory has received training and has been checked by the County Council.

People who receive a personal budget for their social care can then select who they want from the directory to provide a particular service. They will then interview that person and, if they are happy, offer them the job.

Councillor Kevin Rostance, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Health, said: “More and more people are now receiving personal budgets, which mean they can manage their own social care. This is fantastic and it gives people real choice and control over which services they have and who helps them.

‘Support With Confidence’ gives people the reassurance that these carers are reliable, so we would urge anyone who is thinking of hiring a personal assistant to use this scheme.”

Personal budgets are given to people who are eligible for long term social care support by the County Council. They have an assessment with a social care worker, where they decide how they wish to spend their money to best meet their needs.

DID YOU KNOW?

1. The parish church of All Saints has six bells. The heaviest is the Tenor and weighs 7cwts. The inscription on this bell reads 'GOD SAVE THE CHURCH.'
2. The Romans built a bridge over the River Trent between Winthorpe and Collingham. Don't go looking for that bridge or you'll drown. The remains were destroyed in 1884 to improve the navigation of the River Trent.
3. Winthorpe Lake was opened in February 1937 by the Hull Water Transport Co. for the extraction of sand and gravel.
4. The decorative brickwork design on Grange Cottage, Gainsborough Road is a Flemish Bond. This is a method of laying bricks so that alternate headers and stretchers appear on each course on the face of the wall.

31st LAMMA Show-18th 19th January 2012

For those of you that don't already know, LAMMA stands for Lincolnshire Agricultural Machinery Manufacturers

Association and has grown to be the second largest show of its kind in Europe and attracts some 600+ exhibitors and 1000's of visitors annually from across the globe. It is run by a dedicated group of like minded people (The Directors) who are or have been involved in Agricultural Engineering in one form or another over the years and who put this single show together in January each year.

This not only creates local jobs, has massive economic benefits for the surrounding businesses in the area but puts Newark & Notts Showground firmly on the map for the County and the UK alike

With such a large show attracting so many visitors it isn't always possible to keep everyone happy but the directors would like to take this opportunity to inform you of just a few of the measures undertaken to hopefully continue to minimise the impact the show has on the transport network and surrounding local area.

- Parish, District and County Council liaison meetings including Nottinghamshire Police and the Highways Agency
- Local business and transport liaison meetings
- Press and media announcements
- Gates opening from 06:30 with reduced priced breakfasts to encourage earlier attendance and to try and avoid rush hour traffic with the show opening at 07:30.
- Contingency planning for traffic issues, severe weather or major incidents
- The appointment of a specialist Traffic Management company which is on site at all times. This includes the appropriate early advanced warning signs on all approaches at least 2 weeks prior to the show and traffic controlled signals on the A17.
- The appointment of a bespoke car parking company to assist and ensure that vehicles are parked as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Police and Highways Agency HATO Officers deployed on the A46 / A1133 roundabout and on the A17 at the junction of Drove Lane with roaming patrols on these roads and the A1.

- The use of the new A17 entrance
- Organised coach parties
- Drove Lane kept open both ways as normal
- Entry to the show still remains free, so why not come along and see it for yourselves?

**ADVANCE NOTIFICATION OF TEMPORARY ROAD
RESTRICTIONS IN FOR THE LAMMA SHOW 2012 AT
NEWARK SHOWGROUND**

Temporary 30 m.p.h. Speed Restriction:

Drove Lane, Coddington – from its junction with A46 Fosse Road, Winthorpe to its junction with A17 Lincoln Road, Winthorpe

Temporary Prohibition of Right Turn:

- (a) A17 Lincoln Road, Winthorpe **from** A17 (northbound) **into** Drove Lane
- (b) A17 Lincoln Road, Winthorpe, **from** A17 (southbound) **into** Drove Lane
- (c) Drove Lane, Coddington (north Eastbound) **from** Drove Lane **into** A17 Lincoln Road
- (d) Drove Lane, Coddington (south westbound) **from** Drove Lane **into** A17 Lincoln Road

Temporary One Way Order (vehicles to proceed in a southerly direction only)

Drove Lane, Coddington, from its junction with A17 Lincoln Road, Winthorpe for a distance of 800 metres in a northerly direction

Times & Dates: - As necessary between:

06:00 hours Wednesday 18th January 2012 until

20:00 hours Thursday 19th January 2012

Alternative Route:- As Signed on Site

**101 is now the number to call
when you want to contact Nottinghamshire Police –
when it's less urgent than 999.**

When should I call 101?

To report less urgent crime or disorder and for general police enquiries.

For example;

- if your car has been stolen;
- if your property has been damaged;
- when you suspect drug use or dealing;
- to report a minor traffic collision;
- to give the police information about crime in your area; or
- if you'd like to speak to your local police officer.

How does it work?

You can call 101 to contact Nottinghamshire Police. The service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. For more information visit www.police.uk/101

What does it cost me to call?

Calls from landlines and mobile networks cost 15 pence per call, no matter what time of day or how long you are on the phone.

Can I call 101 if I'm deaf, hard of hearing, speech impaired, or if English is not my first language?

Yes, If you are deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired you can textphone 18001 101. If you have difficulty speaking English, your local police can access interpreters who can translate your call.

Remember in an emergency always call 999.

For example this is when you need an immediate response because a crime is in progress; someone suspected of a crime is nearby; when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

People living in the Trent Vale will be able to explore the natural and cultural heritage of the area from the comfort of their own homes following the launch of a new website.

The website, www.trentvale.co.uk, has been set up as part of the Trent Vale Landscape Partnership (TVLP), a Heritage Lottery Funded project which aims to conserve, enhance and celebrate the cultural identity of the Trent Vale between Newark and Gainsborough.

The new site will give a comprehensive guide to the Vale's history, wildlife and unique landscape as well as the diverse range of events and activities that are taking place. Visitors to the site will be able to find out about:

- Events and training courses taking place
- Guides to walks and cycle routes in the area
- The heritage of the Vale, its buildings and traditional skills
- The nature reserves and wildlife that can be found in the Vale
- The TVLP community grants scheme
- A photo gallery of some of Trent Vale's projects, events, people and places.

Users will also be encouraged to share their photos of the Trent Vale and submit details of their favourite heritage features as well as appropriate events that may be added to the listings.

Trent Vale project manager Virginia Green said; "This website will be a really useful tool to help people plan their explorations of the fantastic Trent Vale area. The site will be continually updated with new events, training courses, news and competitions and it will also be the place to find out about plans for the exciting Trent Vale Festival taking place throughout 2012. Whether it's on foot, bike, boat or now laptop the Trent Vale is just waiting to be discovered".

During a visit to my doctor, I asked him, "How do you determine whether or not an older person should be put in an old folk's home?"


"Well," he said, "we fill up a bathtub, then we offer a teaspoon, a teacup and a bucket to the person to empty the bathtub


