



# A May Day Picnic Aboard n.b. Mulberry

We light up the engine and throw off our mooring lines before setting out for a picnic. A couple of toots on the horn indicate a turn left and we leave the marina. Keith at Nether Lock has prepared the water for us so we edge our way slowly under the road bridge and he closes the gates behind us and the water is gradually let out. On the lower river level we now set our engine at a slow pace and head towards Cromwell Weir. The light wind is pushing us northwards and the May sunshine is warming. There are a few swans on the river bank and one or two runners wave at us as we pass but otherwise everything is peaceful (except for the buzz of the engine beneath our feet).

Oil seed rape and lightly dressed trees in their spring foliage border the river as we travel under the railway bridge and leave the lock cottages standing proud on the right hand side. The outfall from the 'water station' trickles frothily to join our water and we move on to meet the main branch of the Trent that skirts the west of Newark.

Winthorpe village stands sleepily on the hill top safely away from any threats from a swollen river. The river marker tells us we are 43 kilometres from the start of the canal in Nottingham. At Holme Lake we see walkers

strolling with their dogs. The lake is hidden behind banking and hawthorn, white with blossom. The lazy cattle swish their tails as they munch the grass and a cormorant lifts off from the surface of the river. We turn a bend to face North Muskham on the left bank. Here moorings are provided



for smaller cruisers but we cannot be accommodated and must travel on. Looking up at the church, set behind a field of flowering grasses and shrouded by various trees, I am romantic enough to think of the centuries that have passed since it was built. The northern end of the village is marked by almost half a kilometre of weeping willows, some sweeping the water and all swaying in the light breeze.

The tower of Holme Church and a few farm buildings can be seen above the near side river bank before we slide down past the newer roof tops at the far end of the village. We now have several kilometres of open countryside before we reach the moorings at Cromwell. Soon we will enjoy our lunch in the fine May sunshine before setting off back to meet Keith at Nether Lock.

# giving News from Langford nature a home Lowfields February 2015

We are very pleased to report that spring is on its way here at Langford Lowfields. The signs are everywhere with the first flowering coltsfoot and cowslips of the year, hazel catkins and many bird species singing including a lovely mistle thrush. Over the winter we have been busy getting ready for the coming breeding season, work has included vital maintenance on the sand martin bank preparing it for the birds to return anytime from March onwards. The sand martin bank has been very successful for the past three years, so entering the fourth breeding season, we are very optimistic.

This month's volunteer work party had a nice change from the usual scrub clearing with a sunny, but blustery day of hedge planting. We have recently been lucky enough to secure funding from Natural England to plant just over 450m of native hedgerow plants, including field maple, common dogwood and hawthorn, along the northwestern boundary of the reserve. Once grown, the hedgerow will provide a wildlife corridor, connecting the hedgerow on Westfield Lane with the

scrub on the western boundary just south of Cromwell Lock. The hedgerow will also provide habitat and food for a wide variety of invertebrates, mammals and birds. In the past month we have had two pairs of stonechat around the reserve which is wonderful news as there were



none reported last winter. There have been at least three flocks of pinkfooted geese reported, flying overhead on three consecutive days, possibly prompted by the milder weather of late, to fly north already and a pair of oystercatchers has taken up residence on the island in front of the beach hut.

The shelduck have also returned, hopefully to breed as, disappointingly, they haven't bred on the reserve since 2010. The water rail is still

squealing on a regular basis and it would appear that at least one of the bitterns has moved into the reedbed just north of the boardwalk so keep your eyes peeled.

The warden will soon be carrying out early morning surveys to listen out for booming so make sure you keep up to date with our news by checking the viewing screen or beach hut sightings or the blog on the Langford Lowfields webpage (see below).

# Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council & Winthorpe Community Centre Improvements to the Jubilee Walk

As many local residents who walk along the Jubilee Walk will be well aware, over the last few weeks work has been carried out to clear the embankment running down the side of the path from the Community Centre to the Jubilee Meadow at the bottom. All of the weeds



including the excessive number of brambles, nettles and ivy have been moved together with some of the smaller self-set trees. Over the next few weeks some of the larger self-set trees will be cleared away and three very large trees at the bottom of the embankment in the very far corner behind the community centre will be removed as these are badly diseased and already dead or dying and could become dangerous.

This work will greatly open up the embankment and let in a lot more light. The work has been carried out by the Community Service Work Team of the Nottinghamshire Probation Service who have done a splendid job and to whom we are extremely grateful.

Before the weeds begin to reappear we would like to set a few smaller trees perhaps of the flowering variety with some traditional, possibly large, shrubs and groups of various bulbs for late winter/early spring colour under the trees.



If you are beginning to think of repairing your garden from the ravages of winter, find yourselves with surplus suitable plants and would like to donate them for setting on the bank we should be very grateful indeed. Similarly if anyone would like to purchase a small tree in memory of someone we should be happy to discuss with them what they would like.

The Community Services Work Team will be returning three or four times over the summer and autumn to keep the area clear and free from weeds. Anyone interested in helping this village project by making a small donation please contact Steven Jackson, 77 Gainsborough Road, 671377.

#### Planning Permission granted for Newark Air Museum Project



The trustees of Newark Air Museum are pleased to advise that official notification has been received from Newark & Sherwood District Council, granting Full

Planning Permission for the new Education Room, Café & Toilet facility. Full Planning Permission represents a huge boost to the museum's plan to construct this important new visitor facility on its Southfield Site. Over the coming weeks the museum will be working with its project architect, Studio G Architecture LLP (SGA LLP) of Collingham, Notts to discharge the five planning conditions that were applied to the Full Planning Approval.

The aim of this work with SGA LLP will be to have a strategy in place to tie in with the outcome of one of the grant applications connected to the project, which should be known towards the end of March 2015.

The village is losing trees which are very important to the health of the atmosphere and are a natural habitat for birds and insects and so maybe something can be done to redress the balance. # REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTOR OF THE EAST TRENT GROUP OF CHURCHES MARCH 2015

Lent is upon us. Having started in the middle of February, Lent continues through March, coming to an end with the great celebration of Easter on 5th April. It feels like a very long season, particularly because through the years it has been promoted as a season of abstinence, of giving things up, and increasing self-discipline in preparation for Easter. There is nothing wrong with this but it suggests that Lent is a gloomy time when "no" is said rather a lot.

That is sad. The season of Lent is much more affirmative than is often believed.

When a plate of biscuits is passed round at a meeting in Lent someone will say, as they take a chocolate one, "I know I shouldn't, but ...!" "Why not?" I want to ask. If a chocolate



biscuit is really necessary to being alive and feeling to be alive then its consumption during Lent could be a part of the Lenten fast. I get really excited (yes, excitement is still around, even in Lent) when I hear "I know I shouldn't, but ...!" and it is said reflectively, as a piece of genuine self-examination, because that is what Lent is all about.



So let's spend Lent reflecting all the more on all we say and do. That way we'll live life more reflectively and do what Lent wants us to do. And we will come to Easter with a true sense in our hearts of celebration of being alive.

Following the interval the Brass Quintet came on with some rousing handelapping music. Of the six selections was the beautiful 'A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square.'




#### **Church Flower Ladies**
