WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 21st January 2016, the Parish Council held its finance meeting followed by the main council meeting in the village hall.



The Council have been contacted by a body called Midland Rural Housing, who are working on behalf of Newark and

Sherwood District Council, looking into affordable housing in local villages. They would like to undertake a survey in Winthorpe and get the villagers views on this matter. A representative is to come to the next Parish Council meeting to explain this in more detail. The Council will keep you informed of the outcome of the meeting.

The Council have been offered the use of a mobile speed gun for a trial use in the village. The Council has been made aware of a number of volunteers who would like to assist in this scheme. Further discussions are to be held and I will keep Focal Point updated on this matter.

The matter of traffic congestion was again raised following a number of recent events at the Showground. The Parish Council have written to the Highways Agency as they are responsible for traffic on the A46. A response is awaited.

The Council has received a communication in relation to Phase 3 of Langford Quarry. Tarmac is undertaking a "Scoping Study" and asked if the Parish Council had any issues that they wanted adding in the study. The new proposals will extend the existing quarry by 40 acres and will extend its life by up to 10 years. Although the proposal will bring the quarry nearer to Holme, the Council have been assured that it will have no impact on Winthorpe or Holme as Tarmac were making every provision to screen the site off. Details of the proposals will be placed on the village notice boards in the near future.

Text Messages - Old Style

An Analogy by Bob Warriner

Imagine life without mobile phones, computers, or even landline telephones? It is be very difficult to envisage these days but most of us know that there were such times.

From the early 1900's up to the 1960's (when the telephone became more accessible and affordable to the ordinary household) the simplest method of communication was to use the humble postcard to reach all corners of the British Isles and beyond. Of course the letter in an envelope was an option but the postcard was the cheapest with the halfpenny stamp being the lesser postal charge.

One enterprising Victorian photographer spotted a niche market and founded the publishing business of Francis Frith & Co of Reigate, Surrey. The Frith name went on to become probably the best known pictorial postcard company in Britain.

Soon after his marriage in 1860 he embarked on the ambitious project of photographing every town, village and place of natural beauty or historical interest in the whole of UK. (Maybe he didn't have a shed!)

Much of the travelling in rural areas was done on his bicycle with a trailer attached to carry his large box camera, tripod, stepladders and other necessary equipment. He died in 1898 without fully completing the task but others from his company continued the work.

After the 1960's people continued to use postcards but mostly from holiday situations advising friends and relatives that they "wish you were here"??? (Did they really mean it?)

We are now in the 21st Century and the advances made on mobile phones have all but eliminated the need to put pen to card. You can now send messages, photos, or even video chat live using the skype system from practically anywhere in the world. There are of course the other media networks of "Facebook" & "Twitter" etc. which need to be mentioned for better or worse!


So in an age where electronic gadgetry was none existent, in a time when steam was the rising power for nationwide transport, the tiny picture postcard was the favoured way to relay the trivial and sometimes useful messages to family or friends just the same as texting or calling is today.

One difference between now and then is that we needed to be able to write instead of tapping buttons, but one might be amused to see that by entering your message the opposite way up to the address might prevent the postman or others from reading your private personal chatter!!!

(Early encryption eh?) Can you do that with a mobile phone?

(A) This framed style printed card posted Newark 2 Dec 1908 taken from near the foot of the A1 embankment shows the lodge to the Grange in full view. The white railings either side mark a bridging of the stream that joins the River Fleet at the corner of the allotments site on Holme Lane.

*Note the frame also bears the Newark Coat of Arms.



The Pictorial or Topographical postcard was the most popular choice but more wealthy users had “selfies” made by local photographers who printed cards with images of themselves or family on the front face.

As colour photography publishing was not yet widely used in Frith's time a process known as "tinting" was used to colour the cards. It was a job farmed out to cottage workers, whereas the amateur artist painted over the printed photograph card to a predefined pattern, giving the card the impression of it being a coloured picture. Although some publishers were more advanced and could reproduce pre coloured pictures. These would have been more expensive to print thus more expensive to buy. (A) on the previous page is an example of the latter



(A) Text reads: “D'r A, How do you like this style of p.c. Yours was A.I. have not stopped collecting yet. Are having very cold weather, B”

It is addressed to: Mr. Hopkinson, 25, King Richard St, Stoke, Coventry, Warwickshire. It was published by A & G Taylor's "Orthochrome" Series, Queen Victoria St, London

(B) This next card viewed from the near old village hall looking down Gainsborough Road towards the green shows in its infancy, the tree that was cut down to ground level last year 2015. I believe the nearest building on the right behind the hedge housed the old post office. The card is postmarked Newark 17 Aug 1922.

Text reads: "We shall arrive home Friday about 5pm as near as I can say. I expect Kathleen will want to meet us after being away so long from her. You can also bring Tommy with you if you will". It is addressed to a Mrs W. Moody, 62, Anns Rd, Heeley, Sheffield

Suffragettes also helped women's causes by securing them the Vote. He concluded the talk by showing a poster from the Second World War, advertising a 'Bomb Chukka' for a wife to keep in her home in case a bomb dropped in the 'parlour'; in which case she was expected to secure it in the 'Bomb Chukka' and dispose of it outside the home in a safe place. Silly or brave?

Happy New Year to you all!

Winter is here with a vengeance today at Langford Lowfields with freezing temperatures, sleet and snow. Luckily the volunteers have been working with Jenny in the shelter of the woodland, clearing the perimeter ready for the installation of new fencing. Home to both green and great spotted woodpecker as well as tree creeper, the woodland is being rejuvenated, with many of the sycamore saplings being removed to encourage growth of more wildlife friendly oak and elm. Jenny and her team will soon be planting out some hazel, hawthorn and blackthorn saplings in order to improve the woodland understory.

Our brilliant volunteer team also regularly helps Jenny with the monthly WeBS counts (Wetland Bird Survey). At the end of December they had a calm sunny day which offered up excellent views of a beautiful pair of stonechat feeding in the vegetation just off the North Trail, as well as Cetti's warbler calling in the same area. Their surveying session was topped off in style by one of the Langford bitterns flying overhead.

As winter progresses Jenny has resumed supplementary feeding near the car park on Cottage Lane. A mixture of wild bird seed, funded by our HLS (Higher Level Stewardship) grant, is scattered on the ground twice a week in order to help sustain the birds through the 'hungry gap' between now and spring. Last year this attracted a flock of up to 250 birds so be sure to keep an eye out as you arrive at the car park. You may even be lucky enough to spot the elusive tree sparrows.

More recently we have had an unusual visitor to the reserve in the shape of a rather spectacular duck. The non-native, red-crested pochard is an infrequent visitor here at Langford, as they tend to migrate from their breeding grounds in Eastern Europe and Asia (less so in Spain, France and the Netherlands), to winter in North Africa, India and southern China. Birds spotted in the UK are often escapees from captive

populations although you can occasionally spot wild birds in the south of England.



As the name suggests, this striking bird has a chestnut head with a bright red bill and stunning black, white and brown plumage on the body and wings. The female, although duller, is

also quite recognizable by her dark brown cap, pale cheeks and neck along with her large size and distinctive shape.

Dear All,

I can hardly believe it - we have almost arrived at Candlemas - a last lingering look at Christmas and the birth of the Christ Child. In a trice we will be enjoying pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, reflecting on Ash Wednesday and then it's Lent and the pilgrimage to the Cross and beyond. If I'm not careful I'll be hearing sleigh bells!! A step too far?



We can, in our determination to be organised and prepared and avoid a perceived rush, lose the harsh reality of Jesus' journey. His public ministry was fraught with drama. Through it we are enabled to discover where we are in the story, walking with him, meeting him at the Cross or perhaps at the empty tomb with Mary. None of this is comfortable or easy. These groups and others, as well as the many other parts that make up the East Trent Churches, act as conductors through which a living relationship with Jesus can be discovered. 


