75th Anniversary of VE Day

My Mum was a cook in the WRAF when she met my Dad. They had 10 days leave in which to get married before he was shipped out to the Far East to fight the Japanese. It was three years before she saw him again.

Like a lot of men who fought in the Far East, my Dad never spoke about his wartime experiences, apart from the fact that he thought the Japanese to be a cruel race. I do know that he was in India, the jungles of Burma and the relief of Singapore and that he witnessed something of what went on in Changi jail, though he never went into any great detail.

When the war in Europe was declared to be over, my Mum told me that there was great celebration in the kitchen, until my Mum reminded them that there were still men fighting the Japanese and that one of them was her husband.

These men endured terrible conditions and if ever you have watched the TV series "Tenko" or seen the film "A Town Like Alice" or "A Bridge Over the River Kwai", you get a sense of what they endured.

Whilst celebrating the recent VE celebrations, several of us in Pocklington Crescent decided that we would like to hold another street party on 15th August 2020 to honour these men - forgotten soldiers who fought a forgotten war. So please put out your flags again and join us to give these men the accolade they so rightly deserve. Social distancing to be observed if required.

LET EVERYTHING HAPPEN TO YOU, BEAUTY AND TERROR. JUST KEEP GOING, NO FEELING IS FINAL.



Thanks to the continued generosity of Winthorpe residents, deliveries were made to the Foodbank warehouse on 6th April and 4th May, weighing in total **21.4kg** and **37.0kg**. I also received generous cash donations. For all of this, on behalf of the Foodbank, **thank you so much**.

The Covid-19 crisis is bad enough, but it is becoming more and more obvious that the economic damage to all our lives will be with us for a very long time, and this, coupled with ever present anxiety, will make it even harder for a large number of people to get by without help. New Trent Vale Trail a “lifesaver” for local users



The new section of the Trent Vale Trail which links Collingham and Besthorpe has been a huge hit with local users, proving to be a boon for walkers, cyclists, children in pushchairs, people in wheelchairs and runners keen to get exercise and fresh air away from traffic, especially during the current coronavirus lockdown.

“I am delighted with what has been achieved” said volunteer Andrew Hindmarsh, who looks after the Besthorpe Nature Reserve owned by the Notts Wildlife Trust. “It has enabled people of all ages and abilities to visit the reserve and appreciate its beauty and wildlife”.

“Most days we come out on this new path which for us is a lifesaver” one young mum with two young children told a volunteer. “I’ve used the opportunity to introduce my children to wildlife in the area.”

The Trent Vale Trail project is the initiative of the Friends of Trent Vale Trail, who have been working for seven years to turn the vision of a trail linking Newark with villages along the eastern side of the Trent into reality.

They have been supported by Sustrans, the Notts Wildlife Trust, Notts County Council, Tarmac, all the parish councils between Collingham and North Clifton, Newark and Sherwood District Council and lots of local businesses, organisations and residents. The project has been keenly supported throughout by County and District councillor Maureen Dobson.

The European Agricultural
Fund for Rural Development:
Europe investing in rural areas



After years of fundraising, a substantial grant from LEADER, the EU's rural development fund, enabled construction to begin in September 2019. Despite serious setbacks caused by the recent floods, the Friends praised local firm CF construction for doing an excellent job. The Trail was due to be officially opened at the beginning of April – but then Covid-19 struck.

"I'm really chuffed to see how the trail is being used and appreciated by so many people even though some signs and information boards still have to be put in place" commented Alan Hudson, the Chair of the Friends group and a long-standing volunteer for Sustrans.

"It's living proof of my belief that if only decent safe trails are built, people will use them for exercise, enjoyment and as an alternative to relying on motor transport for at least some journeys".

Once restrictions on movement can be lifted the Friends hope that it will attract people from the wider region to visit the area and its attractions.

On Thursday 21st May 2020, the Parish Council held its Annual Parish meeting followed by the Monthly Parish Council meeting. These meetings were again held remotely due to the current Covid 19 restrictions via the powers of modern technology.

The Council unanimously voted for Lee Cammack to continue as Council Chairman with Bob Allen continuing as Vice – Chairman.

The Chairman submitted his report and thanked the whole Parish Council, its Clerk and Councillors Dobson and Dales for the valuable support given to him this year.

The Parish accounts have now been sent to external auditors, PKF Littlejohn, following the internal review and report by Duncan Richardson who found all the accounts to be in order. The Chairman expressed his thanks to Duncan for the valuable support and assistance he gives the Parish Council each year.

The Parish Council are receiving regular updates of services returning back to some sort of normality. These are put on the village website as soon as we receive them so please keep a regular look out under the "News" section on the website.

The Council have requested two new signs for the village. The first is to replace the old tired sign of "Winthorpe" upon entering the village and the second is to refurbish the "finger" sign outside the Lord Nelson.

The Council have been approached by a resident on Gainsborough Road regarding speeding through the village. This has been a problem for many years. The Chairman has asked its District Councillors to approach N.S.D.C to see what control measures or action can be taken to eliminate this problem.

WIGSLEY



Wigsley was born on the 14th Jan and came to us on the 10th March following the departure of our lovely Godfrey on the 5th Feb, who many in the village will remember.

On the 10th March (eight weeks after he was born), we drove to the village of Wigsley and picked him up from the breeders. We took him away from all his brothers and sister ten black puppies (plus himself) and brought him home.

Home was very different for Wigsley; there were no other puppies, just two very old cats 13 years — who really did not want anything to do with him, despite his repeated attempts to make contact and interact. The garden experience for Wigsley was no better, indeed far worse because we have four rescue chickens in the garden and they really did not want to engage with Wigsley again, despite Wigs' endeavours. However, this time around instead of running away like the cats did, the chickens went on the attack and chased him when ever he got within range. On one occasion, (when he was very small) they actually pecked his bottom a few times, because he could not outrun them.

So it came as quite a relief when he had his final injections and was allowed out into the village. Again here it was not plain sailing because the lockdown rules were well and truly in place and he so wanted to engage with both folk and dogs. However, he did enjoy his walks eventually, as I goggled about dogs and the virus. Good news for Wigs, dogs do not carry the virus.

On our walks, Wigsley being a small puppy attracted lots of attention, as the editor of this magazine will testify. Folks did ask about Godfrey and then asked about Wigsley. So, in all it has been a pleasant experience. What I have noticed since the lockdown is that people are far more friendly, in that social distance is kept but then often there is a friendly wave and or acknowledgement to say thanks for keeping your distance. In short, this social distancing has resulted in a far higher level of friendly interaction, even with cyclists.

Wigsley has now settled in very well and met many other dogs like Mable, Shiiraz, Mouse and his best friend George. Even at home the cats are slowly coming around and though he is still scared of the chickens, he is bigger and can outrun them.


