



Although we hang on to the possessions which we treasure or which we know we are absolutely certain to need the day after we get rid of them, it's a good time to declutter and take stock. For reasons too complicated to explain here, we had two tables and twelve chairs in our dining room last year – the smallest bistro in England? We gave one set to our favourite charity, who gained over £100 from the sale of it, which made us very happy.

Meeting

One visitor was welcomed and one birthday celebrated before the evening's AGM business was conducted. A financial report was read out and explained, followed by a resumé of the year's events. Various people were thanked and in return the President, Treasurer and Committee were thanked for their hard work throughout the year. As no other names were put forward, the current posts of President/Secretary, Treasurer and Committee Members were re-elected en masse to serve another year.

At our meeting on 15th March, we welcomed a return visit by Don Witton, whose talk was entitled 'A Calendar of Colour'. At the outset he made it clear that meant no white plants would be included. Don takes photographs wherever he goes and the format of the presentation was extremely interesting. For each month of the year there was a picture of a named garden, followed by a shrub with particular interest in that month, then a flowering bulb, a perennial and lastly a euphorbia. The latter is no coincidence, as Don has the national collection on his allotment in Sheffield.

Here's how the format worked, using the month of February as an example:

Named Garden: Bressingham in Norfolk Shrub: Hamamelis x intermedia Diane Flowering Bulb: Iris reticulate George

Perennial: Valeriana phu Aurea Euphorbia: Euphorbia rigida

Several of the winter gardens had lovely, glowing dogwoods.

We were most impressed by Don's photography, knowledge and style of presentation.

Our next meeting on April 19th is the AGM and plant sale. If you have spare plants or over wintered cuttings, this is a chance to boost club funds.

RHS Hyde Hall

Of the three gardens planned for this year's Winthorpe Garden Club visits, RHS Garden Hyde Hall must rank as the best. Situated in Essex, the driest area of the country, this 365 acre site on predominantly clay soil faces an extreme climate. The winters are wet, with cold winds coming across the North Sea from the Arctic. The Mediterranean type summers are hot and dry. Despite this, the garden flourishes, with displays of many varieties of trees and plants from around the world.

There are many gardens set out in the site to suit everyone. The Dry Garden, Cottage Garden, Winter Garden, Courtyard Garden, Queen Mother's Garden, Robinsons Garden, Hilltop Garden and many others. But, the most prominent garden to visit has to be The Global Growth Vegetable Garden.



This particular garden, set out in a design to represent the globe, is split into four quarters to showcase plants of different origin from Europe and the Middle East; Asia; North and Central America; and South America. At the centre of the garden is a bespoke 46ft (14m) wide octagonal glasshouse.



This year, there is also a special exhibition of life-size animal sculptures, created by Susan Bacon and Marcus Cornish, inspired by Aesop's Fables. However, this beautiful example could just as easily have been inspired by the Irish Racehorse, Aesop's Fables, trained by Aidan O'Brien!

Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council, on 16th March in the Village Hall, was well attended by councillors as well as three residents from Winthorpe.

We have received notification from National Highways of a 'Targeted Consultation' on three aspects of the A46 Newark By Pass. These are: updates and changes to Langford Hall access road; changes to the Winthorpe Roundabout; and scheme boundary changes at the south end of Hargon Lane. For further information see National Highways website.

We are in the process of setting up a meeting with our County Councillor (Debbie Darby) to provide feedback on Parish issues and to identify any Nottinghamshire County Council policies of activities which may affect the parish. If you have any specific points which you would like to be raised, please let us know.

In planning, there have been three applications since the last edition of Focal Point. These are as follows:

- The Dial House 58 Gainsborough Road erection of an outdoor office (retrospective). Parish Council decision: defer to Newark & Sherwood District Council Planning Officers
- 22 Gainsborough Road erection of two-story rear extension. Parish Council decision: support
- ESSO Filling Station, Fosse Road (A46) Winthorpe creation of charging zones. Erection of EV chargers, canopies, sub-station enclosure and associated forecourt works. Parish Council decision: support

We are currently working with Newark & Sherwood District Council to facilitate the placement of a new sign on The Spinney at the point where each leg branches off. This sign will identify the numbering of each leg, making it easier for the emergency services and delivery vehicles to find properties. Once this sign is in place, we will be contacting all residents of The Spinney, asking them to place an easily visible property number outside their property.

We understand from 'Open Reach' that they are currently rolling out Full Fibre Broadband service availability around the Newark area and that this will happen in Winthorpe and Langford later this year. This will mean that if residents sign up

for this provision then Broadband speeds will improve from the current 65/75mbs average to almost 500mbs, which will be an obvious significant improvement.

We will have at least one vacancy for a Parish Councillor to start following the AGM in May. If any resident of the Parish would be interested in taking up the role, please contact me at the email address below or on 07568 543202 for more information on the role and how to apply.

Neighbourhood Plan Update - March 2023

The Neighbourhood Plan Working Group met recently, with the main objective of signing off the Final Draft version of the Plan, in readiness for sharing with Parish residents towards the end of March. Unfortunately, our consultant who is working with us to complete the plan was not in a position to share this final draft.

Following discussion amongst Working Group members, it was decided that it was better to step back and allow time for full completion of the final version. We have now received a 'pre sign-off' version, which all Working Group members are currently working through, their comments will be sent through to Open Plan over the next few days.

It is hoped that the next meeting of the Working Group will take place on 28th March, at which point we should be able to finally sign off the completed version of the plan, then move on to the next stage in the process. Although it is obvious that there are still some changes to be made, it is clear that a great deal of work has been undertaken in the last few weeks and the current version is beginning to look really good.

The Working Group has also received and commented on the final version of the Design Code document, which has been compiled over the last few months by another consultant we are currently using: AECOM. This feedback has now been incorporated and a final version has been produced and circulated to the Working Group. This comprehensive document will form an important part of the overall

suite of documents for this process. It will sit alongside the Neighbourhood Plan itself and the Housing Needs Assessment, which was completed by AECOM on our behalf last year.

We are hoping to move to the consultation process with village residents in April. More information on this and the overall process/timescales will be produced following the next Working Group meeting. It is anticipated that this will include village meetings to explain the content and access to full copies of the finished draft plan.

A member of the Parish Council will be in attendance at each meeting to answer any questions you may have and to provide an opportunity for you to put forward your suggestions about the upkeep and enhancement of the Parish.

All residents are welcome, so please join us for coffee/tea/biscuits and a chat. It's a great opportunity for people to get together to talk about shared interests and to find out more about what's happening around the Parish.

THINK AGAIN

The Winthorpe Residents' A46 Consultation Group

National Highways has launched an additional consultation during March, to garner further views on updates to the proposals that have occurred since the statutory consultation last year. Their deadline for receiving these is 16th April.

Think Again will discuss the updates and respond. The main changes impacting this area relate to additional land requirements for Langford Hall access road, a design change at Winthorpe roundabout (A46/A1133) and an alteration to the proposed scheme boundary on Hargon Lane, to allow for connection with the proposed new walking and cycling route contained in the roundabout proposals. Details are contained on National Highways' web site.

There has also been some press coverage of the outcome of the original statutory consultation, which indicated positive feedback to the proposals. Full details have not been reported currently. Think Again will seek a meeting with National Highways and will continue to work on your behalf to ensure that we get the best possible solutions for Winthorpe.

Results of the further consultation will be included in next stages of the planning process, which we assume will take some time to complete. It is unlikely that this will be fully completed before 2025. Environmental and construction feasibility surveys continue to be undertaken.

Travelling by Train in 19th Century Winthorpe

Note from the editor: Winthorpe Village Scrapbook is an absolute delight and the result of an unbelievable amount of hard work, knowledge, research and expertise. It's very easy — as some of you know already — to lose yourself for hours in the pleasure of reading through its many articles. The article which follows is one I particularly enjoyed (and had to edit to fit into Focal Point).

It may come as a surprise to learn that the first Railway Station in Newark was the one we know today as Newark Castle, on the line between Nottingham and Lincoln. It will come, as more of a surprise to learn that originally there was a station of sorts at Winthorpe! The Midland Counties Railway planned the line in 1846, though by the time it was completed the company had amalgamated with others to form the Midland Railway (MR). The line between Nottingham and Lincoln was very hastily constructed, principally to "stake a claim" to the area and to fend off rival concerns, and initially was operated on a very haphazard basis. In fact there is no authorisation recorded in the Board minutes for the construction of a station at Winthorpe. Nevertheless it was included in "Bradshaw" for January 1847 (but not subsequently). Bradshaw was of course the famous Victorian independent timetable, which only ceased publication late in British Railways days.

Judging by what is known to have happened at Bleasby, people simply started flagging down the trains, or persuaded the guard to "drop them off."The numbers must have grown because arrangements were made at the Lincoln Station (subsequently known as Lincoln St. Marks) to accommodate the Winthorpe traffic. It will be appreciated that at that early date the Edmondson card ticket, used generally by railways before the computer age, had not been invented. Following stagecoach practice tickets were written by

hand using the counterfoils bound in a ledger. In order to keep the ledgers appropriately organised, the Midland Railway fitted out sets of drawers to hold them. These included the drawer for ledgers for tickets to "Winthorpe Newark Fiskerton" This drawer remained in existence until St. Marks was modernised in the 1960's, when the painted, varnished and lettered front was salvaged, eventually finding its way by an auction into my collection.

In researching the history of Winthorpe Station I was delighted to discover that at least three paper tickets survive. The National Railway Museum at York holds Second Class Ticket No. 155 from Newark to Winthorpe, whilst the "Roy F. Burrows Midland Collection Trust" holds a Third Class Ticket for the same journey. Its serial number is illegible but may be No. 145. A further copy is in private hands. Second Class was pink and Third Class Green. Each is 5.6 cm x 3.0 cm. in size.

So where was Winthorpe station? The probable intended location was Holme Lane at the level crossing. No platform or passenger buildings were ever sanctioned and, as stated earlier, the usual practice then was simply to stop at a convenient point and let passengers scramble in and out! There is a steel engraving of an accident there on 22nd October 1875. In fact there were two interlinked accidents. Due to floods, a train was derailed near Averham, a bridge having been washed away. The driver and fireman set off on foot to get help. However when the train did not arrive at Nottingham the Stationmaster there must have telegraphed to Lincoln because a breakdown train was sent westwards from Lincoln at 10.00pm. It consisted of a tender engine, truck and a carriage with 12 men.

Near "the gatehouse at Holme Lane, Winthorpe" said a contemporary report, the waters had also broken through and had washed out the ballast. The gatehouse keeper displayed a red light but the driver did not see this and his engine sank several feet into the flood debris before standing on end. The driver was knocked out and the gangers in the carriage were cut and bruised. All were taken to the gatehouse whilst medical help was sought. A signal box was later erected here to control the crossing and remained in service until 1914.

Recipe for April



For this month, here's an absolute classic, that's a real crowd pleaser too. If you are catering for a crowd, you can bake this in a standard roasting tin – just work up the quantities for a 6-egg mixture and bake it for 40-45 minutes.

Lemon drizzle traybake

Prep: about 5 minutes Bake: 35-40 minutes Makes: 16 - 24

For the sponge

225g unsalted butter, diced and softened

225g golden caster sugar

275g self-raising flour, sifted

2 tsp baking powder

For the drizzle

juice of 3 large or 4 medium lemons

150g granulated sugar

4 large eggs

50ml whole milk

zest of 3 large or 4 medium

unwaxed lemons

To decorate

3 tbsp preserving sugar

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 170° C/ 150° C fan/ 325° F/Gas 3. Grease and line the base and sides of a 30 x 23cm traybake tin with baking paper.
- 2. Beat together all the sponge ingredients in a stand mixer fitted with the beater, on a medium speed, for 2 minutes, until smooth.
- 3. Transfer the mixture to the prepared tin and smooth the top. Bake for 35-40 minutes, until springy to the touch and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Set aside to cool just a little while you quickly make the drizzle.
- 4. Stir together the lemon juice and sugar. Using a cocktail stick, poke holes all over the sponge and spoon the drizzle over. Leave the sponge to cool completely in the tin.
- 5. Sprinkle the traybake with preserving sugar, then remove it from the tin and cut it into 16 or 24, depending on what size pieces you want.

Tips: Make sure your traybake is still warm when you add the drizzle – that way, the syrup will soak into the sponge, leaving some sugar on top.

For a bit of a twist, you could add a heaped teaspoon of very finely chopped lemon verbena or lemon thyme leaves to the cake mix
