### Improving the appearance of our villages – send us your ideas

Residents of Winthorpe and Langford may be interested to know that the Parish Council now has a scheme in place with the County Council, whereby we can authorise minor work items to be carried out to improve the look of our public spaces. This is known as the Lengthsman Scheme and provides access to additional funding over the next 3 years, with immediate effect.

From sign cleaning to keeping footpaths clear and general de-cluttering, let us know what improvements you would like to see and we'll do our best to make it happen, or report it to the appropriate authority for action.

The Parish Council is also considering removing the hard surface where the skate park used to be (adjacent to the cricket field) and restoring this to a grassed area with a few trees planted.

We would value your views on this particular step as well. The basketball net and metal shelter would also be removed.

### A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from your Parish Councillors



I'm sure we all know that 2022 has been an eventful year for the Parish, with a lot of change and impacts for the Parish Council to understand and deal with.

We have the ongoing impacts of the new A46 bypass, which we will be dealing with for many years to come, both in design and construction. Your Parish Council are working with other groups within and outside the Parish to minimise the impact on our villages, whilst obtaining the best outcome once the road is finished. We have responded to the recent consultation and are in regular discussion with National Highways and other Parish Councils in the area.

As you will see from an article elsewhere in this edition of Focal Point, we are getting close to a finished version of the Parish Neighbourhood Plan, which we have been working on all year. This has taken a lot of effort and has involved working through lots of ideas and feedback from various focus groups and information from village meetings, surveys and direct feedback from residents.

In joining the Nottinghamshire CC/VIA Lengthman Scheme (please see the article on this elsewhere in this edition) we have taken control of maintaining elements of our environment. Over the next three years, we will be working together to further improve the appearance of our built heritage.

This year has seen many planning applications being put forward, most of which have been sensible ideas for improvements to property. Where this has been the case, the Parish Council has been supportive but has also commented on those few applications which we felt were not appropriate or needed to make some changes.

In our bid to improve the overall environment, we are now working with Sherwood Forest Trust to look at potential tree planting options. As a result, we are considering a tree line of small height trees along the Jubilee Walk and 'parkland style' planting on some or all of the Jubilee Field. We are also looking at what work we need to carry out on the bank next to the Community Centre and this may include some tree planting and hedging. The Sherwood Forest Trust is looking for other options, so if you have any ideas where we could make this work, then please let me know at: paul@bridgfordss.co.uk.

We launched the Parish Twitter site earlier this year, which has so far been very successful; the number of our followers is continuing to increase, if a little slowly. As anybody who uses Twitter regularly will know, it is a very easy and quick way to get up to date information such as road works/traffic problems and what's generally happening around the parish. I know to some it might seem a little daunting, but it is very simple to set up an account and when you do you can find your parish account here: https://twitter.com/WithParish

We are still looking to fully update the Village Website and had hoped to have this complete before Christmas, but because of lots of other work recently we will be working on this in the early part of the 2023. So, if you have any ideas of how we could improve the site, there is still time to let us have your ideas.

Finally, we would just like to thank our new Focal Point Editor, Julie Hill: firstly, for taking on the role earlier this year and secondly for taking the magazine to a new level. I hope that you will have noticed some of the changes Julie has made and, in particular, the increased amount of advertising, which of course makes Focal Point more viable for the future.

### Winthorpe with Langford Neighbourhood Plan 2023 – 2033 Progress Update

Well, after a lot of hard work over the last two years or so, the draft version of the Winthorpe with Langford Neighbourhood Plan is coming together and is beginning to look really good. By the time you read this edition of Focal

Point, the Working Group members should have copies of the first version so that they can then work through the detail over the festive season and make any changes or additions necessary to the content.

At the last meeting of the full Working Group on 6<sup>th</sup> December, we worked through the plan and agreed timescales for completion. If everything goes according to plan, we should be able to share the final draft version with all residents early in 2023. We will then explain the content in more detail and get feedback by holding village meetings at the Community Centre in February, so look out for dates on Twitter, The Village Website and in the next edition of Focal Point. This consultation process will last for 6 weeks, which will allow time for all residents to let us have comments before a final version is then submitted to Newark and Sherwood DC.


As discussed in the last Focal Point, we have had a range of professional photographs taken of the parish; these are now available for us to make use of in the Neighbourhood Plan, Village Website and other social media outlets we use.

A further draft of the Design Codes document is currently being compiled by our consultant (AECOM). Once complete, this will identify building designs and styles of property across the Parish. This work will feed into the Plan, helping to ensure that the style and identity of the Parish is maintained in the future. Once this work is complete and agreed, it will form part of a suite of documents to support the plan.

I also just want to thank all those people in the parish who have worked together to get us to where we are now: an almost finished Plan. Without the hard work and determination of over 40 residents, we would not be in the position we are today. This Plan is very important for the future of Winthorpe and Langford villages, as will become clear in future years.

Finally, I thought some of you might find it useful to have a copy of the Winthorpe Conservation Area to hand. As you know from previous editions of Focal Point, we are working on putting forward some possible changes to the extent of the area and we would still value your thoughts.

### Johnny Johnson, Local Hero born 25<sup>th</sup> November 1921, died 7<sup>th</sup> December 2022



George Leonard Johnson was born in Hameringham in East Lindsey, the youngest of six children; when he was very young the family moved to Langford, which was not uncommon, his father being an agricultural labourer. The Johnson family lived in a tied cottage in Langford. Sadly, George's mother died when he was only three years old.

By all accounts, his father was violent and abusive, so it's not surprising that George (Johnny) did not have a good relationship with him. After the death of their mother, Johnny's eldest sister Lena, who had been in

service and living away from home, moved back to Langford and Johnny's home life improved to some extent. Johnny attended Winthorpe Primary School until the age of eleven; the school's headmistress and the wife of the local squire got their heads together to rescue Johnny from his difficult home life and helped to secure a place for him at Lord Wandsworth College in Hampshire, which was at that time being run by a charity catering for the children of agricultural families who had lost one or both parents.

After leaving full-time education in 1939, Johnny worked for six months as a park keeper in Basingstoke, before volunteering to join the RAF in June 1940, applying to become a navigator. He was, however, selected for pilot training and eventually joined up in November 1940. After a few adjustments of role, and a training spell in the USA, Johnny returned to the UK in 1942 and was posted to Bomber Command 97 Squadron at Woodhall Spa, as a spare gunner.

Selected for the legendary 1943 Dambusters raid, Johnny began his training for the mission immediately after his honeymoon. He was one of the crews assigned to attack the Sorpe Dam and his crew was the only one of five which made it as far as the dam itself. Following the raid, he was honoured with the Distinguished Flying Medal. After 18 more operations with 617 Squadron, in

1944 he reluctantly accepted the post of bombing instructor at RAF Scampton, as his wife was about to give birth to their first child.

Johnny spent the rest of the war training other young airmen of Bomber Command, going on to be a fully qualified navigator and serving the RAF as an instructor until his retirement in 1962, having reached the rank of Squadron Leader.

Still in his forties, Johnny retrained once more as a teacher, working in various primary schools and adult education, including Rampton Hospital.

Once he had taken full retirement, Johnny and his wife decamped to Devon where he became involved in local politics and became a Conservative councillor and chair of the constituency party. But he never lost touch with Lincolnshire and was active in 617 Squadron reunions and many of the wider activities of Bomber Command.

In later years, Johnny received recognition for his campaigning to improve resources for mental health, and for his work for charitable causes. He received an MBE from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, an honorary doctorate from Lincoln University and enjoyed a memorial flight over Derwent Dam (where the Dambusters had trained in low flying) in the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight Lancaster Bomber.

From humble beginnings, Johnny always remained humble and would not have classed himself as a hero. We in our small area of the three villages of

Winthorpe, Langord and Holme may not have had him for long, but for us he will surely always be regarded as a local hero.
