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

#### NOTES FROM THE EDITOR

"MARCH!" said the Queen, in her low sweet voice. Even King Winter must obey the Fairy Queen's orders. And out went the flowers to bloom in the gardens and the fields, in spite of the fact that the rain was still pouring, and the wind roaring loudly, and hailstones still lay on the paths. The Queen had given marching orders to Winter.

Down the garden came a little girl.

"Hooray!" she said. "My bulbs are out already. Spring's here!" And she did a little dance on the wet path.

Above are a few sentences, which I have copied faithfully from my father's bedtime story book, passed on to me when I was a little girl. Published in 1937, it has one story per page per day. I imagined my grandmother reading these stories to the toddler who grew up to be my dad; I was intrigued by footnotes such as: "This is Primrose Day" and "This is Oak-apple Day." As I saw that my Dad had written and made little drawings on some pages, in his child-like hand, I did likewise. It is one of my most treasured possessions and I was thrilled when, last year, it was rebound professionally, with painstaking care. This 85 year-old children's story book is part of my family history; I have read some of the stories to my own children, though I'm not certain that they loved them as much as I did, and still do. Even though a few of January's and December's pages are long gone, along with the original cover, I would never part with it.

History is about people and families and communities. Attitudes and values may change over time but there is a continuity to social history, just as there is continuity in nature and the seasonal cycle. Winter will come to an end and spring will follow, bringing colour and new life with it. We will welcome the warmer days, shorter nights, birds building their nests, soft tree blossom and cheerful daffodils.

I have to admit that when I started fundraising for a defibrillator to service Pocklington Crescent, Branston Close and Hargon Lane I found it quite daunting; and yet, even before my appeal for raffle prizes appeared in last month's Focal Point, items started being delivered to my door.

Thanks to a very generous donation given by Alexander and Aggi Smith, we can now proceed with the purchase of a defibrillator and cabinet for our side of the village. Their kind gesture is very much appreciated, as was every donation and help we have received. As the good book says "Ask and you shall receive", so I asked and you all delivered. Thank you.

#### The coffee morning

All I can say is **WOW** and thank you so very much. The Village Hall was decked out in all its splendour and was full to capacity, with standing room only. The cake table was heaving with all kinds of lovely cakes and delicious treats to tickle your palate. I couldn't have managed the event without my dream team of helpers, so a huge thank you to every one of them. The coffee morning itself raise £269.00, with an additional £61.30 in donations from people who were unable to attend, making a grand total of £330.30.

#### Winthorpe Garden Club

At our meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> February, members were happy to welcome back Janette Merilion, on her third visit to our club. Janette, a well known horticultural lecturer, historian and garden designer has appeared on both Radio and TV broadcasts.

In her talk, which was entitled 'Unexpected Tales of Plants and Gardens', Janette spoke with clarity and a deep knowledge about the strange tales of many plants and large gardens, during her wonderful slide show. The two which stood out for me were the tale about Mary, the mother of Jesus, drying his clothes over highly aromatic Rosemary bushes; also the story about the Chatsworth Cascade. Apparently, the steps are of different heights, thus giving a varied sound of the falling water. Janette's final slide was a snowdrop: Galanthus 'Merlin. Not quite her name sake, but almost. It was a most enjoyable evening.

Our next meeting will be held in the Community Centre on **Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> March at 7.30pm**. The guest speaker will be Don Witton, whose talk is entitled 'A Calendar of Colour.' This, I am sure, will be an extremely interesting meeting. A prolific grower of Euphorbias, Don is the holder of a Plant Heritage National Collection of Euphorbias.

#### Euphorbia facts to whet your appetite

- The genus *Euphorbia*, which makes up the greatest proportion of the family *Euphorbiaceae*, is the second largest plant genus in the world.
- Euphorbia species can be found growing on every continent except Antarctica.
- Of the hardy leafy perennials that we grow in our gardens, most come from Europe, the Middle East and temperate Asia including the Himalaya region.
- Many are evergreen and provide excellent foliage colour and interest throughout the winter.

#### **Chatsworth House Cascade**

The original cascade, designed by Monsieur Grillet, a French hydraulics engineer with experience in decorative waterworks for Louis XIV of France, took two years to build and was completed in 1696. It was a shorter and, in some ways, a more complicated affair than the Cascade which exists today.

The Cascade House was built at its summit, to designs by Thomas Archer. The remodelling was largely completed by 1708, and work on the supply pond, the Cascade Pond, which lies a little higher up the hill, continued until 1712. The new Cascade was nearly twice the length and substantially wider than the original.

The carvings in the Cascade House were carried out by Samuel Watson and Henri Nadauld. The building continued the established tradition of using water in amusing ways, to surprise and delight visitors, one of whom in 1725 reported how jets within the building 'throw up several stream and wett people' (the spouts in the floor are still there).

#### Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council, on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> February, was well attended by councillors, as well as District Councillors Linda Dales and Emma Davies and three residents.

We are continuing to compile thoughts from residents about improvements you would like to see in the Parish; we now have a register of ideas, which we will be working through over the next few years. We have already begun to prioritise some of your suggestions and over the next few months you will see a variety of small changes being undertaken. We have taken on board comments about maintaining the rural charm of the villages and rest assured that the improvements will not affect the feel or style of the Parish.

As mentioned in previous editions of Focal Point, we are currently seeking funding for a small number of projects in Winthorpe; these include improvements to the Village Green, Jubilee Field and the bank alongside the Community Centre down to the Fleet. Assuming that we obtain funding, these initiatives will be underway this year – we will keep you posted on developments via Focal Point, Twitter and the village website. For more information or to pass on your ideas, why not join us at the 'Warm Spaces' Tuesday get-together. Many thanks to those of you who have commented or suggested ideas: this has been really helpful to all of us at the Parish Council.

There is no specific update on Neighbourhood Plan progress this month, as we have been waiting for our consultant, 'Open Plan', to complete the final draft of the plan. We are expecting this to be available in early March; at that point we will share with you its contents and in the next edition of Focal Point we will share with you how we intend to implement it.

In Planning News, there have been three applications in the last month which the Parish Council as statutory consultees have considered as follows:

43a Gainsborough Road: proposal for a room above an existing garage for use as annexe accommodation to the existing house. The Parish Council felt that it would overshadow Wren Cottage (next door), blocking light and visibility at the property. Furthermore, it would be visible from Gainsborough Road and is of course within the Conservation Area. We have submitted our objection.

ATM ESSO Filling Station on the A46: proposal for the installation of a 7m high 'Totem Pole' sign adjacent to the A46 dual carriageway. Given the nature and location of the site the Parish Council had no objection.

The Lord Nelson, Winthorpe: change of use from existing staff accommodation (mainly on the first floor) to letting rooms with ensuite facilities, 4 bedrooms in total. Not only did the Parish Council have no objections, but also felt that the plans for the work to be undertaken complement the building and will bring substantial advantages for both the pub and residents of the village.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place in the Village Hall on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> March. In the meantime, if you have any questions, comments or suggestions, please contact me: paul@bridgfordss.co.uk

National Highways confirmed that they are considering all responses to the consultation which closed in December; they will update their planned proposals to include this feedback before proceeding to the next stage of the planning process. We will request a

meeting with them once this update is available and will work on your behalf to continue to ensure we get the best possible solutions for Winthorpe. The next stages of the planning process will take some time to complete; it is unlikely that the process will be fully completed before 2025. Environmental and construction feasibility surveys continue to be undertaken by National Highways in the area.

#### **Recipe for March: Buttered leeks**



March 1<sup>st</sup> is St David's Day, the national day of Wales. So wear your daffodil and eat your leeks to celebrate!

At its best from November through to April, and especially during the coldest months of the year, the British leek is a fantastically versatile vegetable that adds flavour and bite. It's packed

with nutrients and anti-oxidants that will help stave off winter colds. 

A great side dish – with a tasty pie? With a roast dinner?

Prep and cooking time: 35 mins approx

#### **Ingredients**

1.8kg leeks, trimmed50g butter, plus extra for servingThyme leaves, for garnish

#### Method

- 1. The day before you want to serve this dish, cut the leeks from top to root and wash thoroughly under cold running water. Thinly slice them on the diagonal and put them into plastic bags and chill until ready to cook.
- 2. To serve, put a large pan over a medium heat, add the butter and let it melt over the base of the pan. Add the leeks and plenty of seasoning and stir to coat in the butter. Turn the heat down to low, cover the pan and cook the leeks gently for about 15 minutes, stirring halfway through, until they are tender. Serve with extra butter and a sprinkling of thyme leaves.

#### Why not?

Fry off small pieces of lean bacon, mix with the buttered leeks, then turn into an ovenproof dish. Top with grated cheese and place into a hot oven until the cheese is bubbling and golden. Delicious!

To get you started the club is conducting a full beginners training course in the evenings starting from Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> April for Adults and youngsters aged 10 to 17 years. (fees apply) All boats and buoyancy aids will be provided)

The course lasts for 10 weeks ending on 4<sup>th</sup> July plus one Saturday on 3<sup>rd</sup> June lasting all day 9.0am – 4.0pm.

Course fees are:- £200 for adults and £100 for 10 + 17 year olds.

(a 10% discount is offered to club members) The fee covers all tuition, use of club boats and safety equipment (buoyancy aids) It includes a RYA Logbook and Certificate. All sessions will be attended by a Safety boat & crew.

Tuition is given by qualified club Sailing Instructors aided by other members who are volunteers and the fees go to support GSC's training facilities.

#### Winthorpe Hall - Part 3

#### The War Years, More Sales and a Care Home

After the Hall and its Estate went to Auction in 1906, the successful bidder for the main house was Mr J.G. Branston of the Grange, Winthorpe; yet again ownership was short lived and it was sold again to Mrs Dugdale of Sezincote, Moreton in the Marsh, Glos. for her daughter Evelyn, at the time of her marriage to Capt. Walter Need of Mansfield Woodhouse, Notts. Therefore in 1907, Winthorpe Hall became the property of Capt. J.W. and Mrs. Need.



The couple gave their permission for the Village Hall (still part of the estate at that time) to be used for the same public use as before their acquisition.

"In its early years, the village hall was used for all kinds of public meetings, and it served as a library and men's reading room, containing books loaned by Mr. Duncombe. In 1907, when all his property in the village was sold, Mr. Duncombe presented these books to the Rector for use in the parish together with a harmonium, chessmen, draughts, etc."


However, some differences arose between the rector and Captain Need, which resulted in the room being closed to all village activities for a time.

Between the wars the Village Hall continued to be used for community activities until 1938, when Captain Need presented it to the village.

Unfortunately, Evelyn Need passed away in 1936, having suffered from pneumonia. As there were no heirs and Capt. Need could not support the running of the Hall and its estate, it reverted to the Dugdale family, who put it on the market once again. Captain Need went to live in Collingham.

With the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939, the unsold Hall was commandeered by the government for the British Army. They were most respectful of the property's valuable fixtures and décor, covering the floors and other items at risk. They built latrines and service blocks in the grounds (some of which still stand) to preserve the Hall's facilities. Even the main staircase was closed off for fear of damaging it. The troops stationed there also took care of the grounds and gardens, and in the summer months Garden Concert Parties were held by the soldiers and attended by villagers.

When the army vacated the Hall in 1946, it was sold to Mr T.W. Pears for his daughters and was let out in rooms until 1972. Notably, one of its residents at that time was local celebrity doll maker Vina Cooke, who went on to open a Doll Museum in Cromwell. At one time, there were plans to turn it into seven quality apartments / flats at a cost of £73,000; the project started in October 1975 but was never completed. The Hall next came onto the market in 1980; this time the buyer was a Mr. L. Milner, who



undertook a three-year restoration of the building, including the removal of the top storey, thus returning it to Pocklington's original design. Following this property development project, the house was for sale again in 1980, with a price tag of £150,000. It attracted several interested parties, the final deal being done with Chart, Foulks Lynch Ltd of London, who ran residential

training courses in Law & Accountancy. They applied for planning permission to add extra buildings in July 1984, to give greater capacity and a conference centre, but made few alterations before they reconsidered and decided to put the Hall up for sale yet again.

In July 1987, Mr & Mrs Robert & Francesca Pountney of Newark purchased the Grade 2\* property for approximately £175,000 and in May 1988 opened it as a Nursing Care Home for 35 residents. After overcoming many planning obstacles, they were able to make alterations, allowing them to create an extension with 13 en-suite rooms and 2 small lounges. This meant that the home could now offer both Residential Care and Nursing Care services and accommodation. The home was rated Grade 5, of which there are very few in the country.



Managed by Francesca Pountney, Winthorpe Hall Residential Care Home continued successfully until eventually, for personal reasons, Mr & Mrs Pountney took the difficult decision to close it in August 2018.

As of today (2023), they still own and maintain the property, devoting much of their time to ensuring that the Hall stays in the best possible state of preservation for many years and generations to come. They have had most of

the masonry cleaned and have completed a full restoration the north face of the hall, removing decades of grime and decay, bringing everything back to its original Mansfield stone colour. (See before & after photos).

Once they were visited by a descendant of Roger Pocklington. He was shown around his ancestral home by the Pountneys, and was so impressed with the manner in which they had restored and maintained the place that he gave them a copy of his poetry book. He returned a few days and later with a poem that he'd written especially for them.

## Postscript - The 1906 Sale of the estate

Since the publication of Part 2 of this article (August 2022), Mrs Kate Warren has given me some details about their house, 'The Laurels'



which featured in the 1906 Sale Sheet. Spurred on by her inquisitive grand-daughter, asking "Who built this house?" and "Can you remember it Gran?" Kate delved into the beautifully ink-scripted deed documents and made up a little book for her to read. The rear of the house was originally known as Preston's Farm before the Hall Estate took them over, the bay fronts were added in 1873 and the now larger building was divided into two, with her neighbour retaining the original staircase. The 1906 seller was Digby Bayard Willoughby. They were purchased by Edmund Rowbottom & Eliza Ward who had collaborated in the bidding to ensure that no-one else would get them.
