## **Planning for Remembrance Sunday 2024**

2024 marks 110 years since the outbreak of World War I and 80 years since D Day in World War II.

Have you noticed the knitted characters that have been appearing on the top of the post box at the junction of Gainsborough Road and Woodlands, in Winthorpe? These delightful creations have inspired some of us to want to do something a bit more special for Remembrance Sunday this year. We are aiming to erect a knitted poppy arch over the entrance to All Saints Church, Winthorpe. This is a call out for anyone who can knit or crochet, and to anyone who has any red, black or green wool going spare, which would be much appreciated. The pattern is very simple and several people have already offered to help. If anyone would like a copy, please let me know. Even though I don't know exactly how many poppies we require, the more we can get the better and the more we can do with them.

Additionally, as Winthorpe does not have a war memorial, we would like to see a couple of life sized silhouette soldiers (Tommies), one male and one female, erected in the village as a memorial. These cost £175.00 each, making a total of £350.00. If we can raise the money, the Parish Council have agreed to purchase these on our behalf, which reduces the cost considerably, as no VAT would be payable. Thanks to the generosity of some residents of the village, so far we have been promised donations totalling £210. If anyone else would like to offer a donation, this can be given either to myself at 21 Pocklington Crescent, or to the Parish Council.

#### WINTHORPE GARDEN CLUB

Steve Lovell is a favourite with our club. His presentation this time was 'Cuba – a time to Salsa'. He began with a brief history of the island, going back as far as 1492 when Christopher Columbus first landed there. I associate Cuba with Fidel Castro, Che Guevara, Batista plus of course old American cars. A defining moment in Cuba's history came in 1961 with a battle which came to be known as the battle of Bay of Pigs. As an aside, Steve showed us a photo of a tank, allegedly fired by Fidel Castro, to sink an American naval vessel.

In more recent times Steve told us that the citizens, though poor, seemed happy with music, singing and dancing wherever he went. Based in Havana, he showed us many different styles of architecture, some modern but others much older and full of character such as the small bar frequented by Ernest Hemingway and a house owned by Frank Sinatra.

Steve also showed photos of a number of birds he saw, many indigenous, such as Palm Warbler, Palm Swift, Magnolia Warbler and Green Heron. Best of all was Cuba's national bird, the tocororo, which has the same colours as the Cuban flag. Viewing it through a telescope, he became aware of excited locals queuing behind him for a chance to get a close look at this special bird, which they had never seen before.

At our next meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> March, Doug Stewart, who is a professional horticulturalist and describes himself as also being a plant enthusiast and weekend adventurer, will give a talk entitled 'Easy Gardening for Tired Joints'.

Two trips are planned for this summer. The first of these is a two day visit (with overnight stay) on 26<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> June to Bressingham Gardens & Old Rectory Gardens in Norfolk. Details of the hotel and the cost will be finalised in March and will be determined by the number of people going; the second outing is a day trip to RHS Harlow Carr near Harrogate on 17<sup>th</sup> July. 





# Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

The meeting of the Parish Council in the Village Hall on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> February was attended by Parish Councillors and District Councillor, Linda Dales.

This meeting was full of discussion and interesting debate around what's happening in and around Winthorpe and

Langford; as it's not possible to cover everything in this article, for all information on what was discussed, please look at the Parish Council section of the village website, where notes from each meeting are posted a couple of weeks or so after the meeting.

The big step forward this month was the tremendous community effort for the tree planting event, which took place on Jubilee Meadow on 15<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> February. During these two tree planting sessions, involving well over 30 people from our community, we managed to plant more than two hundred trees. The intention is to provide a more interesting walking area for all, together with improving the natural environment and helping to improve the land drainage on the meadow.



Helpers over the two days included residents planting trees, fetching and carrying materials and importantly those in the kitchen at the community centre, producing teas, coffees and bacon butties all day, much needed refreshments!

Now that the first phase of the work

is completed, we move on to future projects. In March we will begin the major work to transform the Coronation Bank behind the Community Centre. This will involve a raised walkway into the bank from the bridge over The Fleet, which will provide safe access to the site in all weathers. Once this is complete we will then tidy the site, including weeding, removal of rubbish/fallen debris etc.



So, there will be lots of work for everybody to get involved in; just contact me or Miles Harriman to let us know how you would like to get involved: miles.harriman@hotmail.com or paul@bridgfordss.co.uk

Over the next few months, we will be developing a 'Nature Walk' in conjunction with the school which will, when finished, meander through the trees between Jubilee Meadow and the Cricket Field. This will include the installation of bug hotels, nesting boxes for birds and bats, and hedgehog houses. The aim is to improve the ecology of the area, whilst at the same time to use it as a learning aid. We are hoping that the boxes etc will be constructed by Collingham 'Men in Sheds' to keep it local.

We will also be installing picnic benches on Jubilee Meadow near the 'old skate park' and later in the year the old skate park will be revamped, including re-painting and re-purposing the tarmacked area. In addition, two mature trees will be purchased to mark the death of the late Queen Elizabeth II and the coronation of King Charles III. Finally, we have obtained a range of fruit trees, which we will be planting soon, creating a 'Community Orchard'.

In other news, we have met with the CEO of Newark Showground and are pleased to let you know that they are in active discussions with Lindum Construction to provide a new direct access into the showground site from the A17. This forms part of the proposed development of a section of the showground site between the A46 and the A17, for which Lindum Construction have recently applied for planning permission. If this goes ahead, then it will substantially help alleviate the traffic issues which we all experience on certain show days. We will keep you informed of progress on this.

We have held discussions with Debbie Darby, our County Councillor, covering a range of issues, which are currently a problem in and around the parish, for which the County Council are responsible. These include: filling in more potholes, repairing Drove Lane and properly programmed maintenance visits to sweep the roads and clear drainage gullies.

Citizens Advice is campaigning to increase awareness of your rights when shopping online. New research from Citizens Advice has found that shoppers were seven times more likely to have an issue with an online purchase compared to those made in store. We are sharing our top tips for shopping online confidently.

## **Delivery Problems:**

It is the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. Check the delivery address you gave the seller and contact them to ask where your order is. If they claim to have delivered it, or don't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances.

#### **Defective Goods:**

If something's gone wrong with an item you've bought, you might be entitled to a refund, repair or replacement. You have legal rights if the item is:

- Broken or damaged (not satisfactory quality)
- Unusable (not fit for purpose)
- Not what was advertised or doesn't't match the seller's description.

# What if I change my mind?

- If you buy in store, you don't have a legal right to return goods just because you've changed your mind. Many shops have their own policies which allow this, though time limits can vary.
- If you buy online, you usually have a right to cancel, known as a cooling-off period, although there are exemptions, including bespoke or personalized goods, and computer software where the seal is broken.

# Pay Safe:

- Payment by card gives you have another form of protection if there's a problem. You may be able to make a chargeback or a Section 75 claim to your card provider.
- Be cautious if you're ask to pay in an unusual way such as in iTunes vouchers, cryptocurrency or via bank transfer, as any of these could be a sign of a scam.

# **Returning items:**

Get proof of your return: a receipt or proof of postage. If you pay for return postage, check that the service you use covers the value of the goods. Using a service that includes tracking means you can prove when a trader received your return.

**British Summer Time: Did You Know?** 

In the summers of 1941 to 1945 Britain was two hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time and operating on *British Double Summer Time* (BDST). To bring this about, the clocks were not put back by an hour at the end of summer in 1940 (BST having started early, on 25<sup>th</sup> February 1940). In subsequent years, clocks continued to be advanced by one hour each spring and put back by an hour each autumn. On 15<sup>th</sup> July 1945, the clocks were put back by an hour, so British Double Summer Time reverted to British Summer Time; the clocks were put back by an additional hour on 7<sup>th</sup> October 1945, so British Summer Time reverted to Greenwich Mean Time for the winter of 1945.

As promised, here is the recipe for the 'starter' course of Julie and Michael's indulgent dinner menu for St. Valentine's Day, as presented to WAWA at the meeting in February.

Recipe created by **Richard James, Head Chef at The Quarterdeck at The Nare Hotel, Cornwall**, using sustainable diver-caught scallops

## Scallops with pea puree & crispy Pancetta

# Ingredients

To serve 2:

6 shelled fresh scallops
4 slices of Pancetta
400g of frozen peas
1 diced shallot
Half a clove of garlic, chopped
250ml of double cream
125ml of milk
2 teaspoons of butter



Dash of lemon juice Salt and pepper to taste Salad leaves to garnish

#### Method:

Pre-heat the oven to 180'C.

Sweat the shallots and garlic in 1 teaspoon of butter, add the milk and the cream and bring to the boil. Pop in the peas just to defrost. Once the peas are soft, liquidize the mixture adding salt and pepper to taste.

Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper and lay out the Pancetta slices. Add another sheet of greaseproof paper on top of the Pancetta and place a second baking tray over the top to keep the slices flat whilst cooking. Bake for 8-10 minutes until crispy and coloured. Leave to cool.

Fry the scallops in a hot, non-stick pan for approximately 30 seconds each side, adding a teaspoon of butter and a squeeze of lemon juice at the last moment.

Spoon some of the pea puree onto the centre of a warm plate, arranging 3 scallops within that. Add 2 slices of Pancetta and a sprinkling of salad leaves to garnish.
