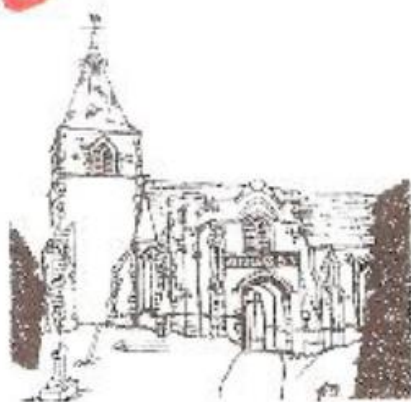
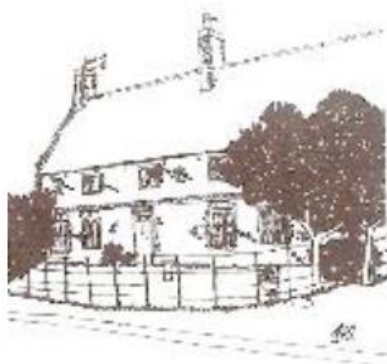

NOTES FROM THE EDITOR

The mellow month of September is upon us, that golden bridge between summer and autumn, although this year I'm not so sure that the transition will be as noticeable as I feel it should be. We seem to have had mostly rain or at best the occasional warm, sunny day in July and August, leaving many of us wondering where the summer disappeared to. However, I have high hopes for September and even the Met. Office cautiously agrees with me, saying that temperatures "may become slightly above-average approaching the middle of the month." Let's hope so!

It is fitting that we pay tribute to Des Aldridge and John Nelson in this edition of Focal Point. Thank you, Jane Aldridge and Pat Finn, for sharing your thoughts and memories in such a moving, sincere way.

At our next meeting on 6th September at the Lord Nelson, we will be reviewing *A Slow Burning Fire* by Paula Hawkins. The Book Club is open to all WI members.

Several WI members went to the 80s night at the Lord Nelson "for an hour or so, to show our faces, have and drink and then come home." Luckily, we all had a late night pass and enjoyed the evening so much that we stayed until the very end and didn't get home until midnight – some even managed a dance or two!

On 8th August, lunch at The Bromley Arms in Fiskerton was followed by an escorted visit around the grounds of Waxwings and Goldcrest Environmental Garden in Bestwood Village. These privately owned gardens for wildlife cover six acres. The visit was rounded off with tea and cake.

Winthorpe with Langford Parish Council

Although the Parish Council does not hold meetings in August, the work goes on and all Parish Councillors keep regular contact with each other on Parish issues through e-mail and WhatsApp.

A few weeks ago, during a day of windy weather, we lost one tree, and a large branch from another, at two locations in Winthorpe. Some of you may have noticed the tree at the side of The Fleet, which is currently resting against the building at the back of The Lord Nelson; this is currently being dealt with by the owners of the pub. The second damaged tree lost a large branch from a garden on Woodlands and fell across The Fleet, landing on Jubilee Field. This has now been removed by contractors working on behalf of the homeowners; our thanks to them for sorting this out so promptly.

Over recent months, several residents have contacted us about dog walking not being allowed on the community centre field. Historically, we have prevented dog exercising on this field, mainly because the field was used by a junior football team many years ago. Following discussions, we have decided to free up this area for dog walkers and will remove the 'no dogs' signs from the area. We ask all dog owners to keep to the field and away from the children's play area and of course to ensure that any mess is cleared up and put in the bins provided.

We have worked with The Sherwood Forest Trust to re-design the tree planting scheme on Jubilee Field to incorporate a full-size senior football pitch. The design ensures and maintains good open spaces for walking and dog exercising, whilst allowing for the introduction of a wide range of indigenous tree species, creating more of a 'parkland' style to the field, rather than the open feel of the field at the moment. We fully understand that the area is used by residents for a wide range of reasons, so we'd like your opinions before proceeding further. Leaflets will be sent to all residents in the next few days, with more information and a plan of what the revised area could look like, for your comments.

We are currently seeking funding for improvements to the old skatepark area between The Jubilee Field and The Cricket Club Field. Ideas for this are still in the early stages but if successful will include new play equipment and picnic style benches. We will ensure that we keep you updated and give you the opportunity to get involved.

Since a resident of Langford reported the condition of the overgrown path between Langford and Winthorpe, this has been added to the list of issues to raise with Nottinghamshire County Council

As mentioned in the last edition of Focal Point, we now have specific responsibilities identified for all Parish Councillors and some other residents. Note from the editor: roadworks affecting our villages during September

By now, I'm sure we're all aware of the roadworks on the A46 Northbound. These will continue for the next few weeks and will include overnight closures of the A46 towards Lincoln and, at various points, overnight closures of the Showground Roundabout. Residents are advised to keep an eye on the information signs on the A1133 for updates, as some of the information stated in the letter, sent out a while ago, seems to be out of date – if you got a letter (I didn't receive mine).

Recently, I contacted our local councillors and our MP, inviting all of them to contribute articles, from time to time, to Focal Point. I have emphasised to them that their contributions should not be partisan and should avoid party politics, though I am happy to accept articles which focus on issues which are important to the residents of Winthorpe, Langford and Holme. However, I have also pointed out that Focal Point aims to be not only informative but also a celebration of life in our three villages.

Councillor Linda Dales has contributed the article from the Collingham Medical Centre Patient Participation Group; our MP, Robert Jenrick, has written the following article. I hope that readers of Focal Point will agree with me that hearing from our local representatives in this way strengthens their connection to us; I feel very positive about this new feature of Focal Point.

Thank you for inviting me – a few words from Robert Jenrick MP

It's a pleasure to be asked to pen an occasional column for this title. As the local member of Parliament, I've always enjoyed spending time with and working with residents and parish councils from the lovely villages of Winthorpe, Langford, and Holme. In fact, when I first came to Newark (over a decade ago), I had my first local pint at the Lord Nelson in Winthorpe, being taken there by the Nottinghamshire NFU! More have followed here and elsewhere!

My team and I are always here to help you. Whether you need help getting a public service to deliver for you, want to start a business or community initiative, or voice your views on national issues or legislation that Parliament is considering, we are here for you. We pride ourselves on fighting hard for our constituents and our communities, and not giving up; and we support and enable practical action to improve lives.

My recent reporting back leaflet – which should now be arriving in your letter boxes – details some of my work as your local MP over the past two years, across the whole constituency.

Latterly, the main local issue which I've worked on with residents of Winthorpe, Langford, and Holme, has been the forthcoming dualling of the A46. This transformative project is undoubtedly in the interest of the greater good of the Newark area – at over £400million, I like to say it is the biggest investment in Newark since the castle was built! It should massively improve the perennial issue of traffic in and around town, increase business investment and quality of life. It is for all those reasons that I've been campaigning to achieve the dualling. However, it undoubtedly has a negative impact, and some very severe consequences, on many residents from the Winthorpe, Langford, and Holme villages. I'm acutely aware of that.

I've worked with the Think Again group and others to find ways to mitigate these challenges, as far as is reasonably practical. I am grateful to them for the work they have done on behalf of the local villages and the manner in which they've conducted themselves. To be as thoughtful, pragmatic, and respectful as they have been, is rare in such challenging circumstances and has yielded some positive results, including already achieving (together) an improvement in the route of the road. National Highways held a roadshow in the car park of the Lord Nelson and we've had numerous meetings at which issues have been worked through, some to the satisfaction of residents, some not so much.

We are now at the end of the consultation and the preferred route ('Option 2 Modified') has been laid out, which incorporates some of the suggestions from residents. I look forward to continuing to work together to see if further improvements can be achieved; particularly in ensuring that there is extensive and very high-quality landscaping, such as tree planting and bunds, to mitigate noise pollution and to guarantee that it is as visually attractive as is possible in the circumstances, and exploring whether properties seriously affected get properly compensated.

There is clearly still a lot of work to do, and I am committed to hearing any concerns you have and trying to help work with you on them. Please be in touch with my office to raise any further concerns you have or regarding any other issues we can assist you with – or to meet up.

THINK AGAIN

The Winthorpe Residents' A46 Consultation Group

The core working group of Think Again met with National Highways on 9th August. The focus of the meeting was to agree a Statement of Common Ground. As reported previously, this statement reflects the agreements reached and

identifies the issues outstanding and still to be resolved. The meeting was helpful in understanding the latest position on outstanding issues with National Highways.

National Highways shared with Think Again their latest plans for the scheme, following the feedback from the Statutory and Targeted Consultations. Although these have not changed the general layout of the scheme, which was presented as part of the Targeted Consultation back in March 2023, the plans do now show additional detail on many aspects of the design. These include noise mitigation fencing, in conjunction with earthwork bunding for noise mitigation; revised active travel (walking and cycling) routes; drainage and water attenuation; and vegetation and planting along the route. These plans will not be shared with the public until the Development Consent Order is published in the autumn.

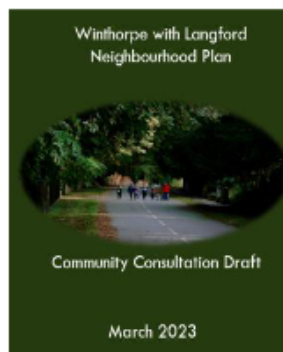

Winthorpe with Langford Neighbourhood Plan - Update

At the last meeting of the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group on 25th July the focus was on discussion of feedback received during the consultation process earlier this year and discussion/agreement of what changes should be made to the draft document. We also considered the next steps in the process and in particular our interaction with Newark & Sherwood District Council and how we can smooth the process as much as possible.



Following the meeting of the Working Group, we agreed on two other lines of discussion. The first will be an on-line discussion with Adrian Allenbury, our contact in Newark & Sherwood DC Planning, to work through the comments which they have made on the draft document so far. Fortunately, we believe that these are generally very positive and that we can adapt the plan to accommodate their thoughts. The second discussion will be with a local landowner, who has also made comments via their local agents in Newark. Whilst this should be straightforward to take into account, we have asked for detailed information (for our records) of exactly what land they own in our Parish.

Following these discussions, we will then move towards the formal consultation process, where all statutory bodies will receive copies for consideration and comment. This is called a Regulation 14 consultation and will take 6 weeks to complete. Once this is completed and any necessary changes are made, a final version of the Neighbourhood Plan will be produced. All residents of the Parish will then have the opportunity to vote on whether the plan should be adopted. There will be much more information about this later this year; it is anticipated that this will take place in late November 2023.

As usual, we will continue to keep you updated on progress of the plan, in the meantime you can still access the Draft Plan and other documentation under the 'Neighbourhood Plan' page on the Village Website. 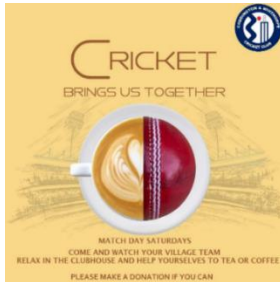

Voices from the past: life in Winthorpe, Langford and Holme

History doesn't have to be a hundred years old or more. We all know how fascinated our children and grandchildren can be with our tales of our own childhood, for instance. Some time ago, I invited people to send me their memories and stories within their families of life in our three villages in days gone by. I'm pleased that some of these stories are beginning to come forward. Here are some extracts from correspondence sent to me by Lorraine Whitehead, recalling childhood memories from her aunt, who now lives in Canada, but lived in Langford in the 1930s.

"Aunty Pat lived with her parents and my dad in Langford during the years 1936, 1937 and 1938 in Railway Crossing Cottage. Grandad worked on the railway in Newark and my Nan operated the railway crossing gates."
(Lorraine)

"I walked to the village school over the Langford farmer's field (even in the winter – no parents drove us to school). I would have been around five years old at that time and walked all on my own – crying all the way because I was cold and tired. Dad was working and Mum couldn't leave the crossing house.

"Once I aged out of the village school, I went by a taxi that was provided to the Collingham school. When Mum couldn't do the crossing work any more, we moved to Newark. Eventually we went to Mount School – Boys on one side, Girls on the other side. Your dad would watch to see if I turned into the school or walked straight past the front door to play truant. He wouldn't let me play truant on my own." (Aunty Pat)

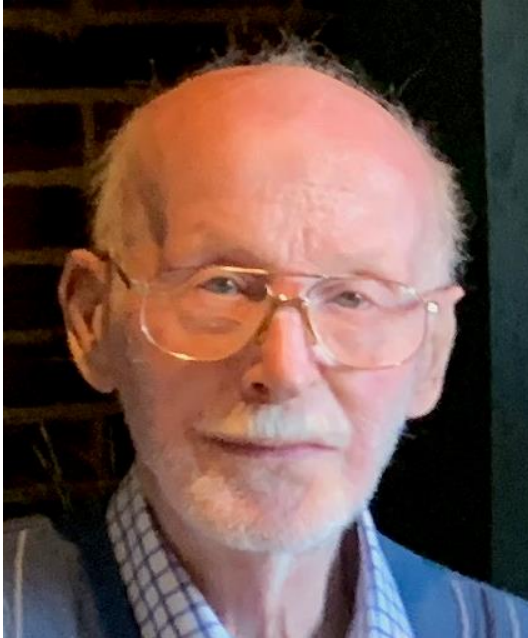
"She has lots of memories of her time in Langford – she fondly remembers playing with the gypsies and playing with buttercups in the field. She remembers her sheep dog. She used to walk the dog down to the gypsies with your dad in a wagon your grandfather built to pull behind the dog, Bob.

"She remembers at about 6yrs old the doctor coming to stitch up your dad's leg from climbing a fence and ripped his leg on a nail. The doctor had no anaesthetic and stitched it up without. She remembers your dad screaming upstairs and her screaming downstairs." (Aunty Pat's friend, Marlowe)

Desmond Aldridge (1931-2023)

My father, Des, moved to Winthorpe in 1971 with my mother, Jean, my brother, Bryn, and me. Dad was never happier than at home in Winthorpe with Mum and fortunately he was able to stay there until he died on 2nd August.



Father played a very active part in village life. He was elected to the Parish Council in the early 70s and became Chairman after he retired, a position he held for well over a decade. He made firm friends there, including Hector Young, Maurice Harvey and Stephen Jackson.

He was involved in many schemes that benefitted the community of Winthorpe, including raising the funds for the Village Community Centre and then supervising its construction. He fought for

years to protect village interests at District and County Council levels. Dad also served as a governor at Winthorpe Primary School.

Dad was genuinely interested in people, taking trouble to remember their names and what they told him. He took great delight in conversations with people he met walking around the village. Dog owners will remember him as the tall elderly gentleman who always had a dog biscuit in his pocket!

Dad's funeral will take place in **Winthorpe Church at 11am on Monday 4th September**. My mother would like to thank everyone who has sent cards. She has found them a source of great comfort.
