GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

Sunflowers have a gift of radiant warmth. They are the happiest of flowers, and their meanings include loyalty and longevity. They are unique in their ability to provide energy in the form of nourishment and vibrancy, an attribute which mirrors the sun and energy provided by its heat and light.



There has been lots of warm weather this spring but a big shortage of rain. This has left the ground very dry. Trees, shrubs and plants are crying out for water. Have you been watering your sunflowers? The reason why sunflowers require a lot of water is that a large percentage of the water taken up by the roots is lost through their large leaves to the atmosphere. This is called transpiration.

Your plants will now be growing at a fast rate. Do not neglect them. They may require a longer cane for support. Keep tying the plants to your canes. They will have at least 4 pairs of leaves. (14th June) The flower bud will form later this month, so go out and check. It will be the size of a small button.

I now feed my sunflowers once a week with Tomorite. This liquid fertiliser, used for tomato plants, is high in potash and is just the job for flowers and fruit.

Later this month you will all start your summer holidays. If you are going away on holiday, ask a kind neighbour to look after your sunflowers. For those of you, who may be going onto the continent of Europe, look out for the fields of sunflowers. These are a shorter variety than the ones that you are growing. They are grown for their seeds. The seeds are used in the food industry throughout the world. The seeds are crushed and the oil extracted is used in cooking oil and margarine. This helps to prevent heart disease, as it is high in essential polyunsaturates and low in saturates.

Did You Know?

- The North American Indian used the pulped leaves of sunflowers as paper.
- They also dried the long fibrous stems and then weaved it into a tough rope.
- They then used the oil in the seeds.
- During WW2 the Ministry of Food crushed the sunflower seeds to extract its oil and then used the oil in the manufacture of Margarine and explosives.

RSPB - Langford Lowfields Update

Summer is here and the reserve is full of great wildlife, we have lots of birds on site raising their chicks, including **oyster catchers**, **swans**,



little ringed plovers, coots and many more adult birds are out busy hunting for their well hidden chicks.

The more time I spend out on the reserve the more I am beginning to discover that the art of listening is as important for detecting wildlife as a keen eye and a pair of binoculars. I am always so impressed by my colleagues' ability to pick out so many different varieties of bird by their song.

We have a great variety of warblers on the reserve but one called a **grasshopper warbler** is highly elusive, we know however that we have at least 15 onsite, a walk around the site at dusk enables us to hear their distinctive call from all around which is both reassuring but infuriating that we can't see them.

You may also hear the distinctive call of the **cuckoo** when walking on the footpath; these birds which were once a familiar sound of summer are now in decline. These birds are busy targeting the **reed warblers** nests to lay their egg, which they do in an impressive 10 seconds before the warbler returns to their nest, they do this 15 to 20 times each time in a different nest. They then sit back and watch over as another bird undertakes all the hard work of raising their chicks!

Bell ringers can be aged from 9 to 90 so come and have a go.


