## GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION



Did you measure the height of your sunflower? If not, do it now.
When the sunflower head becomes full of seeds, feed every time you water. This will encourage the seeds to get big and fat. The weight of the seeds will cause the head to bow down. This is nature's way of keeping the seeds dry.
When the seeds are ripe, using a small hacksaw cut off one of the seed heads and hang it from a tree. Leave the rest of the plants in the garden. Birds love to eat sunflower seeds, as they are rich in oil. See how many varieties of birds come to feed on your sunflower seeds?
You may like to save some seeds to use for growing next year's plants. The best seeds are on the plant's two outer rings. Lay these on a sheet of paper for the sun to dry them. When they are completely dry, using a paper bag store in a dry place. Do not use a plastic bag as this will make the seeds sweat and they will rot.

## Did You Know?

- There can be as many as 4000 seeds in a seed head and that head could weigh 2 kg . ( $41 / 2 \mathrm{lbs}$ ) Phew! No wonder the sunflower bows its head with that weight.
- After the extraction of oil from sunflower seeds, the by-product is used as a high-quality animal feed.

## THE CHARITY OF THOMAS BREWER

From time to time we publish information about the Charity of Thomas Brewer to remind readers of Focal Point about its history and purpose. The Charity was established in 1616 through the will of Thomas Brewer. He was a resident of Winthorpe and bequeathed property and land in the village, the income from which was to be used to relieve persons resident in the village, or nearby, in conditions of need, hardship or distress. The Charity no longer owns property but it does own a seventeen acre field adjacent to the A46/A1133 roundabout. This is rented out to a farmer. Income for the Charity accrues from this rent and interest from money invested over the years.

The Charity is administered by five Trustees. The rector is an ex-officio Trustee so the departure of David Milner has currently left four Trustees. Two are nominated by the Parish Council and two are coopted. The four are Margaret Stewart, David Barthorpe, David Hopewell and Peter Foden. There are no officers. The only "post" is that of Correspondent as the point of contact with the Charity Commission.

In addition to submitting annual accounts to the Charity Commission it has been practice to also present them to the Annual Parish Meeting as a way of informing anyone in the village who might be interested. Sadly, for several years the only non-Parish/District Council attendees at the Meeting have been Trustees of the Charity.

The Trustees meet regularly to consider the affairs of the Charity. Our main concern is to ensure that the object of the Charity is achieved. This is not easy for two reasons. Firstly, since the advent of the welfare state, real poverty is thankfully rare. Nevertheless there are cases of hardship if only we can find out where they are. Secondly, the acceptance of charity can be embarrassing for the recipient.

In recent years the practice has been to make Christmas donations to a number of individuals and organizations having similar aims within the area of benefit. In addition several donations have been given to individuals as the need has occurred at other times. The funds are
limited but we would like to know of instances of need. Residents can help us by advising us of anyone they feel deserves financial help. The Trustees have a wide choice in the purpose for which help can be given as long as the need is clear. The aid is not intended for a particular age group. The area of benefit is defined as "the village (i.e.Winthorpe) and nearby". The Trustees use their discretion in considering "nearby" situations. Residents of Holme and Langford have benefited.

If you would like to suggest someone you feel is deserving of financial help, or you would like more information about the Charity of Thomas Brewer, please contact one of the Trustees. Whilst the names of recipients of donations will never be disclosed we wish to be as open as possible about the affairs of the Charity.

## HAPPY BIRTHDAY - WINTHORPE VILLAGE SCRAPBOOKS

This year, the Winthorpe Village Scrapbooks are 40 years old. Formed in 1971 when the Newark Archaeological \& Local History Society asked local people to collect information about their village history.

A committee was formed in Winthorpe under the chairmanship of the late Mr. G.P. Bennett. Many contributors old and young helped in the research and writing of the articles. The result of the competition was joint first place with the village of Elston. Winthorpe was awarded six trees. A weeping willow, which is on the Green in front of the Almshouses, a silver birch, lime, balsam poplar, red horse-chestnut and a prunus, which were planted on the left-hand edge of the cricket field, just inside the gate.
The two A3 books were donated, for reference, to Gilstrap Public Library, Newark, that being the condition laid down in the competition. The village holds duplicate copies.

In 2004, it was decided to update the Village Scrapbooks. Many people, in the village, made contributions and we now have six A3 books, including the original two.

Better still, why not read the books in the comfort of your armchair. I can just imagine the scene, a book on your lap, a pint at your side and the dog resting at your feet. I do like to dream?

Another fortieth birthday celebration this year is Winthorpe Primary School. Pupils moved out of their old school building, now called 'The Old School', into their new school in September 1971.

The children must have thought it was heaven having inside toilets.

## DID YOU KNOW?

- When the village was under Danish control, in the $9^{\text {th }}$ Century, it was called Wymphetorp.
- The Lord Nelson public house was once called The Turk's Head. Along with The Dial House these $16^{\text {th }}$ Century buildings are the oldest in Winthorpe.
- Wynways and Mill Close are a pair of semi-detached houses built in 1893 by Mr. G. Pierce Duncombe, owner of Winthorpe Hall. Years later they became one house and now they are back to two houses. I will let you, the reader, find out where they are.
- George Wilkinson, historian and Chairman on Newark Civic Trust, lived as a young boy in Bleach Houses. Demolished in 1940, these three cottages were alongside the A46 and the stream draining the airfield adjoining Mrs. M. Thornhill's fields.

## LANGFORD LOWFIELDS

The reed bed restoration of Langford will undergo some major work this September, working alongside Tarmac, and having secured funding from SITA and BIFFA, the RSPB will restore a further 6 hectares of priority reed bed habitat, and make great improvements to the existing wetland.
The landscaping will be moving a staggering 100,000 cubic metres of earth with a great team of diggers and excavators from Wardles Ltd, to create a lush wet reedbed from an old silt lagoon. The changes will not only improve the quality of the reserve for some of our rare species such as bittern, bearded tit and water rails, but will start the process of building future footpaths and trails. This is a huge step forward for the reserve as the RSPB aspires to create visitor access at Langford within 2 years.
