A46-A1133 roundabout

I am becoming increasingly irritated by the number of drivers approaching the A46-A1133 roundabout from the direction of Collingham in the left hand lane and then proceeding to turn right down the A46. I

would like to think that this is not the practice of Winthorpe residents as in my opinion this is an accident waiting to happen.

I write as a local GP but also as a concerned member of the public as I feel that, sooner or later a driver proceeding straight on down Drove Lane in the right hand lane will collide with one of the cars turning right in the left hand lane, causing injury or loss of life. The Highway Code lays out clearly the procedure for roundabouts stating that traffic going straight on or turning left should approach in the left hand lane, and traffic turning right should approach in the right hand lane. For the sake of gaining a few extra seconds many drivers are ignoring this rule.

My observations lead me to believe that in most instances these drivers are in no better position by the time they reach the next roundabout, and their risk-taking behaviour is all in vain. It is high time that appropriate lane markings be created to reinforce the expected behaviour at this roundabout. I would value other resident's views on this and ask the Parish Council to bring pressure to bear on the Highways Department or other relevant authorities to implement appropriate signage.

We were given a list of her six gardening 'heroes':-

- Joy Larkcom, whose foresight in developing the use of more exotic salad plants and cut- and -come- again led to the creation of the mixed salad leaves now commonplace in bags on supermarket shelves;
- Geoff Hamilton, for showing what could be achieved by organic methods;
- Pauline Pears, Ryton;
- Alys Fowler, we were recommended to read 'The Thrifty Forager';
- Martin Crawford, his forest garden at Dartington;
- Percy Thrower, garden writer and broadcaster.

Much was said about using vegetables amongst flower borders, not only to give variety of height, colour and texture but also to reduce pest problems by not concentrating a 'target' food in one area. One tip which was given was to plant nasturtiums amongst brassicas to preferentially attract cabbage white butterflies and blackfly.

Our next meeting is on March 21st when Steve Lovell will give a presentation entitled Highlands and Islands.



GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

April is usually the month when children get ready to enter the Giant Sunflower Competition by the sowing of their seeds.

This competition is open to:-

- Children who live in Winthorpe, Langford or Holme and who are born after the 1st of September 2000.
- All pupils who attend Winthorpe Primary School and who may live outside the three villages.

The competition will start on Easter Sunday, 8th April, when the children will sow their sunflower seeds.

The competition will end on **Sunday**, 9th **September**, when the children will e-mail me on :-



giving your name, age and sunflower height.

If you wish to buy your own seeds, you will require *SUNFLOWER GIANT SINGLE*, which can be obtained from Wilkinson's. Each packet costs 54p and has 75 seeds.

Planting.

Fill your 9cm plastic plant pots with potting compost. Make a hole with your finger into each pot about 2cm deep. Push one seed into the hole, cover with compost and water. Place on a windowsill. Watch out for the seeds germinating. This takes about 7 to 10 days.



I will be attending Winthorpe Primary School on **Thursday 29**th **March** when each child will receive a packet of sunflower seeds.

As a result of these issues we find ourselves spending time dealing with unscrupulous traders who simply don't deliver the services that they promised, often leaving many unsuspecting consumers out of pocket.

"If consumers use the Buy With Confidence scheme, they can be rest assured that their job will be done by an approved local trader."

Langford Lowfields - News for Feb/Mar

With the landscaping work completed we have been able to get our weekly volunteer team back on site in the last few weeks and they have been getting stuck into plenty of

good work. We have planted 5000 reed seedlings on the newly landscaped area and sown 10 bin bags full of reed seed. This planting and seed sowing should complement the rhizome spreading done by our contractors back in December.

We have continued on with our thinning work in the woodland, taking out young sycamore and some larger ones around some of the bigger oak specimens. We have also cut a route for a new footpath that will be opened up to the public as part of our first ever public access to Langford later this year. In the next week we will be using the brash created from our thinning work to create habitat piles in the woodland.

In January we welcomed onto site Jamie Wardley and Andy Moss from Sand in your Eye sand and ice sculpting, who are helping us to build a sand martin bank on Phase 2. We spent a day shoveling and compacting sand in a wooden frame to create a 'trial bank' of 2m x 1.5m in size. The bank looks great and so far has stood up to the test of rain, wind and snow. We are going ahead with the full size bank in the next couple of weeks, in time for the returning birds next month.

A bit of good news regarding our bitterns – we are hopeful that we still have two birds on site, after two separate sightings on 26th January and 12th February. We think they are two different birds due to distinct plumage differences between them, one bird being noticeably paler and having less dark streaking than the other.
