This was Steven Lovell's third visit to our club. The chosen theme this time was "Highlands

#### and Islands"

He has a landscaping business and works part time for the RSPB. With a keen interest in natural history and photography, his illustrated talk was about wildlife and more particularly birds.

We were taken on a tour around the coastline, mainly from North Yorkshire up the East Coast of Scotland, then to some Scottish islands before returning to England's West Coast and Morecombe Bay.

At each stop along the way, we were presented with the specific habitat needs of illustrated wild birds, some such as the sea eagle and red kite having been reintroduced after being persecuted into extinction in Britain.

Flamborough Head and Bempton Cliffs with their colonies of gannets and kittewakes; The Farne Islands with eider, sandwich-roseate, arctic terns and grey seals; the gannets( and guano) of Bass Rock; Loch Garten's ospreys and the story of their gradual increase from one pair in the 1960s; the moorland, forest and mountain birds particular to Scotland such as capercailie, ptarmigan, crested tit, black grouse --- the examples flowed on and on.

We were told of many species engaging in marathon migrations, with estimates of some birds clocking up half a million miles in their lifetime.

This is the first full growing season for the Winthorpe Allotment Association. Buoyed by the good harvest from last year's late crops, everyone is busy sowing and growing.

#### **Support and Donations**

We've had a lot of support in our efforts including funding from Trent Vale Landscape Partnerships which will allow us to replace the old hedge with a new mixed one and to plant two new fruit orchards on the awkward corners left over from the plot creation. The fruit trees will be underplanted as a wildflower meadow with seeds from another donation. In the spirit of "reduce, reuse, recycle" we have an enormous pile of road planings left over from the recent roadworks in the village, which we are using to create a central pathway and car parking area. We are now also members of the Allotments and Gardens Council, which also gives us a reduced rate for our insurance. We still don't have a water supply, but we are confident that this will soon be solved.

#### 'Bespoke' Diamond Jubilee Mug

At the recent village meeting to discuss arrangements for celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June it was agreed that the children would all receive a leather bookmark, suitably embossed with the event and the names of the Parish.

Some people expressed regret however that we would not be giving the children a traditional china mug, as had been done in previous years for Royal events.

The Parish Council has looked into this and for a minimum quantity of 36 mugs the Parish Council could obtain these at a cost of **£6.10p** each,



which includes VAT and Carriage. The name of the Parishes would appear on the reverse (i.e. The Parishes of..) and an illustration of the design, which is unique to this manufacturer and not available in the shops, is shown here. The mugs are 100% British manufacture.

To obtain these we must obviously receive

orders for 36 mugs. For a quantity of 143 mugs the price is slightly cheaper at around £5. 80p each.

#### The Village Hall Antiquities

As most of you are aware the kitchen and toilets were completely refurbished last year and now include disabled facilities. Over this winter the main hall was redecorated and a new vinyl floor was laid to replace the carpet tiles.

Two years ago the hall received a most generous bequest from the late Peter Milroy and the Committee decided that it would be inappropriate to use this for part of the costs of the above refurbishment. After various discussions it was decided to use it to repaint the face of the clock on the outside of the building (which has probably not been done in 140 years) and to dismantle the exterior bell and bring it inside on display. The bell had been covered in a black bin liner for many years to hide it from thieves and looked like it would never again see the light of day.

I have received two quotations from members of the British Horological Institute to repaint the clock dial and give the clock a service and these works should be carried out in the next two months. They both told me that the clock was made in Ludgate Hill by a very prestigious clockmaker J W Benson. An internet search reveals that Bensons held a royal warrant to Queen Victoria in 1879 and the Prince of Wales. They were watchmakers to the Admiralty.

The clock is inscribed "Mears & Stainbank. London 1874" founded in 1570 Even more prestigious – amongst many others they manufactured the Great Bells of Westminster, Montreal, York Minster and Lincoln Cathedral and bells for St.Pauls and Bow Bells, the biggest weighing over 11 tons ! Our bell probably weighs about a hundredweight ! I have been in contact with the Whitechapel Bell Foundry who many years ago took over Mears and Stainbank and whose Managing Director is searching their archives to see if he can find any documents relating to the purchase of our bell in 1874 by Mr G T Pierce Duncombe who commissioned the building as a church in Brough.

The sleuthing continues.



# **GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION**

Don't forget to sow your seeds on Easter Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> April, as I explained to you at school, one seed per 9cm pot. Place the pots on the kitchen windowsill and watch for them germinating. This will take about 7 days. As soon as they are through, half turn the pots every day. This will keep



the plants growing straight as they will lean towards the light coming through the window. Using a plastic tie, loosely fasten your plants to a small split cane. Before the end of the month place the plants outside, against the house, for two days to harden off.

Prepare a sunny spot in

the garden for your sunflowers by digging in some garden compost. The compost will hold moisture and will be beneficial to the plants. Using a tall stake, you can then plant out.

Try and put a few plants into your front garden. When they are in flower, people passing by will stop and smile at your giant yellow daisies.

#### **Did You Know?**

- The sunflower got its common name from its huge, fiery blooms, whose shape, colour and image is often used to depict the sun.
- The sunflower has a rough, thick hairy stem, large coarsely toothed, rough leaves and a circular head of flower. The head consist of 1,000-2,000 individual flowers joined together.

#### Stress Relief?.....

A young lady confidently walked around the room while leading and



explaining stress management to an audience; with a raised glass of water and everyone knowing she was going to ask the ultimate question, 'half empty or half full?'..... she fooled them all... "How heavy is this glass of water?" She inquired with a smile.

Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. to 20 oz.

She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm.
