Wine tasting with a difference was the actual evening entertainment, and very enjoyable it was.

Most members participated, but there were a few of us who for various reasons couldn't take part. Members had been given a tulip shaped glass that would "hold the aromas, so that they could smell as well as taste the product. Each bottle had been covered with foil so that the labels couldn't be read and therefore no cheating could take place. Four different wines were to be tasted and each person had a questionnaire with options and they were asked the country and the price of each wine. Caroline after each tasting explained the type of wine and asked what flavours could be tasted in each one, but didn't give away the price or source because this was to be a competition with the highest score winning a very special prize.

We were all surprised at the end when the prices were revealed to discover that there were no high priced ones, the average price being five pounds!

Go to your local supermarket and try for yourselves, there are many good wines on the shelves and you do not have to pay a fortune for them. This was the advice we were given and Caroline then revealed that before she came she had popped into Asda and bought two bottles of four ninety nine wine which was very good. Then we had the marking of the papers the winner with the lowest score, who won a bunch of grapes which she shared with everyone, was Mrs. Barbara Finn. There was a tie break for the highest score and the winner was Mrs. Elaine Thomton who won a replica silver wine tasting cup, which was on a ribbon which she proudly wore around her neck.

This was a most happy evening which everyone enjoyed, even those who couldn't do the tasting.

Winthorpe Garden Club – Summer Outing

This year's trip takes place on **Wednesday**, **June13th**, and non-members are warmly invited.

Travelling by coach, we leave the village and head south, with the first stop



being Coton Manor in Northamptonshire.
This peaceful ten acre garden occupies a
hillside position extending down from the
17th century manor house, constructed of
mellow Northamptonshire stone.
Landscaped on different levels, it comprises
a series of distinctive smaller gardens,
providing variety and interest throughout the
season, and enhanced by flowing streams,

fountains and ponds. Beyond the confines of the garden, there is a magical five acre bluebell wood and a colourful wildflower meadow at its best in June & July.

Following lunch – a picnic or from the on-site cafe - we travel to Lyveden New Bield (a National Trust property), an intriguing Elizabethan lodge and moated garden, set in the heart of rural Northamptonshire, a remarkable survivor of the Elizabethan age. Begun by Sir Thomas Tresham to symbolise his Catholic faith, Lyveden remains incomplete and virtually unaltered since work stopped on his death in 1605. Discover the mysterious garden lodge and explore the Elizabethan garden with its spiral mounts, terracing and canals. Wander through the new orchard, containing many old varieties of apples and pears, or explore the Lyveden Way, a circular path through beautiful meadows, woodland and villages.

We then head back, stopping at the Chequers Inn at Woolsthorpe, sister pub of our own Lord Nelson, for a delicious two course evening meal. Prices are £35 for NT members, £39 for non-members. In February, we got the chance to go inside a planetarium. We had to go to the community centre because our school hall was not high enough for it to fit in.

A planetarium is a giant dome that has to be blown up. It had a tunnel and we had to take our shoes off to be able to go inside.

Before we went in we felt quite excited but nervous; some children were worried that it was going to collapse, but Mr Morton (the owner of the planetarium) reassured us that it was quite safe inside.

Two children (William and Gabby) had to open and close the tunnel entrance as we went in so as not to let all the air out. Inside it was totally black, no natural light could get in at all; it took a while for our eyes to get used to the dark.

Mr Morton did a talk about all the planets in the solar system. We answered lots of questions and he said we were one of the best classes he had talked to.

He then went on to explain why we have day and night and why the moon appears to be a different shape in the sky each night.

The best bit was when he turned on a special machine. The machine turned the planetarium into the night sky. He showed us how to find lots of different star constellations. Our favourite ones were: The Plough, Gemini and Pegasus. He even showed us how to spots planets in the night sky.

Since visiting the planetarium we have spotted Jupiter, Mars, Venus and even Ursa Major in the night sky.




Facilities being refurbished

DID YOU KNOW

- 1. On the memorial plaque to Philip Handley in All Saints' Church, it states that the church was consecrated on June 7th 1888. This was not so, as the ceremony was unable to take place due to the illness of the Bishop of Southwell. The consecration, by the Bishop of Lincoln who deputized, took place on the 19th June 1888.
- **2**. The Enclosure Award of 1776 was the act of dividing and enclosing several open fields, meadows and grounds so the owners and proprietors had a fair share of good and bad land.
- 3. Dial House, at the corner of Holme Lane, was originally a single storey building. Later it was raised to two storeys and the pediment, with its sundial, replaced.
- **4**. The windmill, which was situated in the field behind the school, was demolished in the early 1900's.

GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

Your sunflower seeds will have now germinated and have two pairs of leaves. They take about seven to ten days to germinate. How many days did it take your seeds to germinate?



Using a plastic tie, loosely fasten your plants to a small split cane. If the plants are on a windowsill they will bend towards the window. To keep them straight, half turn the pots every day.

To prevent giving the plants a shock treatment going from a warm house into a cold garden they will require hardening off. When they are about 10cm high, which they should be by the end of the month, put them outside for two days against the wall of the house.

Prepare a sunny spot in the garden for your sunflower by digging in some compost. This will hold moisture and is beneficial to the plant.

Try and plant one into your front garden. This will make passers-by smile when in the summer

they see its giant yellow face.

I wonder if any of the village residents will be planting sunflowers. I do hope so.

Do not forget to put in a tall stake to support each plant.

Did You Know?

• The key to growing great sunflowers is the enrichment of the soil with fertiliser preferable well rotted farmyard manure, incorporated early in the spring.
