arden Club Steve Lovell's presentation on Native Plants of Britain was fairly comprehensive and began

with the question of what 'native' meant in this context. We often refer to plants introduced by the Romans or our Victorian plant collectors as being non-native but Steve went back much further to the time when there was a land bridge with Europe. This clearly enabled European species to migrate to Britain by normal dispersal methods. The Ice Age however brought about the demise of some species.

The talk was loosely divided into two parts, beginning with trees and then touching on plants and shrubs. Inevitably, given Steve's love of wildlife, there were relevant images showing the inter-dependence between plants, insects, birds and small mammals.

The term ancient woodland is one we may be familiar with but Steve defined this as having existed since 1600 A.D. Originally Britain was almost entirely covered in woodland, largely oak, but now only some 2% of land is ancient woodland dominated by wild oak, quercus robur or sessile oak in wetter areas such as Wales.

Evidence has been found of ancient yews marking the line of Roman roads, some long disappeared. Techniques of coppicing lime, ash and willow were shown, then pollarding, together with reference to the end use of such timber. Such techniques allow light to reach the ground below, stimulating plant growth on the woodland floor. The influence of other factors was demonstrated such as deer, insects and fungi. It was said that silver birch had been shown to provide habitat for 225 insect species.

A wide range of wild flowers was illustrated including corn marigold, field pansy, bluebell, wood anemone. Campion, comfrey etc. The interdependence of many invertebrates with these was again highlighted. One example, ragwort, generally regarded as a weed, poisonous in some circumstances, but fundamental to the life cycle of the cinnabar moth.

I would like to draw your attention once again to our outing on June 19th. This is to Burton Agnes Hall & Gardens near Bridlington. It is a full day, leaving at 9.15am. and returning about 9.00pm. as in recent years we will have an evening meal, on this occasion once more at

Ye Olde Bell at Barnby Moor. The trip is open to everyone, the only limit being the capacity of the coach! If you are interested and want more details then please phone organisers Paul & Diana on 707137 or myself on 686249.

GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

Your sunflower seeds will germinate in the early part of this month, they take about seven to ten days. How many days did it take your seeds to germinate? At the end of the month I would expect two pairs of leaves.



Using a plastic tie, loosely fasten your plants to a small split cane. If the plants are on a windowsill they will bend towards the window. To keep them straight, half turn the pots every day.

To prevent giving the plants a shock treatment going from a warm house into a cold garden they will require hardening off. When they are about 10cm high, which they should be by the end of the month, put them outside for two days against the wall of the house.

Prepare a sunny spot in the garden for your sunflower by digging in some compost. This will hold moisture and is beneficial to the plant.

Try and plant one into your front garden. This will make passers-by smile when in the summer they see its giant yellow face.

It would be nice if the village residents planted sunflowers and joined in with this fun. I have my fingers crossed.

Do not forget to put in a tall stake to support your each plant.

Did You Know.

 The key to growing tall sunflowers is the enrichment of the soil with fertiliser, preferable well rotted farmyard manure, incorporated early in the spring and growing in a sunny spot, especially on a south facing wall.

Collingham Men in Sheds



On the 14th February, the first meeting of a new project for Collingham, Men in Sheds, was held in the Phoenix Hall.

The meeting which was attended by about 30 men, the chair of the Parish Council, Rosie Scott and a representative of Rural Community Action Nottinghamshire, Karen Tarburton, heard a presentation by John Leigh about the concept of Men in Sheds and plans for a 'shed' in Collingham.

Collingham Men in Sheds is aimed at men over the age of 18 who seek to enjoy male company in an environment where they can do practical things, sharing existing skills and learning new ones. It is designed specifically for men because of the social isolation some of them experience, especially in their later years. John explained the history of Men in Sheds movement in Australia, where there are more than 700 'sheds', and more recently in the UK with the nearest 'shed' being in Blidworth.

Our plan is to apply to the Reaching Communities fund of the National Lottery for a grant to start and run a shed in Collingham in Station Road in premises supplied by Jerome Wright. The proposal was enthusiastically received by all present with many ideas about the practical activities for the Collingham Shed coming from the 'shedders' themselves.

This project is at an early stage and does require external funding. Nevertheless we are collating names of interested men in Collingham and District who may wish to be involved.

Some topical interpretations from the 'net'

Why does the date for Easter change each year......

The early church fathers wished to keep the observance of Easter in correlation to the Jewish Passover.

Because the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ happened after the Passover, they wanted Easter to always be celebrated subsequent to the Passover. And, since the Jewish holiday calendar is based on solar and lunar cycles, (Paschal Full Moon), each feast day is movable, with dates shifting from year to year.

In simple terms Easter occurs on the first Sunday following the first full moon that occurs on or after the day of the vernal equinox (the first day of spring).

Why is Good Friday so called...

Good Friday is the day commemorating Jesus Christ's death on the Cross, which is probably to be dated April 3, A.D. 33. In the liturgical calendar of the Western church, it is the Friday before Easter. The exact origins of the name are uncertain; some argue it stems from the use of "Good" as an adjective applied to the day, which is an Old English synonym for "holy." Others argue it is a corruption of the word "God," in the same way that "Good Bye" comes from the phrase "God be with ye." -
