WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH NEWSLETTER

This month welcomes back the Parish Council newsletter. I had hoped to write you a newsletter every month however over recent months there has been little to report (not always a bad thing!). Therefore if you find the newsletter missing from your monthly edition of the Focal Point, please don't think I have forgotten you! I have just run out of things to say for the time being! As always though please feel free to contact me with any concerns or comments you have.

I have lots of news for you this month, not all good though I am afraid to say!

Lets get the bad news out the of way first. I have received reports for local residents of suspicious vehicles in the village, in particular an unmarked white van. Although no report of break in's have been reported at the time of writing, I have received information of a disturbance in the Spinney area. With this in mind, please ensure your property is as secure as possible and where possible if you notice a suspicious vehicle please attempt to take down the registration number.

Concerns have also been raised regarding the amount of dog mess that appears to be being left on the foot paths and verges around the village. Many of us are fortunate enough to own dogs and enjoy walking them in and around the village, however please remember to clean up after them. The offence carries a fine of up to £1000. Please help keep the village clean and safe.

I received comments regarding the pot holes that had appeared along Hargon Lane, this issue was reported to the highways agency who swiftly rectified the problem. I hope everyone using the road sees some improvement.

Concerns were also raised regarding the dangerous driving conditions at the junction of The Spinney with Gainsborough Road over the winter period. This issue was again reported to the highways agency. An assessment of the area was made and unfortunately it was decided that the area was not eligible for a salt bin. However, this matter was discussed at the last parish Council meeting where it was agreed that we would purchase at salt bin at a relatively small cost to benefit those

residents using the junction. We hope to have this fitted during September/October ready for our next winter.

The parish council are busy finalising the accounts for 2012/13. There will be an opportunity for members of the public to view these accounts should they wish to do so. Dates and locations of these viewings will be listed on the notice boards around the village.

Finally, I have uploaded the agenda's and minutes of the last parish council meetings to the village website giving you the option to see what has been discussed over recent months. There is also a link to the planning department of Newark and Sherwood District Council. This will give you the opportunity to view any upcoming planning applications and submit any comments you have to the parish council for consideration when approving/rejecting such applications.



Spring at Last: - March

You can tell its Spring: the birds are singing love songs to each other, the daffodils and other flowers are beginning to shine through and the braver caravaners are polishing their wheels and heading for the highways.

I was lucky enough, once again, to be heading for the North Devon coast on the western border of Exmoor for an early March sojourn. Unfortunately, I forgot to order my holiday weather and so my first few days were very cold. A couple of heavy downpours of rain, even snow, made me feel glum but a tease of bright sunshine each day raised my spirits.

As usual, I was visiting my sister, Lou, who has nearly thirty acres of steep farmland and orchards tucked up a combe on the North Devon coast. Her sheep need her attention and she needs a hot meal; I was happy to provide the latter and leave lambs and all the mucky stuff to her. I don't mind feeding chickens and geese, collecting eggs and walking dogs but when rubber gloves and overalls are called for it is time for me to retreat to the kitchen.



During the Winter, since my last visit, the hen house had been repaired, cleaned and the population reduced and the spells of sunshine encouraged the feathered ladies to begin laying again. They were also charmed by a very

handsome young cockerel who was newly introduced to them - "Cock-a-doodle- do!" He was replacing a more senior fellow who was sent to another farmyard where his aggressive behaviour was seen as good defence against a threatening fox. The low overnight temperatures and the threat of snow has meant that lambs and ewes have had to be brought down to the home paddock and sheds. One night Lou found a lamb huddled between its mum's shoulder blades trying to stay warm. Mornings have found the lambs sheltering in the barn, snuggled and warm while later in the day their mothers lead them out to gambol in the sunshine.

Early last year Lou adopted a young collie, Brie, who is very loving but not really a work dog because she is a bit 'loopy'. The old dog Flynn looks at her as if to say, "Settle down, you're disturbing me." He is

a much better worker, willing and able to round up sheep or geese, or to find stray hens who would prefer to sleep in the log pile rather than the hen house. I enjoy taking both dogs for a walk up over the fields to look at the Bristol Channel and the Welsh Mountains in the distance but never down onto the beach because Flynn is afraid of the waves- such a coward!

The local caravan parks are open for the early season campers. The night temperatures last weekend, Mid-March, were down to -5'C so I hope they had an extra blanket ready. The rain made the ground like a mud bath but when the sun shines the beaches, cliffs and sea look amazing; sparkling, fresh and clean and the sea is like a Mediterranean blue pool. The seaside shops are gradually spring-cleaning, adding a new lick of paint and getting ready to welcome visitors.



On Ilfracombe seafront the local council have installed a very enormous statue of a pregnant woman by Damien Hirst who is a local resident. The expensive yachts lined up in the harbour make an enchanting picture sat in front of the multicoloured shops and steep cliffs bordering this old Victorian town.

GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION



It is now one month since you set your sunflower seeds. The plants should be making steady progress and will be ready to into the garden. Try and put plenty of garden compost into the planting holes, this will hold moisture which the plants like. After planting they will appear to stop growing. This is because it takes seven days for the roots to become established and then they

start romping away.

Do remember to put tall strong stakes in to support your plants. Keep tying your plants to these stakes as later on in the summer, when we traditionally have strong winds, they will blow down.

When I saw you at school, I suggested you plant a sunflower into your front garden. It was to make people passing by smile when they see this giant of all flowers. Did you?

DID YOU KNOW

The sight of a sunflower in bloom can be truly inspiring. The sunflower is more than just a pretty face however - it is a versatile and useful plant with interesting characteristics.
