Due to the holiday season, attendance was smaller than usual. However, the shortfall was more than compensated by five visitors; Julie Hill, Christine Pattinson, Chris Randall and the new editors of the Focal Point, Annie Purday and Nick Wynne, they were all very welcome.

The subject of this month's meeting was 'Bees' and the speaker Chris Edge, an amateur bee-keeper gave a very interesting and fascinating insight into the "World of Bees". He brought along a selection of hives and the sort of equipment he uses when working with the bees. One of the hives was an observation hive which contained a colony, together with the Queen Bee. The Queen Bee was easy to identify as she had a white spot on her back, marked by Chris himself. Chris explained the fertilization of the Queen Bee, also droning - which involves the non-working males of the honey bee, and swarming - a cluster of bees leaving the hive with a Queen to establish a new colony.



At the end of the evening members were able to purchase jars of 'Three Counties' honey which is produced by Chris. By the amount of questions asked, the members' interest in bees had apparently been stimulated.

GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

There are few plants that can carry an adult back to their childhood – but sunflowers do that. Towering in stature and overflowing with personality, its fabulously positive blooms charms all those who see it in our gardens. There have been many sunflowers growing in children's gardens this year as the weather has been very good for them.



The winner of the 2013 Giant Sunflower Competition was 6 years old Kenya Holmes-Morgan with a height of 3mtrs 58cms. (11ft. 9ins.) On Thursday the 20th September, Kenya, a pupil at Winthorpe Primary School, was presented with a framed certificate to record her achievement, a First place card, a sunflower bookmark and a gift voucher.

The record set in 1999 by Jon Higgins of Langford with a height of 4mtrs. 48cms. (14ft. 6ins.) still stands.

Third was 7 years old Danny Davis with 3mtrs. 41cms.

Winthorpe Garden Club

After a summer break, 36 members sat back and enjoyed a talk by Mrs. Susie Dean, a county organiser

of the Lincolnshire branch of the National Gardens Scheme.

Celebrating its 85th anniversary last year, the National Gardens Scheme allows private gardeners in England and Wales to open their gardens for charity. These gardens, along with National Trust Gardens, have to show for 45 minutes a garden of quality, character and interest. Many of these gardens provide a plant sale and the welcome cup of tea and cake.

When the scheme started in 1927, 607 gardens opened, last year there were over 3,700 gardens, all advertised in the National Gardens Scheme 'Yellow Book.'

The money raised goes to various charities, such as:-

Marie Curie Cancer Care; Macmillan Cancer Care and Support; Crossroads Care; Hospices and also to any charity proposed by the individual owner, of which no more than 20% may be given. Besides these charitable causes some of the money raised goes to a garden apprenticeship scheme. Working together with the National Trust the scheme offers gardeners the opportunity to study for qualifications leading to a Diploma in Heritage Gardening. In 2012, Lincolnshire provided 18 young men and women the opportunity of a career in gardening.

Last year the National Gardens Scheme donated £3m to charities and the Lincolnshire branch £42,000.

RSPB Langford Lowfields news August 2013

We recently hosted a very successful 'bat and moth night' here at Langford Lowfields with 20 species of moth and four bat species recorded. The wind and rain subsided just in time for dusk and the UK's largest bat species – the noctule bat – to come out and begin its nightly hunt over the reserve. As the bat walk progressed the bat detector also picked up pipistrelle, daubentons and, finally, brown long-eared bats. The walk concluded with the moth trapping and species included dusky thorn, scalloped oak and large wainscot to name but a few.

The continuing warm, sunny weather has been perfect for butterflies with a recent mass emergence of small tortoiseshell butterflies at the end of the month. The immigrant clouded yellow butterflies are still around in record-breaking (for Langford) numbers and there have been sightings of the elusive Adonis and two-spot ladybirds, both species have not been recorded here since early spring.

Around the lagoons we have had a nice collection of large gulls including great and lesser black-backed, both green and common sandpiper, dunlin and a ruff. There have also been sightings of a female marsh harrier and two hobbies but, most exciting of all; we have had the first confirmed sighting of a bittern since March. The woodland has also offered up excitement with a sparrowhawk chasing a very vocal green woodpecker, both hurtling in and out of the trees until the sparrowhawk finally gave up.

The volunteers have been working hard as always, this month they have been installing the previously prepared floating fish shelters and the newly propagated reed plants have now been planted out within the safety of the fenced off areas in phase 2. Their hard work was justly rewarded by the sighting of a handsome juvenile cuckoo flying overhead.

Torksey to Newark in September aboard n.b. Mulberry

Back in August I told you about our trip down to West Stockwith. Today I thought I should tell you about coming back home. In order to catch the upward surge of the incoming tide we had to be up at five o'clock and ready ourselves and our narrow boat, 'Mulberry', for the journey from Torksey to Newark. We had moored overnight below the lock where the pontoons floated on the ever changing water level. It was still dark, the early light still only a promise in the skies east of Torksey. We ate a quick breakfast and then crept outside to prepare the boat and start the engine. We were aware of others still sleeping so decided to warm the motor with a gentle ten minute run in the main stream of the river. The water was already creeping up the muddy banks to show the tide was coming in.

On our first bend we saw evidence of an early bird fisherman although he was still asleep in his tent. On round a series of tight bends to Butlers Island where we could see a sand bar on the right hand side. More fishermen waved to us and lights came on in houses at Laneham. Here at Laneham two fishermen



were stood thigh-deep in the water. The wind that had cooled us the day before was not evident, the sky was pink with soft puffs of cloud overhead and the fish were leaping: all very romantic.

We added more speed, taking us

from the initial gentle 5 kph to seven point five and probably the best we could hope for on the weak neap tidal flow. However, we were soon out of the hidden danger zone at Laneham and heading towards Dunham Bridge where we navigated the left portal. Our map warned us of shoals under the cliff at Dunham Dubbs and we saw the new reservoir intake just beyond and then on to Fledborough with another sharp turn and a twist.


The first boat down the river passed us just after eight and thirty minutes later two cruisers overtook us going towards Cromwell Lock. We were still managing 6 kph despite the fact that the 'flood' ended just before Carlton and since then we had been driving against the 'fresh' river water coming downstream. Our 1.6 litre Izuzu diesel engine pushed us on. At nine o'clock hot sausage sandwiches and coffee sustained us. A pair of swans showed off their agility and speed by keeping up with us for a short way and more fishermen appeared, walking out, pushing their loads of tents, tackle and rods on carts across the fields and onto the spits of sand that formed on the bends. There are so many fishermen here that we guess a competition must be underway.

At Collingham Lane End we radioed in to the lock keeper who promised to ready the Cromwell Lock for us. In the water below Cromwell weir there was a dredger working hard to clear sand from the river, even on a Sunday morning. We skirted around the back of the sand barge and used the force of the weir to push us over and into the lock mouth. Twenty minutes later we emerged at the top into the relative safety of the river leading us up to Winthorpe Rack and Nether Lock before Newark and an early lunch.


