#### **Advent**

I have a confession to make: I LOVE CHRISTMAS!

There, I said it, and it's true. Ever since I was little I've looked forward to making the Christmas cake and the pudding, decorating the tree, singing Christmas carols, visiting relatives and friends, giving & receiving presents, having a slap-up meal and finally putting my feet up in front of the telly. Well okay, sometimes the reality doesn't quite live up to the expectation, but... generally speaking... it's one of my favourite times of the year.

Some of the above activities take place during the period Christians call Advent, which is something we most likely associate with chocolate treats, one a day, from the 1<sup>st</sup> of December through to Christmas Day, and sometimes beyond that to New Year's Day. Perhaps, like me, some will remember the less-fattening alternative of a glittery snow scene or



a depiction of the Nativity, with little numbered doors hiding pictures of something to do with the Christmas theme, culminating in the largest one which was only to be opened on Christmas Eve.

Thoughts of Advent bring to mind the efforts which numerous Blue Peter presenters made in producing the infamous Advent Crown each year – a contraption constructed from wire coat hangers, tinsel and precariously placed candles which were lit each week from the start of Advent until Christmas Day. I think this was probably how I was introduced to the wonderful concept of the Advent Wreath, which is a tradition still carried on in Winthorpe church.

So what is an Advent Wreath, and why do we have one? Well, Advent begins on the Sunday closest to 30<sup>th</sup> November, so this year it actually starts on the first day of December. It lasts until Christmas Eve and is the season of hope; a period of preparation for the birth of Jesus. During Advent there are no flowers in the church, but there is an Advent Wreath which is a circle of intertwined evergreen plants such as holly and ivy. The circle symbolises God with no beginning or end, and the evergreens are a reminder that God is always here. The holly also symbolises the

crown of thorns that Jesus wore when he was crucified. Four candles are placed around the circle and one in the middle.

Some churches use purple, pink and white candles, but at Winthorpe we use four red candles and the central candle is white. The unlit candles represent darkness. On the first Sunday of Advent, we light one red candle. On the second Sunday we light the first candle again, along with the second red candle, and so on until the service on Christmas Eve when we light all the red candles and the white candle as well. The red candles, in the order they are lit, represent Hope, Peace, Love and Joy, and the white candle represents Jesus as the Light of the World.

From my perch at the organ, I don't get to see the Advent Wreath being lit nowadays, but I still find it magical and full of wonder. We always ask someone in the congregation to light the Advent candles, and if they are young or young at heart, so much the better. If like many of us, you feel that Christmas has become commercialised and has lost its original meaning, how about coming to celebrate Advent in our beautiful church? You'll be very welcome at any of the services, and who knows...... you might get a leading role as lighter of the candles!

#### GARDEN CLUB

John and Gail Summerfield of Westshore Nurseries gave a presentation with a difference, entitled 'Twilight Garden'. This concerned both the twilight of the gardening year i.e. autumn up to 21<sup>st</sup> of December, together with those hours around dusk throughout the year. Gail had been the prime mover in these observations whilst John had taken the photographs and now presented the talk in his usual droll manner.

We were shown examples of flowering plants, grasses (their speciality) and shrubs where the intensity of colour appeared to change with reducing light levels. The dimmer the light the more dominant were pale pinks and yellows as might be expected but other features became more apparent. For example, dark, glossy green leaves were more noticeable as were convex – veined ones. Variegated leaves and striped flowers also became more obvious.

Taken together with texture, form and scent these things have practical value in choosing plants for darker corners in our gardens.

Also illustrated was the effect of different types of lighting, natural and artificial, on the appearance of plants. Quite elaborate demonstrations variously using up lighting, down lighting, side lighting and most strikingly, coloured lighting, gave us all food for thought.

There is no meeting in December. Our next is the social evening on January 15<sup>th</sup>. Please remember to bring your contribution to the feast.

In the meantime I wish everyone a Joyous Christmas and a Happy, Healthy New Year.



#### RSPB Langford Lowfields news for September/October 2013

The end of September saw a small flock of 32 golden plover flying over the reserve, confirming the arrival of autumn. There have

also been small groups of swallows heading southwards and we have had a juvenile marsh harrier feeding over phase 2, a lovely bird with uniform dark chocolate brown plumage and a bright orange/cream cap.

The lingering warm weather has meant that we still have lots of insects about including a devil's coach-horse beetle, a fairly common rove beetle that is rather large at up to 30mm long and characteristically raises its abdomen when threatened, a bit like a scorpion. Our eagle-eyed warden has also recently spotted a flying vapourer moth, an interesting species with wingless females so this moth was definitely a male.

As the year swiftly marches on towards winter we have had some very wet, blustery days and the first whooper swans of the year flying overhead, we usually get a small group overwintering on the reserve so that is something to watch out for. Numbers of wildfowl on the reserve have also been increasing over the past couple of weeks including wigeon, goldeneye and tufted duck. We are hoping the occasional smew and goosander may drop in over the winter too.

With rarer birds in mind we recently had a first for the reserve, Jenny, the warden was lucky enough to spot a juvenile gannet flying overhead - more usually spotted at the coast, this sea bird may have been blown inland by the gale force north-easterlies we have been experiencing in the past week or so. The volunteers made the most of the finer weather at the end of September arranging piles of logs and brash in the woodland to make homes for a variety of wildlife including nesting birds, a plethora of invertebrates and many species of fungi. The volunteers weren't the only ones enjoying the warm weather as they spotted several flying insects including small tortoiseshell and greenveined white butterflies and common darter dragonflies.

We will very soon be opening part of the reserve to the public, but until then you can still join one of our guided walks where you will learn about this ambitious, landscape-scale conservation project and see some of the special wildlife that it is already attracting, including the spectacular starling flock of up to 40,000 individuals gathering daily before roosting in the reedbed.

## Assistance request – Aviation in Nottinghamshire World War I

As it moves towards the quieter winter opening period the Newark Air Museum is starting to work at creating a new display area in Hangar 1, which will be used to house a new display to highlight the regions aviation contributions to World War I.

Many of Nottinghamshire's early aviation contributions are well documented, such as the World War I landing grounds and the legendary fighter ace Captain Albert Ball, VC. These were recently recorded in the Aviation in Nottinghamshire booklet published by the Newark Air Museum thanks to a Nottinghamshire County Council Local Improvement Scheme project grant. Researchers at the museum are now trying to locate more details of a possible aircraft manufacturing side to the county's history. This research has been sparked by a document in the museum's archive that refers to The Nottingham Aircraft Manufacturing Co Limited.

This document is a copy of a letter that was sent to Abbott & Co Ltd on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1918 by The Nottingham Aircraft Manufacturing Co Limited. We are keen to make contact with anyone who may have heard of this Nottingham based company.

On the letterhead The Nottingham Aircraft Manufacturing Co Limited listed its Head Office as 32 King Street, Nottingham; this was struck through and a new location was typed in as Castle Meadow Road, Nottingham. Did this company become part of the Royal Ordnance Factory in Nottingham?

The letter was sent to Abbott & Co Ltd offering to supply Tube Expanders; it stated that they (The Nottingham Aircraft Manufacturing Co Limited) were already supplying "large contracts for Admiralty Expanders". The letter was signed by the company's Managing Director W H Pease.

#### COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS SCHEME. VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Parish Council is preparing the groundwork for a possible Community First Responders Scheme in Winthorpe with Langford. The project will require funding for equipment and this aspect is being explored at present. The scheme will only be viable, however, if there are sufficient trained responders to man it. The Council is therefore seeking volunteers to form a Community First Responders group. First Responders are volunteer members of the community who are trained to respond to emergency calls through the 999 system in conjunction with the ambulance service. Responders provide immediate care to patients in their local areas where distance may delay the prompt arrival of an ambulance. They are trained to deliver basic life support and defibrillation to patients in cardiac arrest, and appropriate assistance, including oxygen administration, to patients suffering from a range of conditions.

Volunteers will be fully trained by the East Midlands Ambulance Service and the group will be equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen masks and other equipment. We are seeking those aged 18 and over, who are in reasonably good health, want to learn life-saving skills and have a full clean driving license. Anyone able to give up some free time can volunteer.


