HELP US SAVE YOUR VILLAGE STORE!

For the last 5 years like thousands of others, this store has been in rapid decline. We have struggled merely to keep sales stable but alas this is not happening. Over the last few years, our customer base has been

substantially reduced as people have moved away or died and shopping habits have changed.

The underlying question here is what does your village store mean to **you**? Do you value being able to just stroll down the road when



you have a parcel to post or when you need a jar of coffee or a pint of milk? Do you like to pop down the road when you want to get some money before you set off somewhere instead of nipping to town or walk down the road when you have a bill to pay? These are things that people expect to be able to do in a village and rightly so, but a village store cannot survive when used merely for these purposes.

There are other things that your village store is useful for e.g. notifying each other of functions and events, helping to find lost pets or re-unite any lost properties (sometimes valuable) with the owner. It can provide a laugh for those of you who, outside their shop, see no one else. It gives additional value to your home. (If you were looking at two villages to move to and one had a village store, which would you choose?). A village store is a fundamental part of village life.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

The answer is so simple and costs so little and we feel is best to tell you **now** rather than after the shop is closed, when you will all say "We wish you'd told us!"

Do a £10 - £20 shop, once a week on the essentials that you use week in, week out. Let me demonstrate how easy it is.

Here is a sample shopping list taken from customers who shop here:

6 eggs 99p, sausages 1.89, toilet rolls 1.99, large milk 1.79,

bacon 1.99, bottle of best quality wine 5.49, Fairy liquid 1.29 Total so far- just £15.93

(Compare that to just purchasing a daily paper).

The best way of doing this is to set a fixed weekly order with us to collect once a week. By doing it this way we all gain. You know what you are buying locally and we know exactly what to stock to meet your needs. If we can all pull together and set this method of shopping in motion then, we can guarantee that the future for your shop will be bright at virtually no financial cost to you but, more importantly it need never be lost.

Why not come to our open day Saturday 15th February from 12.0.clock to 1.30pm and sample some of our products. Wine and nibbles will be served!

George Mann – 100 years old on 11th February 2014.

George and his wife Annie moved into their newly-built bungalow in Pocklington Crescent in 1978. George had recently retired from his job with British Gas. Prior to the move he and his wife had lived in Chigwell, Essex for many years although he was born in Hackney, London. Being born within the sound of Bow Bells and therefore a true

cockney by definition, he never adopted the cockney way of speaking.

At the start of WW2, George, having started his career as an apprentice with British Gas, had gained promotion and was now in charge of an outside working team. With this much-needed expertise, he and his team were transferred to

Birmingham to deal with the often hazardous job of repairing bombdamaged gas mains etc. Whilst in Birmingham, as part of his need for some form of relaxation between "call outs", he was encouraged to join a theatre group and he duly became one of the troupe which he greatly enjoyed.

When the war ended George and his wife returned to London and resumed their married life together.

The two became keen tandem cyclists and cycled as far afield as Cornwall, Yorkshire (where

Annie's family lived) and Kent staying overnight when necessary in B. & B's. Those were the days long before motorways and road traffic was very much lighter. Cycling was therefore a pleasant and economical way of travel. He and his wife had many happy times and many interesting tales to tell from their cycling trips around England. He attributes much of his long and mainly healthy life to his regular cycling over many years – plus his wife's good cooking!

George eventually graduated to acquiring a car and caravan which in turn broadened their horizons of places to visit and enjoy and they took full advantage of this facility. In London, George helped with the St John's Ambulance group and being an amateur musician, able to play both the organ and the piano, his talents were in demand by the groups he and his wife socialized with. A unique experience at this time for

George was to be called upon to serve as a juror at the Old Bailey in Central London.

Regretfully, George lost his wife, Annie, some ten years ago but whilst she was alive they both helped their near neighbours in a variety of ways. This is now reciprocated by Daphne James, a former neighbour currently living in Woodhall Spa, who keeps in contact with him by telephone and also visits him personally by car at intervals each month. Additionally, George and Carol Wright live opposite George's bungalow and their kitchen window overlooks his which permit them to monitor his movements daily- and to help out whenever necessary. Finally, George has enjoyed a long, varied and interesting life. He is a very resilient and independent person and his firm resolve to continue to look after himself at home during his twilight years is to be applauded. With the continuing help from his friends and neighbours we pray that he will continue to be with us for several years to come.

RSPB Langford Lowfields news for January 2014

As winter advances here at RSPB
Langford Lowfields the unseasonably
mild weather has provided some

gloriously sunny days, nicely rounded off with spectacular sunsets - ideal conditions for both the December and January volunteer work groups. The December work party spent a rewarding day clearing scrub in a bid to increase the amount of light getting through to the ground below which will eventually increase floral diversity. This should also increase the diversity of invertebrates which will, in turn, increase the diversity and numbers of insectivorous mammals and birds, therefore a positive outcome all round. The January team was clearing patches of scrub running alongside the reedbed and hopefully enabling windows of opportunity for keen wildlife watchers to spot some of the rarer, shyer wildlife such as bitterns or even bearded tits.

The mild winter weather appears to be having a strange effect on the wildlife on the reserve with some plant species coming into bloom already. Jenny, our warden has spotted a common mallow flower, more usually flowering between June and September as well as cowslips, common ragwort and yarrow. Other unusual sightings for this time of year include records of a peacock butterfly flying near our office as well as a common frog seen by volunteer Julie Straw and a common toad, another sign of the mild winter weather.

The starling murmurations have been spectacular of late, especially with the backdrop of some stunning sunsets. The numbers did not quite reach last year's dizzy heights of up to 40,000 individuals but we have had flocks of up to 9,000 birds providing amazing synchronized aerobatic

displays. Unfortunately the starlings now appear to have dispersed and moved on, a little earlier than usual, possibly due to the weather, but we can't be sure. Keeping with the theme of spectacular displays, there have also been regular sightings of two peregrine falcons



interacting with each other, calling and stooping and diving at each other.

It is most likely the milder weather is responsible for this year's drop in winter migrant numbers. The wintering wildfowl that we do have, however, is beautiful with a male goldeneye regularly spotted displaying for his harem of four females and good numbers of shoveler ducks. There have also been three whooper swans regularly roosting on one of the silt lagoons. With the opening of the reserve imminent, there is still chance to get a sneak preview by joining one of our monthly guided walks.

FEBRUARY MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

The New Year doesn't seem quite so new now. In Church February gets under way with Candlemas, when we remember Mary and Joseph keeping the rules by presenting the infant Jesus at the temple. While there they were watched by two old people, Simeon and Anna who, just like the Wise Men at the Epiphany, recognised in that baby the coming of God, present with them. Simeon and Anna both gave thanks in



humility and with wonder, old people who'd been around for a long time, and yet excited. Who says its only young people who can see things with wonder and excitement?

In the East Trent Group of Churches we see similar wonder. At St Helena's Church, South Scarle this is expressed with the completion of the project to throw open the church to the community. A similar project is nearing completion at Holy Trinity Church, Besthorpe, and similar thinking and preparation is going on at a number of the other churches in the Group.

And now we've been joined by The Revd Phil Smith. Phil is a recently ordained priest who is a SSM (Self Supporting Minister), who has been working as Curate in training in Farndon. Phil will spend some time developing complementary working patterns with me as we explore with others, ordained and lay, the sharing of ministry in East Trent. Phil is married to Charlotte and they live in Coddington. He works as a Support Worker based at Grantham Hospital. He is limited in the time and energy he can give to East Trent but will grow, with our help, into sharing in ministry across the Group.

So Christmas is done, and yet it isn't. The Wise Men together with Simeon and Anna show us the importance of continuing to see and follow that baby and to continue to live in the mystery of love, with all its excitement and challenge, especially during building developments and changes in personnel as we and they build the lives of our communities.


