Ed's Comments

I have lost count of how many times I have moved house! So much so, that my children have

questioned the fact that they (like me) have no real roots anywhere and it obviously matters to them. They are however very adaptable and sociable and are now busy putting down roots of their own so I guess it hasn't harmed them too much.

Because of my own experience I was intrigued to meet Alf Cobb who has lived for almost 98 years in and nearby Holme and wondered about the kind of life

he must have had. When I visited him recently he told me about his early life, losing his mother when only a baby to something which is nowadays curable and about how he went **by ferry** over the River Trent to school in Muskham. He then described how he left school at fourteen and began working on the land for one of the farmers in Holme – a job he did for the



whole of his life, as his father had before him. He remembers driving cattle on foot from Holme to Newark Market, going through Winthorpe. They showed cattle all over the country, sleeping in the pens to protect their stock and winning prizes for the best steers as far away as the Fat Stock Market in London. He met his wife at a dance in Grantham (how did he get there I wonder?) and their children still live in Holme too. It was only after he retired that he started to show vegetables although he grew them all his life. He has held the Guinness Book of Record's record for the World's Longest Cucumber since 2008 and he proudly showed me his certificate to prove it. The children of Winthorpe School have a good example to follow! When I asked him what Holme was like when he was a lad his reply was "Pretty much the same as it is now!"

I came away with a real sense of the continuity of rural life but a realisation that it is very much part of the modern world too.

#### GARDEN CLUB

I suspect that many present at the talk by Neil Timm were surprised by the variety of ferns both in the U.K. and worldwide. We saw some superb slides, including many of ferns native to Britain, such as the Adders Tongue, not typically fern-like, growing to some 6 inches high in a meadow. Ferns are ancient plants; this one dates from the Devonian Period.

All ferns reproduce via spores. We were shown how this process takes place.

An early commercial use of ferns was the utilisation of certain spores in finger printing powder. A more novel use was that of using the fine spores to create a



combustible cloud which was then ignited to produce a lightning effect in stage productions. Another was where huge quantities were burned in kilns to produce soda ash used in the glass industry.

As garden plants they had their heyday in Victorian times when wealthy individuals would compete to show the most spectacular specimens in hugely expensive and ornate heated exhibition houses. This period led to breeders creating many new varieties, for example some 700 varieties of the Lady Fern. Neil's knowledge and enthusiasm was evident throughout and the ease with which he delivered both common and Latin names was quite remarkable. This is the end of our speaker season which starts again in September. However, a reminder that our day trip to Newby Hall & Gardens is on June 11th. There are places available if you or anyone you know would like to join us.

Further ahead we have an evening visit to two N.G.S. gardens in Whatton. This is on July 16th and we will travel by car, meeting at the Lord Nelson at 6.00pm.

#### RSPB Langford Lowfields News for May 2014



We have been inundated with summer migrants here at Langford Lowfields with some excellent birds making an appearance. A ring ouzel was on site on 19 April followed just two days later by

a spoonbill, both very exciting additions to our sightings book. Other 'celebrity' guests have included whimbrel, whinchat and garganey.

The first cuckoo of the year arrived on 22 April and there are now two cuckoos calling regularly. I personally am really thrilled to hear them, it's sad to think that in my childhood they were so commonplace I would hardly notice them. Certainly in the last decade the only place I have heard them is on Nature Reserves. The insect world is coming to life a little more gradually, with the first large red damselflies out at the end of April and the St Mark's flies emerging four days early on 21 April. Also known as the hawthorn fly, the St Mark's fly is quite large at 12mm long and is easily recognizable by its long dangly legs. In addition there

have been several species of moth, including common carpet, latticed heath and the stunning puss moth, all of which can be spotted by day. This month's Sunday volunteer party had a real treat with 70 bird species recorded in total, including whimbrel and black-tailed godwit and yet another visit from the spoonbill - you did have to be up early to spot the latter though. This is only the third record of spoonbill on site in over 9 years so a noteworthy sighting. The first swifts of the year were also seen and at the time of writing there are now over 200 swifts wheeling over the reserve with their distinct piercing screams. These are exciting times here at Langford and we are welcoming more

visitors every day, including families with enthusiastic children which are always a pleasure to see. The May guided walk was very well attended with 26 people joining Paul, the warden, for a walk around the

reserve trails as well as a sneaky look behind the scenes at what the future holds.

#### CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE

#### Your home

Contrary to popular belief, most domestic burglaries are committed by opportunist thieves looking for the easiest way of getting into your home without being seen or disturbed. Sometimes they don't even have to use force - they get through an open window or door.

#### Look at your home through the eyes of a burglar.

Are there places where a burglar could break into your home without being seen? How would you get in if

you had forgotten your keys? If you could get inside, so could a burglar. Securing your home is the best way to reduce the chances of you becoming a victim of burglary. Follow this advice to ensure your home is as secure as possible.

#### Home security checklist

Windows and doors

- When you go out, always close and lock external doors and windows, even if you are just going out for a short time.
- Lock windows and doors at the front or side of the house if you will be spending time in the garden.
- Window locks, especially on older windows, will help stop people getting into your house. Remember, a burglar is less likely to break in if it would mean they had to smash a window, as the sound of breaking glass could attract attention. One in three burglars gets inside homes through a rear window. Window locks can be seen from the outside and could deter a burglar from forcing the window.
- Before fitting extra locks to UPVC windows, talk to the fitter to make sure it won't affect the warranty.
- If you have deadlocks, use them. They make it more difficult for a thief to get out again. But don't leave the key near the door or in an obvious place nearby.
- A spy hole in your front door allows you to see who is there. A door chain allows you to open the door a little way to talk to the caller without opening it fully.

#### **Keys**

- Ensure your keys are kept in a safe place out of sight and well away from your letterbox.
- Don't tag keys so they can be easily identified.
- Keep all spare keys in a safe place.
- Don't leave spare keys outside or in a garage or shed.
- Never leave garages or shed unlocked, especially if they connect to your property.

#### **Outside your home**

• Visible burglar alarms and carefully directed security lighting can deter burglars. Make sure alarms stop sounding after 20 minutes and lights don't disturb your neighbours.

#### Be a good neighbour

If you see anyone acting suspiciously in your neighbourhood, call the police on 101 or, in an emergency, 999.

#### For Whom the Bell Tolls?




"Ready when you are, George..."



Easter marked the first anniversary of my institution as Rector of the eleven churches and fifteen communities which make up the East Trent Group of Churches. And quite a year it's been! With so much to take in and learn I still struggle to put names to faces and faces to locations. Despite this challenge I continue to enjoy enormously the responsibility of being the Parish Priest to so many communities. I came to be Rector of the



whole Group, and the learning process of becoming the East Trent Group continues to be a challenge to all our churches. Many people observe that my job is impossible, but in response I've taken to reminding such doom-sayers that the church started with only thirteen people, of whom one met death through crucifixion brought about by the betrayal of one of the others who then removed himself. Now see that the Church is a worldwide fellowship of millions. And East Trent is only a small part of that worldwide fellowship.



As the years pass and the life of the Church is organised in different ways so we need to move away from how things were "in the good old days" (and our view of that is too often through rose-tinted specs) to what fun we are having in the present age. Only yesterday I had a conversation in one of the East Trent churches about how good it must have been in times past to see the church full unlike the

present age (the conversation was with someone who doesn't come to church). I had to point out that the churches have rarely been full, in that sense, but they are full of, and a visible sign of, God's love in our communities.

During the year I have been privileged to share in many things. The joy and wonder of Baptisms and Weddings, together with the joy, sadness and wonder of Funerals, and many other significant family and community events. Little wonder that my job is such fun, particularly as I look ahead to the continuing growth of our churches in warmth of fellowship and faith. David Yabbacome Rector East Trent Group of Churches

The current Auditor, Mr Richardson, was asked if he would consider remaining as the Internal Auditor for 2014/15, Mr Richardson agreed. Thanks were given to Mr Richardson for his work throughout 2013/14.


