## **GARDEN CLUB**

Our two speakers, husband and

wife Pete and Jackie are an adventurous couple. Every four or five years they make trips abroad plant hunting with other members of the British Alpine Plant Society. The subject of this presentation was 'Plant Hunting on the Roof of the World'. This relates to an expedition to Tibet where they were to retrace the steps of an earlier, military trained plantsman Charles Howard Bury. Reference was made to his book 'Mountains of Heaven, Everest Reconnaissance- The First Expedition 1921'.

We learned that the term 'alpine' referred to plants growing above a certain altitude e.g. in Britain the top of Mount Snowdon, but in Europe this increases to some 4,000 ft. whilst in the Everest range this becomes 14,000 ft.

The team flew first to India then Kathmandu in Nepal before entering Tibet and driving to Llasa. After several days of altitude acclimatisation they headed out on a three week trek. Entering areas of isolation they had to be self – sufficient; camping gear, food etc which was initially carried by truck and pony. Accompanied by Nepalese sherpas and cooks they walked eight to ten hours a day, all the time spreading across the route searching for plants. We were told that the altitude limit for the ponies was 4,000 metres, beyond which point the transport was by yak accompanied by Tibetan yak drivers.

Stunning images of the scenery, people and animals were accompanied by exquisite shots of all manner of plants. Some were recognisable as related to our own garden plants such as certain aquilegia, primula, iris, poppy and aster. There was also the globally distributed Snowdon

Lily. Blue seemed to be the predominant colour, including stunning forms of meconopsis. Most plants showed dramatic modifications, usually of foliage, to enable them to survive the harsh conditions. Several plants discovered had yet to be named. There were also real oddities. One such had the appearance of a huge cocoon with white threads covering it. On top was a small hole allowing pollinating bees entry to the flowers inside.





RAF WINTHORPE - THE STORY OF AN AIRFIELD



During World War Two Royal Air Force Winthorpe was a major RAF



After several years of detailed research, Colin Savill BA (Hons) has written a new history of RAF Winthorpe. The book has just been published by

the Newark (Notts& Lincs) Air Museum, which is located on part of the former RAF Winthorpe airfield site.


The book is entitled 'RAF Winthorpe – The Story of an Airfield 1939 – 1959' and it is the story of RAF Winthorpe from its beginnings to its demise as an RAF station.

The book (ISBN 978-0-9500341-6-4) is in a softback format; 216 pages (paper weight: 130gsm); with circa 120 black & white photographs and illustrations; and it includes a Foreword by the Chief of the Air Staff, Air Chief Marshal Sir Andrew Pulford KCB CBE ADC RAF.

# giving Langford Lowfields News November nature 2014

a home In the words of Jenny our warden "You know it's winter when scrub management season starts" and this month's Sunday volunteer work party were doing just that. Although some people question why we would be cutting down apparently healthy bushes and trees it is really important to increase the biodiversity value of the reserve. If we didn't intervene the scrub would mature, becoming tall and dense, blocking sunlight to the vegetation below and therefore limiting the plant life.

Selectively thinning the scrub opens it up and allows light through to increase floral diversity, which increases invertebrate abundance and diversity and, in turn, increases bird and mammal activity. Just last winter, one of our volunteers (Sarah Burhouse) conducted a short study to investigate the abundance and diversity of invertebrates here at Langford Lowfields. Clear increases were seen in the areas where thinning had occurred just the year before.

The volunteers have also been busy helping Jenny to install our new viewing screen. The screen has varying heights in order to suit wildlife watchers young and old. It is positioned on a high point offering up brilliant 360 degree views over the developing reedbeds and across the reserve. It is hoped to be open for public use by the end of November.

Although winter is imminent, the temperatures have remained well above freezing with still a few butterflies feeding on the last remaining ragwort flowers at the beginning of the month. We have had numerous bittern sightings over at least two different areas of the reserve as well as marsh harriers – we just need bearded tits for a full complement of reedbed



specialists. Although there have been no sightings for the past two winters, I am informed that this year was such a good breeding season for bearded tits that it is quite likely – so keep your eyes peeled.

Over the past few weeks we have also had stonechat, golden plover, dunlin and whooper swan and the most excellent news of no less than four tree sparrows along the public footpath. To also enhance your walk along from the car park

to the reserve entrance, and in spite of the unusually dry autumn, we have also had a spectacular display of fungi in Fox Covert Wood. The parasol mushrooms (*Macrolepiots procera*) are particularly beautiful.

The starling murmurations have been building by the day, with 15,000 at the beginning of the month. Just two years ago they plateaued at an amazing 40,000 so we have our fingers crossed, although yesterday there were only a few hundred but you can never be sure with nature.

If you would like to witness this awe-inspiring sight\*, as well as getting a sneaky behind-the-scenes tour of the quarry and nature reserve, join one of our monthly guided walks. The final **Discover Langford Lowfields – Starling Spectacular walk of the year** is on Sunday 30 November, 2:00 pm - 4:30 pm. (\*please note – as with all wildlife, the starling murmuration is not guaranteed) Please book by calling the office on **01636 893611** and certainly bring weatherproof clothing and good footwear!


