Foxton Locks aboard n.b. Mulberry

The engine is thudding under my feet and its noise makes me deaf to anything happening around me. The sun is high, making me squint. It is hot and there is no breeze, but the fine weather has encouraged crowds of Sunday strollers to come out and watch the action at Foxton Locks. Many of the onlookers are licking refreshing ice creams. They edge towards the lip of the lock and stare into the depths. The dark water is low down as I edge the boat into the maw of brickwork.



I try not to bounce off the sides because it would damage the ancient structure and do no good to my paintwork either. More importantly, the watching crowd would smile and tut. Bouncing off the side also makes everything rattle throughout the whole seventeen metres of my boat. Martin is up there somewhere. He closes the gates behind me with the help of a family of watching children. Now the lockie lets in the water and gradually my boat rises. I let the boat move back so that my fender rests on the centre panel. I run the engine fast to keep me fixed to the door as the water rushes in. Half way up I relax, throttle back and slowly the craft slides forwards so that now the prow's fender meets the front gate.

When the lock is full the children are ready to push on the beam to open the gate and Martin lowers the paddles. Carefully, I move out into the pound watching the boat in front heading towards me. We perform a slow waltz and swap locks so that they are able to occupy my lock and I now fill theirs. Now we perform the whole ritual again. Two hours later, at the top of Foxton Hill, we are able to moor up and stroll back for our own ice creams. Lynne Shapley


