
Ed's Comments



GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

Thank you once again to Winthorpe Primary School for letting us visit to give our "sunflower assembly" just before the Easter holidays. The children laughed in all the right places, and had plenty to contribute. Our themes this year were "what makes a fair competition?" and "why do some plants grow taller than others?" I am sure that all of our budding gardeners remembered to plant their sunflower seeds on Easter Sunday. The seeds usually take 7-10 days to germinate, so by the time you read this you should have some nice little plants starting to grow.



As the tiny plants start to get taller, they can be quite floppy and will need some support. Using a plastic tie, loosely fasten your plants to a small split cane. If the plants are on a windowsill they will bend towards the sunlight. To keep them straight, half turn the pots every day. Remember, the straighter the plant, the taller it will be!

Once the plants are about 10cm high, you can think about moving them outside (assuming our wonderful British weather isn't doing anything too crazy!).

Put them against the wall of your house for a couple of days to 'harden off' before transplanting them to larger pots or into a border. Can you think of any creative containers or places to plant your sunflowers? Just remember that they need plenty of sunshine and

good drainage (if in a pot or container).

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REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTOR OF THE EAST TRENT GROUP OF CHURCHES MAY 2015

Writing for village magazines and newsletters in the East Trent Group of Churches is a monthly joyful challenge. I always go for brevity and try to say something attractive and intelligible of the Christian faith which may help my readers to think through aspects of life. Now I find myself writing my final piece. Early in March it was announced that I am to retire at the end of May on the grounds of ill health. My wife and I will continue to be resident in Collingham until we find somewhere to live in retirement.

It has been my privilege and joy since ordination to have been called by God to serve in a variety of different contexts, urban and rural. I have enjoyed good health generally, but had to undergo neuro surgery for compression of the spinal cord. Subsequently, having been encouraged to return to cycling, I sustained a Traumatic Brain Injury as a result of a cycling accident. Despite expectations, I was able to return to ministry. It was in good faith, and after medical advice, that I came to the post of Rector of East Trent Group. Since then I have sought to serve the churches and communities in the Group faithfully, enjoying sharing in fellowship in Sunday worship and in life events with a variety of people in and through the richness of serving our eleven churches and their communities. However, recently the continuing effects of the Brain Injury have become more evident resulting in reduced capacity for

living out ministry. Hence retirement, which has arrived in my life earlier than I had anticipated. As a result I am now faced with the challenge of discovering how to live out Easter joy in unfamiliar ways after more than thirty years of active ordained ministry. The exciting journey of life continues, a great gift from God. And there is that same gift in the resurrection of Jesus. May God be praised!

News from Langford Lowfields April 2015

Spring has finally arrived at Langford Lowfields, or has it.....

The first singing chiffchaff was recorded on 22 March but other resident species were, to that point, still fairly quiet. As April began the winter was lingering on with the remaining goldeneye, wigeon, teal and pochard still on site and a last large flock of fieldfare feeding up on neighbouring fields before their long distance flight back to their northern breeding grounds. Insect species were also relatively scarce at the beginning of the month, although Jenny, the warden, was pleased to have spotted the first tree bumblebee (Bombus hypnorum) of the year – these were first recorded in the UK in 2001 but have spread north quite rapidly since.

The cool temperatures and strong winds of late have not made it feel very spring-like, although a few warm sunny days more recently have inspired me not to give up hope. Luckily one of those days helped to make the family pond dipping event a great success. Seven families arrived with a total of 15 children enjoying the watery exploration throughout the afternoon. Creatures



discovered lurking in the depths included a toad, water boatmen, pond skaters, both dragonfly and damselfly nymphs and, no less than, three different species of caddis fly larvae protecting themselves using a variety of materials from tiny gravel to a partial reed stem.

This month the volunteers have been busily sowing

reed seeds in the polytunnel; these should be ready to plant out by mid-summer and will supplement the existing reed establishment and any surplus will be sold on to other reedbed creation/restoration projects countrywide.

As the month has progressed the temperatures have begun to creep up (albeit a little slower than we might like) there is now a golden carpet of cowslips next

to the beach hut, the trees are coming into leaf, the blackthorn blossom is out and lesser celandine, coltsfoot, red dead-nettle and ground ivy are all in flower. The butterflies are finally emerging in good numbers with small tortoiseshell, peacock, brimstone, comma and red admiral on the wing.

Avian highlights include the first swallow of the year, red kite, marsh harrier and merlin with the sedge warbler, blackcap and willow warblers providing a variety of melodic birdsong. On the wader front, recent sightings include both ringed and little ringed plover, ruff, avocet, black-tailed godwit, lapwing, green sandpiper and redshank.

We are still on the lookout for the first dragonflies of the year and are expecting a few more avian migrants to arrive, so keep your eyes peeled on your next visit and don't forget to record your sightings in the book. VICTORY DAYS PREPARATIONS UNDERWAY

Museum staff and volunteers are currently making plans for Victory Days 2015; a two day event in July (Saturday 25th & Sunday 26th 2015) that will commemorate the 70th Anniversary of VE and VJ Day at the Newark Air Museum.

Our organisers are keen to hear from any veterans of any of the military or civilian forces during World War II, as the museum is keen to invite these veterans along to the event as its special guest. Details of a former service number or membership of an

appropriate armed forces veteran's organisation can secure them free entry to the event at the museum's site in eastern Nottinghamshire, close to the border with Lincolnshire.

For the younger visitors the museum is planning to operate a World War II style sweet shop in the Dambusters Hut, where visiting children will be able to collect their free World War II sweet ration. To collect their ration they will need to bring along some pre-decimal coinage – so





parents and grandparents will need to look out for those sixpences, three-penny bits, pennies, half-pennies or even farthings – and make sure that they bring them along. Visitors should not worry too much if they cannot find suitable coinage as the museum will have some available to make sure that everyone gets their ration!

Throughout the two days there will be a host of World War II related activities and entertainment taking place around the site, including alongside its famous Anderson

Shelter and Dig for Victory Garden. Visitors will also be able to sample some examples of wartime food delights, such as bread & dripping, spam, corned beef and jam sandwiches.

Everyone at the museum is looking forward to two days of nostalgia and commemorations. Howard Healey
