If you are planning a community event whereby the road needs to be closed please contact your local Highways department on 08449 808080 for advice with regards to this as the police can no longer authorise this.

FISH POACHING (ENGLAND AND WALES)

There have been several reports of Fish poaching that have taken place within our community and I would like to make residents aware of this and what to do if they were to come across this.



It is an offence to take or destroy, or attempt to do so, any fish in water which is private property or in which there is a private right of fishery. This includes all forms of fish, whether game or coarse, and is covered by section 32 of the Theft Act 1968.

The Environment Agency is the body responsible for regulating and enforcing. Fisheries enforcement officers- 'water bailiffs'- have the same powers, liabilities and responsibilities as a police constable when investigating fisheries offences. Any suspected illegal fishing activity should be reported directly to the Environment Agency on their emergency line 0800 807060. Trained staff will then be able to pass on your information to officers on duty in the relevant area.

Where the fishing rights are owned or leased by a club or individual Schedule 1 of the Theft Act 1968 will also apply. If you have any information then don't hesitate to report this to Environment Agency/ water bailiff or Police.

LONGEST REIGN.....

No doubt a number of people will have heard or read in the media that very shortly Her Majesty the Queen will add a small but nonetheless historical achievement to an already long and remarkable reign.

On the 9th September 2015 to be precise the Queen will have reigned as long as her Great, Great Grandmother Queen Victoria – a total of 63 years 7 months and 2 days (or a total of 63 years and 216 days). Queen Victoria is recorded as having died at just 6-30p.m. so for those who like to be precise, at 6.31p.m. The Queen will become our longest reigning Sovereign.

The event will not however be marked by any special celebrations or a public holiday which in some ways perhaps is to be regretted as this is quite a rare event not likely to happen again for a very long time.

In fact, over the past almost one thousand years of the English, Scottish, and British Monarchy, only six Sovereigns (including the Queen) have managed anything similar, and surprisingly perhaps, these are spread reasonably evenly over this long period.

The first was King Henry 111 (1216-1272), the son of King John who died here in Newark Castle. Henry succeeded as a young boy under the Regency of the famous William Marshall, but was nonetheless consecrated and crowned King shortly after his father's death, and had a reign of 56 years and 28 days, having celebrated the 50th Jubilee of his reign in



1266 in Lincoln, in the small church which still stands on the right hand side of the road into the town, near the Railway Station.

Henry 111 was succeeded by his Great Grandson, King Edward 111 (1327-1377) who reigned for 50 years 147 days. Like Henry 111, Edward 111 celebrated the 50th Jubilee of his reign in 1377, but died shortly afterwards in the arms of his mistress!

Elizabeth 1st managed just over 40 years, but was succeeded in 1603 by the son of her aunt, King James V1 of Scotland (1567-1625) who managed a respectable 57 years, 246 days. The majority of his long reign was as King of Scots (he was consecrated and crowned in 1568 aged 1!) a position and title he retained. King James is often described as "The wisest fool in Christendom" but he was certainly well read and when the Parliaments of England and Scotland began to argue over his titles he suggested the adoption of the old Roman name for the whole of these Islands, which was then called "Great Britain" (Ireland being referred to by the Romans as Little Britain!) and this was eventually adopted and, after the Act of Union of 1706, with the addition of "United Kingdom of..." has remained so ever since.

Queen Victoria's Grandfather, King George 111 (1760-1820), was the next Sovereign to hold the distinction of the longest reign of 59 years 96 days, until this was beaten by Queen Victoria in 1896.

On the wider world stage a number of Sovereigns can beat these records (though not with any consistency!). The current Longest Reigning Sovereign is King Rama 1Xth of Thailand who came to the throne on the 9th June 1946 and has currently reigned for 69 years 31 days+!

Prince John 11 of Liechtenstein (1859-1929), a small Principality attached to Switzerland and Austria, reigned for 70 years 91 days and the Sun King, Louis X1Vth of France (1643-1715) managed a 72 years 110 days.

The current record is however held by King Sobhuza 11 of Swaziland (1899-1982) with a record of 82 years 254 days, though some may feel it is a little unfair to include him as Swaziland was only granted its Independence in 1968 and until then he was termed as Paramount Chief and only became Head of State with the title King at independence. In which case the top record goes to Bernhard V11 of Lippe (1429-1511), one of the smaller German States then a part of the Holy Roman Empire, with a total of 81 years 234 days.

Next year 2016, The Queen celebrates her 90th Birthday (b.1926) although she already holds the record for being the oldest reigning sovereign! In 2017 however we reach a real milestone-all being well- when in the November that

year The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh celebrate the Platinum (70th) Anniversary of their wedding (1947-2017). Seventy years is a long time in anyone's book and as far as can be ascertained, no Head of State has ever celebrated a Platinum Wedding Anniversary. Perhaps then the Government will decide to celebrate the event and give us all a public holiday-hopefully with a few fireworks thrown in!!



At least in Winthorpe the flag will be flown on the 9^{th} September next. Steve Jackson



Its spire, tower or roof reminds a visitor or resident alike of the village's Christian heritage. In many cases for a thousand or more years people have found comfort, companionship and faith there and the wonderful thing is, supported by a small group of volunteers, they still do.
