#### **Garden Club**

Whereas many English villages have lost their local farms due to Enclosure Acts and modern technology, Laxton Village continues to maintain 14 working farmsteads. This is due to the historic strip farming system which they have continued to maintain for 8 centuries despite the many inconveniences of this

medieval system in the 21st century of mechanisation.

Stuart Rose, farmer and clerk to the manorial law court of Laxton, showed the club members slides of the village and described how the manor of Laxton was transferred from the private ownership of the Manvers family to the government in lieu of death duties after



WWII. Later the estate was transferred to the Crown Estates who continue to be landlords of the community. Stuart explained the legal requirements of the tenants of the manor. The Laxton Court Leet is held annually in the Dove Inn where tenants are fined 2 pence for absence and up to £50 for any misdemeanours in their farming practice.

The heavy clay of the fields, divided into strips, dictates the crops which can thrive. There is a 3 year rotation of fallow, winter wheat and winter barley. Sheep are used to keep the sykes (paths) and gaits (access) clear, grazing down the grass and weeds to produce a short sward. The woodland, unploughed areas and the fallow land are perfect for wildlife conservation. 80 pairs of ground nesting skylarks, English partridge and hare thrive here alongside numerous wild flowers destroyed elsewhere by artificial fertilisers and modern farming methods.

Stuart took us on a pictorial tour of his village comparing the 2200 acres of the medieval village with the present day 500 acres. This process is no longer commercially viable for most households who are finding it difficult to find members of the next generation to continue a life in agriculture. The average age of the farmer is 63 and many are still working into their 80s. The village is well worth a visit to admire this ancient farming method which is now unique in the British Isles. The grand Norman church, burial place of the lords of the manor, is also worth a visit although it has suffered a restoration in 1860 when the coloured glass was removed. Lynne Shapley

# WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> October 2015, the Finance Committee and the Main Parish Council met in the village hall.

The meeting reported that the Embankment works to the rear of the Community Centre were progressing well with thanks to Steven Jackson for his continued efforts.



The Council agreed to contribute towards the purchase of bulbs to be planted over the area in the coming months.

The Council has received numerous complaints from villagers regarding the state of trees and bushed that overhang roads and pathways within the village. The Council has written to the various owners of the land in question and it is hoped action will be taken by them to trim the trees and bushes in the near future.

The Council has also received a complaint from a resident regarding excessive speeding in the village. Whilst the vast majority of villagers observe the speed limit, it has been noted that some cars use excessive speed, particularly along Gainsborough Road. The Council were informed that they could borrow a speed gun from a neighbouring village which would be manned by trained volunteers. If any villagers are interested in being trained to operate the speed gun, please contact the Parish Council.

The Council have received notification from Post Office Limited regarding the closure of the Post Office on Gainsborough Road. Post Office Limited has stated that the closure is temporary and they will consider another Post Office if anyone in the village would like to run one. The Council have asked for more details on this matter. The matter of traffic congestion was raised when there is an event on the Showground. I can't believe the first half term of this year has finished! It's been a busy one. Thank you to everyone who came to our Coffee and Cake Afternoon on 25th September in aid of Macmillan. It was a lovely afternoon, with plenty of tea and cake for all, and we managed to raise just over £300.

Our club nights for children, which take place after school, are well under way and children are able to benefit from a very varied range of choice this time round. Clubs on offer are ICT/iPads, nature, cookery, magical maths and pottery with Arty Pots. Several sports clubs are also underway during school lunchtime.

Following our Netball Team's success last year, we have been practising hard this term and have made an excellent start to this year's competitions. for the children on recorders, and the Red Cross has also paid us a visit and has told the children all about the work they do and how the children can help to support the charity. The children have chosen to fundraise for the Red Cross this year and started their campaign at the Harvest Festival Service with a collection and raffle. Thank you to everyone who contributed. We hope that those of you who came to our Community Lunch on 14th October enjoyed yourselves. We always enjoy welcoming people to the school, and this time round we invited members of our PTA along as a way of thanking them for the hard work they put in to making the school a success. Talking of the PTA, they 'kicked off' their fundraising for the year with a Frog Racing Night on 16th October. New to their programme of events, the night seems to have gone down very well with everyone, and we've received plenty of positive feedback. The PTA is aware that many of you within the community came along to support the event and they have asked me to pass on their thanks to you. The money raised by the PTA is vital in supporting the wider educational experiences of our children.

We have a number of school trips coming up and I'll tell you about those as and when they happen, but I must mention Class 4's (ages 10-11) recent trip to the Chocolate Factory. Class 4 has been studying the Aztecs as part of their topic this term, and the Aztecs were well known for making chocolate. The Class visited 'Choc Drop' just outside Market Rasen and had a fantastic time. They sampled a huge variety of chocolate flavours, including lime, chilli and ginger, cranberry and orange as well as some of the more traditional flavours! They learnt about how chocolate is made, had a go themselves at making their own chocolate bar, and looked at some of chocolate's medicinal purposes. No wonder they had a great time!

Class 2 (ages 5 & 6) have also been around and about. You may have seen them walking around the village recently. Their topic this term has been houses and they walked the length of the village studying the different types of homes in the village - some of them also took the opportunity to knock on their own doors! Our first half term was rounded off by a lovely Harvest Festival Service in the Church. Each class made its own contribution to the Service and we were joined by Janet Esam from the Red Cross. This Service is always well attended and is a lovely way to end a busy half term.



Finally, you make like to know that school is closed for a half term break until Tuesday 3rd November. Best Wishes Caron Ementon (Headteacher)



# News from Langford Lowfields October 2015

As the days get a little shorter and the temperatures start to dip, the first of the winter visitors are starting to arrive here at Langford Lowfields. One of our Beach Hut volunteers, Dave Roberts, has already spotted the

first stonechat of the autumn and Jenny (our warden) recorded the first grey wagtails in flight over the quarry with their distinctive call. The first redwings have also arrived. The redwing (*Turdus iliacus*), not to be confused with the larger more colourful fieldfare, is the smallest of



the thrushes and is identifiable by the creamy stripe above the eye and the orange-red flank patches.

The fieldfare (Turdus pilaris), also a winter visitor, and the redwings tend



to congregate in mixed flocks, feeding on berries and worms just like their native cousins. They can be spotted in hedgerows and across farmland, only usually visiting gardens in the harshest winter conditions.

Although autumn is now truly upon us, the summer insects are clinging on with migrant hawkers and common darter dragonflies still on the wing on the many warm, sunny days that we have been lucky enough to enjoy of late. Jenny has also spotted green tiger and devil's coach horse beetles out and about.

Winter wildfowl are also beginning to arrive, the first of which have been shoveler, gadwall and wigeon. Our bitterns are continuing to enjoy the reedbed with regular sightings by staff, volunteers and visitors alike. The starlings are beginning to gather in growing numbers and we are hoping to host our Starling Spectacular walks very soon so please look out for the posters or check Jenny's blog for confirmation. #### WINTHORPE VILLAGE HOLIDAY IN SOUTH WEST WALES

**Monday 14<sup>th</sup> September** – With Dave Scott, coach driver of Travel Wright, Newark, it was an 8.40 am start for 40 residents of Winthorpe and friends as we set off on a dull but dry morning, for a five-day holiday to south west Wales. Squally showers of heavy rain were to follow us for most of the day. Following a lunch stop at Monmouth, we set off for our destination, the threestar 70 bedrooms Cliff Hotel and Spa at Gwbert. Overlooking Cardigan Bay, Gwbert is on the northern tip of the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park. **Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> September** – It was a 9 o'clock start on a dry sunny morning for

our visits to Fishguard and St. Davids. St. Davids, Britain's smallest city, is a small attractive town and home to many artists. This is noticeable by the many art galleries. St. Davids is the peaceful home of Wales's Patron Saint. Set in a valley and overlooked by the Celtic Cross and War Memorial Garden is St. Davids Cathedral. After leaving St. Davids we

travelled through moorland hills to Foel Eryr, a well known view point on the Preseli Hills. It is also a favourite place for walkers to begin their journeys. In English it is called *'Hill of the Eagle.'* Standing 1,536 feet high, (468 mtrs.) it gave commanding views all around. These hills are the centre of a fascinating prehistoric landscape, scattered with hill forts, standing stones and burial chambers. The hills are also famous as the source of the mysterious bluestones of Stonehenge.

**Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> September** – Another 9 o'clock start for our visit to the Gwili Steam Railway at the Bronwydd Arms near Carmarthen. The Gwili Railway is a Welsh heritage railway that operates a standard gauge preserved railway line. We travelled through open fields and wooded hills, all the time hugging the River Gwili and arrived at Danycoed Halt. Waiting for the engine to change places for our return journey gave everyone time to take photographs. Following the journey back to the Bronwydd Arms, we had a talk on the railway's history, enjoyable refreshments and a tour around the carriage's workshops. I was intrigued by the large number of glass jars, sitting on shelves above the work benches, each containing small nuts and bolts, screws, cotter pins, circlips etc. The exciting morning wasn't yet over as we all had a short ride on the company's minature railway. What an exciting morning this was!

Our lunch stop, and a short ride away, was at The National Botanical Garden of Wales, near Llanarthney in Carmarthenshire. The garden covers a massive 568 acres of the beautiful Carmarthenshire countryside. Besides being a big attraction for visitors, it is a centre for botanical research and conservation.

**Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> September** – Another sunny morning for our coffee stop at Saundersfoot, a popular yachting and fishing holiday village, in the Carmarthen Bay. The harbour was full of small boats and yachts. After a stroll on the beach

we went four miles along the coast to our lunch stop at Tenby. Sometimes known as '*Little England beyond Wales*,' it is a delightful sea side town.

**Friday 18<sup>th</sup> September** – Today was departure day. Another 9 o'clock start for our long journey home. Following the coastal road and travelling north a coffee stop was made at Aberystwyth.



Aberystwyth, a historic market town, is a popular holiday resort and the administrative centre for West Wales. It is also home to the University of Wales, which caters for several thousand students. The nearby surrounding hills looked down upon two beautiful beaches and harbour. It was a shame we had to leave such a beautiful town. Continuing our journey, following the River Severn and passing through Welshpool, a lunch stop was made at Shrewsbury, birthplace of Charles Darwin. The town centre had many black and white timber-framed houses with steep narrow streets and alleyways.

After a short comfort stop we arrived back in Winthorpe at 7.45pm.

**Special thanks** must go to the holiday organizer, Peter Foden and our coach driver, Dave Scott, who together with their detailed planning and organization made this holiday both enjoyable and safe. I must not forget our chief head counter, Peter's wife Jean, who gave him her full support. Thank you, Jean. The mileage for the coach holiday was 800 miles.

This south west Wales holiday is the end of an era. The Village Holidays started in 1988, when the late Maurice Harvey had a vision. He was returning home after visiting Monet's Garden in France when he said to his wife Kath, "I wondered whether the Winthorpe Art groups and Gardening Club would be interested in visiting the gardens in an organised coach holiday." The following year, with the help of David Wright of Travel Wright, Newark, a full coach set off for a tour of Monet's Garden and France. Maurice organised successful Village Holidays for the next seven years. On his death in 2005 Peter Foden was asked by Kath, Maurice's widow, to bring to a conclusion the last two coach holidays that Maurice had started planning. Since then he has continued where Maurice left off running coach holidays which have left me and many others with wonderful, wonderful memories.
