GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION 2016

It still feels very much like winter but with Easter falling early this year we will soon be making a start on the 2016 Giant Sunflower Competition.

For anyone not familiar with this Winthorpe institution, this is the annual children's competition to see who can grow the tallest sunflower. The competition was started over 20 years ago by local resident, Pat Finn, and has been going (or growing?) strong ever since. All children at Winthorpe Primary School can enter, as well as non-pupils (of primary school age) living in Winthorpe, Langford and Holme. Charlie and I will be visiting the school on Friday 18th March to deliver a "sunflower assembly" and give out a packet of seeds to each child. It is always a challenge to think of an assembly that engages, inspires and informs.....especially with our harshest critics sitting in the audience! Zack (7) and Alex (4) will definitely let us know if this year's efforts are up to scratch or not.

The children plant their seeds on Easter Sunday (27th March) and need to nurture them through the spring and summer until the competition ends on Sunday 11th September. We return to school shortly after that

GARDEN CLUB

In her talk entitled 'Muck & Magic' our speaker Sally Smith was referring to the soil as muck to which the magic is applied by virtue of home-made compost. Sally made a strong case for organic gardening which is hardly surprising as she spent six years at the Ryton Henry Doubleday Research Association. Reference was made to Lady Eve

Balfour whose work led to the formation of The Soil Association.

It was said that good soil care entails the surface always being covered, either by growing crops, green compost or weed suppressant matting, otherwise weeds would quickly colonise as some seeds are capable of dormancy for many years or even decades.



We were told that there is no great mystique in making compost. Basically everything that is or has been plant material can be included. Exceptions are meat, fish and cooked foods and then mainly because these could attract rats. Materials are divided into GREEN – such as grass mowing, weeds, peelings of fruit and vegetables – these are high in nitrogen and known as activators. The second category is BROWN- such as woody prunings, cardboard (especially good we were told) and newspaper.

Ideally a composting mix should be 50/50 green to brown or C:N ratio. It should be moist and kept aerated; any tendency to over wetness or dryness during decomposition can be corrected by adding the appropriate dry or wet material. For the more energetic gardener who is prepared to turn and mix the material every two weeks or so, higher heating is maintained and the end product can be ready in as little as six to eight weeks.

There was a word of caution in application of the finished compost. Only use it sparingly and apply in spring or summer so that nutrients are not leached out by winter rains.

Don't forget there are still places available on our two trips this year. Spread the word!

Our next meeting on March 16th will be addressed by our old friend and consummate speaker, Stuart Dixon. His subject is 'Rustic Charm of English Cottage Gardens'. Ian Wilson



News from Langford Lowfields February 2016

The past month has seen some very chilly weather and even a covering of snow. The January WeBS (Wetland Bird Survey) was carried out by two of our brave volunteers on what was possibly the coldest day of the winter so far. Almost the entire reserve was frozen, displacing many of the birds, which was reflected in the low counts of many species. The goldeneyes were notable in their absence, as was the red-crested pochard, I am happy to say that they returned as soon as the ice thawed.

Over the past few weeks the water levels across the site have increased significantly which is brilliant news for the reserve. With 2015 being a rather dry year and having drained some of the water to enable the landscaping work to be carried out on the southern end of the site, the water levels had dropped so drastically that our floating bridge was grounded and had to be closed.

The dry conditions did not pose any real threat to the very resilient reed plants but it did slow the growth during spring and summer. Now the water levels are higher than they have been in almost six years which is great news and we are expecting a very productive growth season this year. You may have noticed that we have also carried out some reed cutting recently on two of the islands

on the reserve.

Cutting trials last winter proved to have a positive effect on the reed growth, stimulating the reed plants into producing strong dense stems. This will greatly benefit one species in particular, the currently not-so-elusive bitterns and I am pleased to report that not only has the floating bridge been re-opened, but that there have been numerous bittern sightings over the past few months.



The dense reed north of the boardwalk seems to be a favoured feeding spot and staff, volunteers and visitors alike have been regularly delighted to spot these relatively elusive birds. The best time to spot them is around dawn and dusk as they fly between their night-time roosts and daytime feeding areas. You can

also occasionally spot another bittern entering the reeds on the silt lagoons to the left of the public footpath as you approach the reserve, so keep your eyes peeled.

We are currently looking for volunteers to join our Beach Hut team, if you have a few hours to spare each week, enjoy meeting people and helping others to engage with nature and can offer a professional but friendly welcome to visitors please get in touch – you may also increase your bittern spotting chances ©

WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 18th February 2016 the Parish Council held its monthly Council meeting in the village hall.

A presentation was given by a representative from Midland Rural Housing. They are an independent organisation, which is working on



behalf of Newark and Sherwood District Council, looking into affordable housing in local villages.

Subject to Parish Council approval, a survey will be posted to each household in the villages to ascertain if there is a need within the village for affordable housing. The scheme is aimed, primarily, at people within the villages who are on low incomes who struggle to buy or rent in the village. If there proves a need, and with the consent of the Parish Council, Midlands Rural Housing will look for land within the villages to build the required amount of properties. Land is usually used at the boundary of the village on plots which might not normally get permission.

Details of the proposals were given to the Councillors and these will be discussed in greater detail at the next meeting before any decisions are made. I have attached details of Midland Rural Housing web site should anyone need further information about their proposals: www.midlandsruralhousing.org.uk

Collingham and District U3A (University of the Third Age) requested we mention their organisation and asked if anyone within Winthorpe, Langford and Holme would be interested in joining. The candidates must be willing to look after the day to day running of the Church and they must be confirmed (or be willing to be confirmed into the CofE). This meeting is open to everyone in the village, but only those on the electoral roll (for the church) may vote.

We are in the run up to Easter and as you can see we have plenty of services taking place, especially in Winthorpe. We have a Palm Sunday Morning Worship at Winthorpe which I'm told will be a little different this year. We have the group Final Hour at The Cross



Service where people from across the eleven churches of our group will meet at Winthorpe to reflect on the last hour of Christ as he was crucified. In the past one of our churches has been selected to hold the Service of Light and then the light has been carried to all the other churches in the group, not in the style of the Olympic torch but simply a candle in a jam jar nestling in the foot-well of the church warden's car. This year the Paschal candles will all be brought to the service in Winthorpe, where they will be lit and burn throughout the service.

There will not be an Easter Day service at Winthorpe this year, but there is one at Holme; to which everyone will be welcome.


