GIANT SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

How are your sunflowers doing? You should have some nice little plants starting to grow – remember to take good care of them so that they can grow as tall and healthy as possible. You might be coming home with a trophy in September! Our boys couldn't plant their seeds on Easter Sunday because we went away with our extended family for two weeks in the school holidays and would not have had a plant babysitter. We have planted them now and will have to give them extra love and attention to get them to catch up!

As the tiny plants start to get taller, they can be quite floppy and will need some support. Using a plastic tie, loosely fasten your plants to a small split cane. If the plants are on a windowsill they



will bend towards the sunlight. To keep them straight, half turn the pots every day. Remember, the straighter the plant, the taller it will be! Once the plants are about 10cm high, you can think about moving them outside (assuming our wonderful British weather isn't doing anything too crazy!).

Put them against the wall of your house for a couple of days to 'harden off' before transplanting them to larger pots or into a border. Can you think of any creative containers or places to plant your sunflowers? Just remember that they need plenty of sunshine and good drainage (if in a pot or container).

News from Langford Lowfields April 2016

It's been a strange few weeks here at Langford as we either seem to be basking in glorious sunshine or getting cold and wet in rain or hail storms! This however, hasn't deterred the birds and spring is definitely advancing as we have had first records of a number of our migrants in the last couple of weeks. Of the warblers, chiffchaff, willow warbler, sedge warbler and blackcap are now back on site and singing away with the dawn chorus. Little ringed plovers have returned, yellow wagtail have been recorded and the sand martins are busy excavating nest holes in the bank – currently around 25 holes are in preparation!

We have had some interesting birds passing through as well, with 3 black-tailed godwits, wheatear, rock pipit and sandwich tern – all species we don't see here that often!

In the coming weeks we await the return of our other breeding warbler species and it won't be long now before we are hearing our first cuckoos, with birds on their way north as I type!

Our volunteers have been busy as ever in the last month with a major

project to renovate the polytunnel. This has involved stripping all the old plastic and re-covering it with a new sheet, repairing the doors and building some new reed propagation bays. Our



polytunnel operation supports our reed planting programme on site by providing us with around 25,000 reed seedlings per year, so is a vital component of our habitat creation work here for bitterns, marsh harriers, bearded tits and more.

We are currently looking for volunteers to join our Beach Hut team. If you have a few hours to spare each week, enjoy meeting people and

helping others to engage with nature and can offer a professional but friendly welcome to visitors please get in touch – you may also increase your bittern spotting chances ©! 
MIDGES



On Thursday 21st April 2016, the Parish Council held its quarterly finance and monthly meeting in the village hall.

The Council received an update on the "Outreach Solution" regarding

the viability of a "temporary" Post Office in the village. The next step in the process is for this to go to public consultation between 14th April and 26th May 2016.

If you wish to raise any issues or concerns, details of who to contact have been placed on the village notice boards.

Notts County Council has informed the Parish Council that residents now need to register to use the County's recycling centres. This can be done on line at: nottinghamshire.gov.uk/registertorecycle or by phone on 0300 500 80 80.

As you may be aware, the defibrillator has now been placed in a yellow lockable cabinet on the village hall wall to the right hand side of the door. To access the cabinet, type in the access code (CY543) and turn the handle clockwise.

The defibrillator is stored in a bag and as it is battery powered, it can be taken directly to the incident. Instructions on how to use the defibrillator are in the bag.


