Phil and I have just had a couple of days in Stratford on Avon and thoroughly enjoyed ourselves. As we sat down together at our pretheatre dinner table, we couldn't ignore this bright and capital lettered message which was placed boldly between our delicious steak and chicken:

Celebrate the Moment!

Yes, we were being urged to book a table for Valentine's Weekend. It seems that romance can't be left to chance, but must be helped along at quite a cost.

It's not really surprising is it? Whatever we think of a commercialised St Valentine's Day, which can conveniently be stretched to a weekend, there's nothing new about wooing a lover with good food is there? 



# Old Text Messages (Part 7)

A continued Analogy by Bob Warriner



Langford
- The
Lonely
Knight

\*Copy of a Postcard picture of St Bartholomew's Church at Langford\*

**"Langford.** Its stone dwellings are on the highway, from which the big house is set back in lovely gardens and trees. Down a shaded lane leading to Holme the small church stands in company with the vicarage, with the Tudor manor house, now a farm, nearby.

In this great seclusion a lonely knight, carved in stone, lies within the altar rails of the church. The arms of the Pierreponts are on his armour, his helmet is on his head, his hands are at prayer, and with his feet rested. He comes from the closing years of the 14<sup>th</sup> century, and would know the 13<sup>th</sup> century tower which stands looking out over the pleasant meadows.

The chancel arch and the south arcade of the nave are about 1400; traces of an arcade which led to a vanished north aisle are in the nave wall outside.

A beautiful archway which once opened to a chapel is enriched with flower medallions, embattled capitals, and a hood ending in heads. Medieval windows fill the place with light, and the fine old roof of the nave has curious bosses and faces pleasing and ferocious. The piscine is old; the splendid font of Sicilian marble is modern.

Close by the church the little stream known as the Fleet meanders among the willows in what was once the bed of the Trent. It is over three centuries since the great flood left the River Trent in its present channel on the other side of Holme, leaving the tiny

Fleet to mark its old course"

( A passage from Arthur Mee's Nottinghamshire, circa 1938)

In the "Old Text Messages" articles I have searched to find material relating to Langford with it being the third corner of the Focal Point triangle. But, there seems to be a scarcity of postcard correspondence from that area. So no texts this time but what I have discovered though is some controversy over the origin of the village name.

We may be forgiven for thinking that the "ford" in the name Langford suggests this was probably a "long" shallow crossing point of the River Trent over flat terrain between Langford and \*Holme (\*then on the west bank) which would make it a long crossing, hence "Langford" is probably derived from a "long ford" which existed before the Trent altered course? (This theory is also currently endorsed by the Winthorpe local website)

But No! research into the name tells us that it was in fact the surname of a Knight that made Langford his home on moving up from the South West of England (Ancestry.co.uk specifically states that "Langford" in Nottinghamshire is an exception to the "long ford" origin idea) and that the name probably comes from the Old English Landa or Land, meaning land or land boundaries. This is contrary to the Winthorpe website explanation of the Langford name. Ancestry.co.uk say as follows: In 1229 Roger Langford was the sheriff of Cornwall and gave his name to the estate of Langford in Marhamchurch. In the same century his family branched north to where a Knight, Sir John Langford gave his name to the Nottinghamshire village. The family later branched back to Wiltshire where the family name was originally from. Personally I prefer the river crossing notion of "long ford" as the ancient river was said to become "fragmented" on this part of its course into a series of streams and riverlets mingling side by side. This is easy to imagine with the wide flat plain of the Trent valley bottom stretching westwards of Langford towards Holme and the Muskhams. It would be a place where travellers could hop or wade from bank to bank over many small waterways.

This map shows the spaced out dwellings of Langford. Notice the River Trent turns sharply west at Winthorpe whereas the old course flowed in the same direction as the Fleet.

Although Langford is currently located two miles from The River Trent it has not always been this way. In 1575 there was a cataclysmic flood which altered the course of the Trent which meant Langford and Holme were now on the same side of the river.



Before this change in the river's course the Trent used to flow next to St Bartholomew's Church and Holme was on the opposite bank. (c/o Wikipedia.co.uk) Also if you ever wondered why Langford seems to be two separate dwelling areas a field or two apart then perhaps this

extract from the Wikipedia website will enlighten you: "the least amount of people to ever live in Langford is <u>none</u> as in 1593 the village was 'dispeopled' to make way for sheep'. This also resulted in the present site of the village to be about half a mile from its previous site"

These records relate well to the history of Holme being a manor built on wealth gained from the wool trade in Europe's Calais Market by the Barton family, who may have had the power to evict people to enhance their sheep farming and encouraged by the now vacant land created by the old river bed between the villages.

And surely the carving of a Knight described by Arthur Mee is the tombstone or tribute to Sir John Langford.

# WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 19th January 2017 the Parish Council held its finance meeting, followed by the main council meeting in the village hall. The finance committee considered the Parish precept for the forthcoming year, 2017/18, and agreed that the Parish Council has enough reserves in place to cover



intended works, so the precept will remain unchanged for the next 12 months.



The Council have been informed by BT that they intend to remove the two pay phones in Winthorpe and Langford after closure of the 90 day consultation period on 15th February 2017. If there is no response before that date, the two phones and phone boxes will be removed.

In the last 12 months the Council were told that the Langford phone had four calls made from it and the Winthorpe phone has zero calls.

BT does give the community the opportunity to adopt the phone box for £1 should they so wish. The Parish

Council would welcome your views and will support the adoption of the two phone boxes if there is enough support and a genuine desire to do something with the boxes.

# **News from Langford Lowfields**

I saw a photograph this morning of an otter taken on the reserve. We had been finding

signs of these amazing mammals at Langford Lowfields for over a year

now, but this is the first photographic evidence of them being here. This is great news and further evidence of just how well the site is maturing and developing. The lucky person who spotted the otter was one of many who visited the reserve over the Christmas period to



try and get a glimpse of the bearded tits. There are at least seven of them on the reserve at the moment and they have been giving a lot of people brilliant views of these beautiful little birds as they feed on reed seed, close in to the boardwalk. Fingers crossed they will stick around all through the winter and breed again next year.

A challenge was set for our team of volunteers recently, to try and see The Big 3 in the space of a day, these being the 3 key wetland bird species we are aiming to attract to Langford; bearded tit, marsh harrier and bittern. Amazingly within the space of a couple of weeks, this historic feat was achieved by Stuart and Julie, two of our work party volunteers and then just a few days later one of our Beach Hut volunteers Andy managed to see The Big 3 in the space of 10 minutes!

Some people have commented on the lack of wintering ducks at Langford; this also seems to be the case on other sites and is probably linked to the relatively mild winter we are having (so far at least!). This has meant that a lot of birds have not seen the need to fly over to the UK and have saved themselves the effort by spending their winter in mainland Europe. If the temperature drops, this may well change though. Even if duck numbers are a bit low, a quick wander round the reserve should give you good views of wigeon, gadwall, teal, goldeneye, tufted

duck and pochard, maybe even one of the shelduck. Who knows maybe you'll even see The Big 3! or an otter!! and if you keep your ears open you should be able to pick out the explosive call of a Cetti's warbler or the piglet-like squealing of a water rail.

Habitat management work over these winter months focuses on scrub and woodland management. It is a long-term project but we hope to reduce the dominance of sycamore in the woodland and encourage the growth of native trees instead, particularly the oaks that are on site and the elms which support the elusive white-letter hairstreak butterfly. Rotational scrub management work around the perimeter of the reserve ensures that, to use a conservation phrase, we 'maintain a mosaic of habitats' on site. A range of ages within the hawthorn and blackthorn clumps, gives more 'structure' to the habitat and provides scope for a greater range and number of birds and insects to use these areas for nesting and feeding.

Depending on the availability of our volunteer team we try to have the Beach Hut welcome area open every day, so if you see or hear anything interesting on your wanderings around the reserve, please write it down in the book that lives in the Beach Hut or email us






# ALL SAINTS WINTHORPE CHURCH NOTICES


