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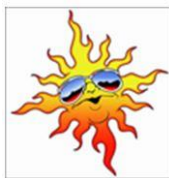

WINTHORPE YOUTH CLUB

You may or may not know that there has been a village Youth Club running in Winthorpe for at least 40 years, from which hundreds of children have benefitted, thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers and helpers, too numerous to mention.



The main fund raiser for the club throughout most of this time has been the annual Bonfire and Fireworks display which has normally managed to cover all of the annual running costs. As a result of this and the prudence of previous Management Committees the clubs finances are in a very healthy state.

Approximately 3 years ago a decision was taken by Nottinghamshire County Council (NCC) to withdraw support from the majority of Youth Services in the area, this meant that there would no longer be trained Youth Workers to facilitate and co-ordinate club nights and activity sessions, and also the Council would no longer indemnify the club or be in a position to share any resources.

A new Management Committee was formed from a group of local volunteers, who received some training from NCC and were also 'vetted' by them in order to ensure that they were able to run club nights. The club itself has now become a small charity and sought the help of the Parish Council, whom it asked to provide appropriate governance in relation to the running of the club and they agreed to this request.

At first the club continued to run very successfully with between 15 – 20 young people attending each week throughout term time (it was closed during the holidays). Unfortunately the numbers attending began to dwindle after about 18 months along with the number of volunteers and it has proved impossible to attract new young members or group leaders since.

In the autumn of 2016, the club was only being used by a couple of young people and it had only 4 regular 'helpers'. Sadly a decision was taken at this time to temporarily close the club and discuss future possibilities.

We are now in a new year but no further forward in relation to the club. It does not look like it can re-open, and certainly not without some new volunteers and young people who want to attend.

At a recent meeting with representatives of the Parish and County Councils, a variety of issues were discussed in relation to the club and its constitution, which states 'that in the event of the club folding or ceasing to remain operational then all assets should be used for the young people of the village'. Hence the reason for writing in 'Focal Point' at this time about the current situation.

Is there anyone out there who would like to try and relaunch the club? If so we would like to hear from you.

If the club is to close, what should we do with all the equipment and funds?

All ideas are welcome

WINTHORPE & LANGFORD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEME RECENT CRIME IN THE AREA

After a quiet period there has been an upsurge in crime in the local area. A number of sheds and outbuildings have been broken into and property taken. In most cases locks have been forced. Increasingly, valuable items like lawnmowers are being stored in sheds where the security is not as good as in the house and simple locks are inadequate.

In another incident locked patio doors were forced open and items stolen. A house security system activated by excessive vibration of any door or window is probably the safest protection and this can include sheds and outbuildings. If you are interested I can give you details.

Across the county there have recently been eleven burglaries where rogue traders have offered house improvements to the owner. Whilst engaged in conversation accomplices have entered through unlocked doors or windows and stolen items. Even when you are out in the garden it is important to keep doors and windows locked.

News from Langford Lowfields March and April

The start of April brought us some beautiful sunny weather and we were delighted to welcome some children to the reserve to enjoy pond dipping!



Restoration work has started on the part of the quarry to the south of the RSPB office. Following the current landscaping work this area will develop into a wildflower-rich grassland, that slopes gradually down to the edge of a reed-fringed lake. The landscaping has been designed so there are low spots within the grassland that will hold water during the wetter parts of the year.

Volunteers have been busy in silt lagoon 6 recently, doing some management work for bearded tits. Here we have removed a large amount of willow from the area they nested in last year and brushcut some feeding areas for them. They don't like too much willow around where they breed and love cut areas of reed where they can easily pick up insects for themselves and their young, so we hope our work will be enough to entice them back for 2017!

All this willow removal has produced a huge amount of brash! However, this hasn't been wasted as we are now aiming to use it to make 100 fish shelters for deployment in Phases 1, 2 and 3. These submerged willow brash bundles provide places for fish to hide, spawn and generally go about their business. This helps to build up their populations by increasing survival.



There have been a great many wildlife sightings : a great white egret, andrena fulva (tawny mining bee), cuckoo flower in bloom, avocets on the silt lagoon, bombylius major (bee fly), comma butterfly, blackcap, sand martin, sedge,

willow warblers, yellow wagtail, teal, curlew, redshank, widgeon, gadwall, lapwings and buzzards.

We are holding a 'Dawn Chorus' guided walk on 28 May 2017 - 7am-9am. This is a pre bookable event. Join the warden for a leisurely early morning stroll around Langford Lowfields, including a 'behind the scenes' peek at areas not yet open to the public. Brush up on your bird song identification and enjoy the sights and sounds of the breeding season as birds are busy raising their young. Bring clothing suitable for the weather and strong footwear.

May Reflection from The Rector

Dear friends,

What do you think about this? Apparently robots are set to take over the world making us all redundant. Imagine finishing work and treating yourself to afternoon tea from the vending machine before the automatic doors open up the way to home. You climb into your driverless car, relax and glance at your watch to catch up with the world and at the same time switch on the heating so that you walk into your warm cosy house just before the groceries arrive.



This isn't hard to imagine, a lot of it is everyday reality, but what about robots carrying out personal care in hospital or home? Should we draw a line between work for robots and work for humans? Should we ask what makes us different from machines? Indeed, should we ask what makes us human?

Surprisingly, this is on my mind because I've watched the film *Beauty and the Beast*. It's a good film about a spell bound household. The master of the house has been turned into a beast and his servants into household objects. They can still communicate, think, feel, plot and plan but as time passes they become less human and the dreadful day arrives when their eyes and mouths close.

It wasn't technological advances which caused the loss of humanity but it was selfishness. The master of the house had amassed great wealth for himself and refused to share it. He refused to help a woman who was

neither young and beautiful nor desirable. He had lost his humanity and all those around him paid a terrible price.

Happily, that is not the end of the story. The Beast is rescued by the kindness, friendship and love of Belle who warms his cold heart and the lifeless household objects become happy, loving human beings again.

The film does end happily ever after.

What about us? What makes us human? Is it the type of job we do or is it the connections we make with other people?

When are we in danger of losing our humanity? Is it when we use a machine to do a job or when we use other people? Is it when we try to keep ourselves safe and happy by refusing to share our possessions and talents? Is it when we try to save money without thinking about the people who are providing the goods we buy?

I think it's a good idea to think about these things every now and then, just to give ourselves a humanity check.

And if anyone knows a machine which will take wet laundry out of the washing machine, hang it out to dry then iron it and put it away, please let me know ...

On Thursday 20th April 2017, the Parish Council held its finance meeting and main council meeting in the village hall.



The Council welcomed Fiona Jones, the Chair of Winthorpe School Governors, who gave a presentation which asked the Parish Council if it would be prepared to fund urgent works to the school grounds. These are works that the school has to fund itself without Local Authority assistance. The Council agreed in principal to the request by providing a contribution to the works.

The finance committee reviewed and agreed the year end accounts which will shortly be forwarded to Grant Thornton so they can undertake an external audit. Details of where to view the accounts after the audit has been completed will be provided in future issues of Focal Point

The Council has received further notification that its proposal to purchase the Phone Boxes in Winthorpe and Langford is receiving attention and BT will notify us when this has been completed.

The Chairman would like to thank all the villagers who responded to the MUGA questionnaire that appeared in a previous edition of Focal Point. There were a total of 41 responses with only 1 response not in favour of the proposal. I will keep you updated as matters progress.

A further defibrillator training session has been organised for Thursday 25th May 2017 in the Community Centre starting at 7:30pm. This is being run by Newark Community First Aid and as we now have two defibrillators within the village, it is well worth attending. 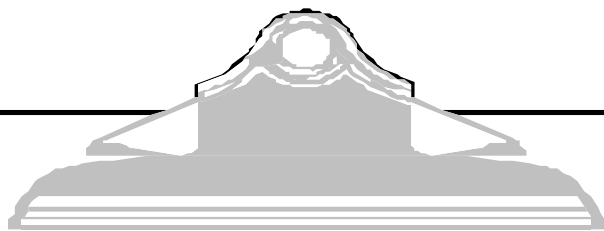
