#### Another idea for gooseberries



As the fruit in my garden swells and hangs in abundance I again go to my recipe book to look for an inventive way to encourage my family to eat yet another portion. Many years ago, while Estonia was still in the USSR, we travelled to Tallinn and sampled this delicious cake in a central coffee shop. My interpretation is very simple and is great hot with custard or cool with cream.

Turn your oven on to 200°C, gas 6, and

then start. Grease a Swiss roll tin and arrange fruit on the tin. Put in the oven while you mix together 100g (4oz) SR flour, 100g sugar, 100g soft margarine and 2 eggs. Beat well then spread over the hot fruit. Cook until the sponge is risen and golden brown, about 20 minutes. If you are serving it cold leave it to cool in the pan. Serve upside down - yummy! #### **Reflection July 2017**

#### Dear friends,

In May and June we were rocked by the news of atrocious, murderous attacks in Manchester and London, in Egypt and Kabul. The attacks came fast, one after another so that words of horror and condemnation were quickly used up.

Maybe you know someone who was injured or who just avoided being in a place of danger. Maybe you know someone who lives nearby the attack sites. Maybe you've breathed a sigh of relief that children or grandchildren are safe but maybe you've spent some time thinking what if....where next?

Such brutal, calculated violence has a devastating effect and can be disorientating. Maybe it's like being spun around until we're face to face with a new reality which is divided, unpredictable and dangerous.

So how do we respond? Should we carry on as normal, refusing to let *them* win?

Or should we do something different?



If we choose to welcome fear, anger and vengeance, we are in danger of colluding with terrorists, letting them take control by reacting in the

way they've intended.

We shouldn't deny fear and anxiety and national security measures must be taken and implicated very seriously; however the division, unpredictability and danger is not the only reality. As the news has spun us around, we've also come face to face with great courage and the generous giving of sacrificial help. We've come face to face with crowds of men, women and children who were determined to stand together in defiance of evil intent to cause division, fear and death.

So which way are we going to face? As a Christian priest at baptisms, it's my duty to ask parents and Godparents if they are ready to turn away from everything that separates us from God and neighbour and if they are ready to turn to Jesus Christ. This is an important part of being a Christian.

Being a Christian doesn't bring any easy answers to violent hatred, guarantees of safety or freedom from fear, but it does give us a focus on life giving love, love which brought Jesus back from the dead and which transforms our life now.

May I encourage you to pray for all victims of violence, for our security forces and for hateful hearts and minds to turn away from violence.

May I encourage you also to be active in kindness, friendship and helpfulness and to do all you can to help build up our community. God bless you,

#### A HOLIDAY IN JORDAN

I spent the last week in April on holiday in Jordan which was a fascinating and quite thought provoking experience.

The first thing most people ask is was it safe? The answer to that is yes. There was obviously high security everywhere. We all got used to bags being scanned and armed police. There was a tourist policeman with our group. He was very useful when we needed to cross the road! But everybody was very friendly and anxious that we had a good impression of the country.

Everybody thinks of Jordan as Petra and Indiana Jones! There is so much more. We stood where Moses stood to see the Promised Land. We visited Bethany where Christ was baptised and stood by the Jordan looking into Israel. We



saw Petra which was started 10,000 B.C; Roman ruins, crusader castles and the desert with the Seven Pillars of Wisdom where we expected Lawrence of Arabia to appear over the horizon. We finished with (for the brave!) a dip in the Dead Sea.

However the thing that will stay with me was how tolerant they are as a society. Our guide proudly told us it did matter if you were Muslim or Christian they were all Jordanians. We saw women in everything from western dress to fully veiled all enjoying freedoms we take for granted here and all mixing together without any problem or segregation. This



was particularly noticeable with the younger generation

They are not a wealthy country (we saw signs of wealth but also extreme poverty) but they are coping with between two to three million refugees, making sure they are properly looked after and trying to integrate them into the country. They are getting on with,

living with and dealing with the problem.

I am very pleased I went: maybe not a true holiday but an unforgettable experience. Frances Kelly

# WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 15th June 2017, the Parish Council held its monthly Parish Council meeting in the village hall.

The Parish Councils accounts for 2016/2017 are available to be viewed. Details of how to obtain copies have been posted on the village notice boards.



The second defibrillator is now in location to the Community Centre Wall. The access code is C159X.The emergency services have been notified of its location and have the access code.

As mentioned in the last edition of Focal Point, the original planning permission for the burial site on Hargon Lane has lapsed. The Parish Council has submitted a new application to Newark and Sherwood District Council to site the burial area in the same location as previously granted. The Parish Council are happy to provide details if required.

The Parish Council has received an email from Newark & Sherwood District Council about the new Dog Control Powers. In September this year their Dog Control Powers will change slightly. Dog Control Orders will be repealed and replaced by Public Space Protection Orders. As part of this process the District Council is required to review all existing Dog Control Orders to establish if they are still relevant and necessary. As part of this consultation process they are inviting all the Parishes who have Dog Control Orders declared within their Parish to complete a questionnaire so that they can evaluate their views on how successful they have been in managing and promoting responsible dog walking.


