



THE WITHAM VALLEY PARK PRESERVATION GROUP



The Witham Valley Park Preservation Group (WVPPG) have continued their work to raise awareness of Lincoln Proteins Ltd.'s plan to build an animal rendering factory at Villa Farm, Norton Disney. If built, the factory will affect up to 10,000 people in the surrounding villages and if the A46 is

closed, its lorries will be diverted through Langford, Collingham and other villages.

Key events to date have included:-

Submission of e-Petition with over 3500 signatures to Lincolnshire County Council in December 2017.

On the same date, the WVPPG outlined their major concerns to a full assembly of County Councillors. You can watch this five-minute presentation on LCC's YouTube

channel @ https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=vRX7UT_0VzI (skip to 9 mins 40 secs).

On 30th December 2017, over 400 people supported a peaceful Demonstration March, walking from Villa Farm to Norton Disney village. A Police Escort led walkers, cyclists, horse riders and families along the 2 mile route. Look North, Newark Advertiser and Lincolnshire Echo all reported on the March. BBC



Radio Lincs featured the event in both Rod Whiting's Breakfast Show on 30th Dec and Scott Dalton's Breakfast Show on 15th January alongside a feature on "Smelly Skelly". You can

In January 2018, a second e-petition was launched to protect the 1st to 4th century Roman Villa situated yards from the front door of Villa Farm, finds from which are displayed at "The Collection" in Lincoln and Newark's Civil War museum. https://www.change.org/p/lincolnshire-county-council-save-the-norton-disney-roman-villa

We are still awaiting submission of Lincoln Protein's Planning Application and will advise once submitted on how to forward positive feedback or objections to Lincolnshire County Council.

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day?

Shrove Tuesday is the Christian festival before the beginning of the great fast of Lent which leads up to Easter commemorating the death and resurrection of Christ almost two thousand years ago. It is a moveable



feast being 47 days before Easter Sunday and this year falls on 13th February. In our culture many of us just call Shrove Tuesday Pancake Day; the day when perishable goods would be consumed before being 'given up' for Lent. This date also marks the day when British Christians would go to confession to be 'Shriven' or absolved from their sins.

In order to make successful pancakes a good quality heavy fry pan is needed. I would recommend proving the pan before you start in order to clean out any salts that might cause the pancake to stick. Put the empty pan on the heat and add a tablespoon of dry salt. Use a soft cloth to rub the hot pan (Caution - it will be HOT) and watch as the salt lifts ingrained dirt. After a few minutes remove the pan and wipe the salt into your sink or bin. Using a fresh cloth now rub the pan with a generous measure of cooking oil. Wipe it clean and do not wash; you are now ready to make pancake.

The ingredients in a pancake have a religious significance according to the internet site I was reading:-

4 oz. (100g) plain flour (the staff of life)

a pinch of salt (Wholesomeness)

2 eggs (creation)

7 fluid oz. (200ml) milk (purity)

Mix all these ingredients together. As you beat the batter it should make a slapping sound but you can add a little cold water if the mixture is too thick.

When the pan is hot add a ladle of mixture and move the pan to allow the batter to spread across the surface. When one side is golden flip the pancake and give the other side a quick cooking. You may need a little oil to lubricate the pan again if it begins to stick. Serve immediately or keep the pancakes warm inside a folded tea towel.

Now just add the toppings of your choice, a little sugar and lemon, jam, honey or syrup, sliced fresh fruit or even chocolate sauce and enjoy. A clever commercial producer a few years back made pancakes filled with a savoury sauce, folded over and served as a



main meal with vegetables or salad. Let your imagination go wild!

News from Langford Lowfields a home News from Langford Lowfields January 2018

We are looking ahead to a new year at Langford Lowfields, reflecting on what happened during 2017, including:

- 5200 reed seedlings planted in one day, by volunteers and staff during the annual North Midlands One Team jamboree event at Langford in September 2017.
- 520 visitors in a month were recorded in February 2017, these counts are always an underestimate, but this is the highest monthly count to date.
- 139 species of bird were recorded at Langford during 2017. Of these, 64 species were recorded as breeding or holding territory during the breeding season, including the largest colony of breeding avocet in Nottinghamshire with 6 pairs raising 13 youngsters.





- The first ever nightingale at Langford, was heard singing in the woodland from 4th 24th May. Water shrews, stone loach, Brent goose and water pipit were also recorded on site for the first time.
- The long anticipated outfall sluice at Langford is now complete. We are claiming it as the largest freshwater control structure on any RPSB reserve,

with the culvert pipe through the river flood bank measuring 50m in length and 2m in diameter.

- The new Langford sand martin bank has been built. 300 tonnes of sand were used in the new sustainable design that should provide nesting habitat for 200 sand martin pairs.
- Restoration of Langford Phase 3 is nearing completion, this will add 35ha of prime undisturbed reedbed habitat to the reserve, ideal for a range of exciting wildlife.
- We had a historic breeding season, with reedbed highlights including 2 pairs of breeding bearded tits, the only booming bittern in Nottinghamshire (so loud that it could be heard 800m away in the visitors' car park) and a record 22 squealing water rails.

More recently, in the last week or so, there have been sightings of great wildlife at Langford. Highlights include a small skein of pink-footed geese, a raven, a stonechat, 6 goldeneyes and a couple of redshanks, plus a number of snipe, a jack snipe, a barn owl, 3 roe deer, a hare, a fox, a fox with a hare in its mouth and a late afternoon murmuration of 5,000 starlings! Whether the starlings remain on the reserve is unknown, they left



us last November just as their numbers reached about 30,000! It may well be that the higher water levels now on the reserve have provided more safe roosting sites for the starlings and lured them back.

The floating bridge has reopened now that the water levels have risen sufficiently. The Christmas Trail was a success, and we hope to run another trail in the Easter holidays. **Angela Roberts**

WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council held its monthly Parish Council meeting and its quarterly finance meeting in the Village Hall on Thursday 18th January 2018.

The finance committee considered the Parish precept for the forthcoming year, 2018/2019, and



agreed that the Parish Council has enough reserves in place to cover any intended works. Therefore, the precept will remain unchanged for a further 12 months.

The main Parish Council meeting discussed the condition of the trees on the Burial Plot land off Hargon Lane and agreed to contact N.S.D.C. with a view to pollarding some of the trees and asking permission to remove some trees that are in a dangerous or diseased condition.

N.S.D.C planning department are considering the Parish Council application to put a storage shed on the allotment field. This will be used for the storage of tools and equipment for the allotment holders. It will be positioned to the rear of the field and will be "hidden" with trees, etc and so will have little impact on the field.

A point was raised by a councillor as a local resident had contacted him to say they did not know what happened at Parish Council meetings.

All residents are entitled to attend the meetings which are held on the 3rd Thursday of every month (except August) and all minutes are published on the village website.





