Talk by Maddie Horrocks

On Wednesday 24th October at 7.30pm in the Community Centre Maddie Horrocks will give a talk about her expedition to Ecuador this year. The talk and Power Point presentation will be given just before the AGM of the Charity of Thomas Brewer. The Charity was able to help Maddie reach the total cost of the expedition. This is what Maddie said in her application for financial help: *"This summer I have been given the opportunity to travel to Ecuador where I will be volunteering for a*

month. The projects I will be working on are firstly environmental where I will be helping protect the animal habitats in forest Manquipucuna. Also, I will be promoting reforestation, water collection and management in the Amazon rainforest. For a week I will be staying with the Kichwa community to help improve rural schooling. The exceptional trip will also enable me to visit the Galapagos Islands where I will be studying the unique wildlife and see as well as photograph the impact our lifestyles have on these innocent species".

WOULD YOU LIKE TO HAVE A MINI – COMMUNITY ORCHARD IN WINTHORPE?

.....If so, please read on – before 12th October!



Our local Allotment Association have recently applied for a grant of £500 via Skipton Building Society's "Grassroots Giving" scheme. This scheme will make grants of £500 to 165 community groups across the UK and whilst there is still some way to go to succeed, our

application has overcome the first hurdle and is shortlisted to gain an award.

This is where you can help because the awards are made based upon the number of public votes gained by each application.... and voting finishes on 12th October!!

Our application is based upon establishing a small community orchard on some spare space on the allotments field down Holme Lane. This area is immediately behind the hedgerow running along Holme Lane and is not suitable for use as an allotment. We would like to create a separate area from the rest of the site and establish a variety of fruit trees and bushes, the produce from which would be made available to people living in the parish.

Because this would be of benefit to the wider community, we do not want the project to establish the orchard, nor its ongoing maintenance (albeit this will be very little) to be seen as something looked after entirely by the allotments association. It follows from this that it would be unfair for the costs involved to be paid for from the association's own funds which are required for looking after the main allotment site.

Hence our application for the grant. If we gain an award, there would almost certainly be a need to obtain further funds to implement the project, however we feel a successful award will 'kick-start' that process. Whilst the physical work involved would not be major, we will also want local people to volunteer to help with creating the space, weed clearance, tree planting etc. These details and plans would all be arranged if, and when, we have funds in place. So if you agree that what we have in mind is a good thing to do, please help us start the whole thing off by voting for our project via the Skipton Grassroots Giving website by 12th October. This can be accessed as follows:

From the main page (where you can read a little more about the Grassroots Giving scheme), to get to our project and vote for it, click on the label "2018 shortlisted groups" down the left hand side of the screen. On the next page, click on the "East Midlands" label of the UK map. Then on the list of groups for the East Midlands, our project is number 23. Clicking on our project will bring up information around our grant application and at the bottom you can place your vote. You will need to do so by entering an email address, this is to ensure duplicate voting doesn't take place. If you have people in your family with their own email address, each person can vote separately (please!).

We hope that we are successful and that this project can be seen through to 'fruition'. If we get the grant, we will of course keep you updated with plans and how you can help in future editions of Focal Point. Meanwhile, if you have any questions, ideas or offers of help that can assist the project, please email me at <u>david.barthorpe@ntlworld.com</u>.

This will only succeed if it is seen as a project run by the community, for the community. It just happens to be on the allotments site.

On a couple of other allotment related matters, we have a few plots coming available so if you would like to have an allotment, please email me. This will ensure you are placed on the waiting list.

Sadly, we have had a few occasions of 'uninvited visitors' coming on to the site and this increased somewhat during the school summer holidays. Whilst we will always be happy to show anybody around the field, may I politely remind parents that nobody (other than allotment holders and properly authorised people such as drainage board staff) should come onto the site unless accompanied by an allotment holder. A few items belonging to various allotment holders have been removed or damaged and whilst it is relatively small scale, it would be a great shame for the village if this was to become a significant issue. Update from the Patient Participation Group (PPG) for Collingham Medical Centre

A PPG SUMMER

The 5th July 2018 saw the celebration of the Big7tea, a national celebration of the 70th birthday of the NHS.

The Patient Participation Group with Collingham Medical Centre hosted a day event at the Medical Centre. The room was appropriately decorated with bunting providing a welcoming atmosphere and it was a light hearted occasion when we welcomed so many people from all around the area that we just lost count!

Despite this being a free event, donations totalling £285 were collected. The money will be divided between the Newark and Lincoln Hospital charities. Thank you to all those who donated the refreshments and to all those who came along to make the occasion such a success.

One late August evening the Patient Participation Group with the Collingham Medical Centre hosted a presentation by Mr Ant Rosevear, the Assistant Chief Operating Officer at Newark Hospital, in the Memorial Hall in Collingham. Around 70 people were welcomed with a cup of tea or coffee and had the opportunity to find out what the PPG had done in the past year and to take home some detailed information about all the services available at Newark Hospital. Ant spoke with enthusiasm and was clear about his three take home messages:

Newark Hospital is NOT closing. There has recently been a one million pound investment to improve the infrastructure of the hospital.

There is an engaged and motivated staff. They are on a journey... recent progress has achieved a 'Good' CQC rating with some 'Outstanding' features.

There is an increase of 14% in the number of outpatients being seen at Newark which makes 5000 people not having to travel to other hospitals.

2019 and beyond...

To encourage more elective patients

Urgent Care to meet local needs

To provide cancer diagnosis and care locally

To provide work force development and improve the capacity of the building.

To get an 'OUTSTANDING' CQC rating.
