Seasonal Flu Vaccination Campaign 2020

We will be holding 3 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 26 September 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 10 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 31 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2020 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Due to COVID social distancing measures, our Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Vaccinations will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation. Face masks must be worn. Please attend alone, unless a family member is also booked for flu vaccination.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

Housebound patients will be contacted by the practice in due course.


"THANK YOU, LORD NELSON!"




WINTHORPE ALLOTMENTS



Have you ever thought the origins of the humble allotment?


Many people say they were started during the world wars providing vitally needed food in times of rationing. Indeed, allotments were very important back then, providing some 1.3 million tons of food during world war two. However, allotments go back as far as the 1500's and became gradually formalized into law when the 1887 Allotments Act obliged local authorities to provide allotments if there was a demand for them. Winthorpe Allotment Association is kindly supported by the Parish Council as landlords of the site.




Can you measure a countries economic performance by the number of allotments?

Demand for allotments peaked at 1.4 million allotment plots during world war two, falling rapidly as the country rose in prosperity. At around 330,000 plots in the UK today, demand for allotments increased during 2008 financial crisis and again during this current Covid pandemic. Winthorpe allotment has 31 plots which are all currently fully occupied by some seasoned professionals and some newcomers to growing their

> own vegetables and fruits. All share knowledge and experiences, and the result








Never too late to grow

On Thursday 16th July 2020, the Parish Council held its Annual Parish meeting followed by the Monthly Parish Council meeting. These meetings were held in the garden at the Lord Nelson to comply with the Covid 19 social distancing regulations.

The Parish accounts have now been audited and they will be available for inspection from 2nd August for 30 working days. Please contact me if you require a copy.

The ongoing problem of rabbits around the play park on the Community Centre was discussed. The Council is to appoint a specialist to deal with this issue. This work will commence in September and take a number of visits to deal with the matter. I will keep you advised, via the village website, with the dates when this is due to take place.

The Council were updated regarding the travellers site alongside the A1. The decision form the Local Authority was appealed and it is unlikely that a final decision will be made on this matter before the end of the year.

The Council have asked its District Councillors to contact N.S.D.C. see if "Smiley Face" speed awareness signs can be placed in the village to try and control traffic speeds throughout the village. This is in addition to using a "speed gun" in the village. I will keep you updated on developments.

There is no Parish Council meeting in August so I wish you all a good summer in these difficult times and look forward to contacting you again in September.

News from Langford Lowfields

We were delighted to welcome our volunteers back onto site after the lockdown on Sunday 5th July. It was great to see everyone and to get some good work done! The first job was to pull the ragwort in our hay cutting areas. Ragwort is poisonous to livestock, so the hay we make and sell for animal feed has to be ragwort free. We usually get about 65 bales of good quality hay from our grasslands, which makes us a bit of money to put back into running of the reserve. Hay cutting also benefits the grassland itself. By doing a late season hay cut, we allow the wildflowers to go to seed. Wildflowers also don't like

a lot of nutrients in the soil. Therefore cutting and removing the bulk of the plant material means that there isn't too much vegetation to rot down and add nutrients to the soil.

The volunteers have also been busy doing some fencing repairs along the western edge of the site. This fencing was damaged when we flooded back in March, so it is good to finally get the repairs done.



GREAT WHITE EGRET

We have had some good wildlife on site recently, with the highlights being the four Great White Egrets. These birds have been getting more common in the UK over the last few years and are great to see, especially when stood next to a Little Egret and the size difference can be appreciated! Other wildlife sightings include Peregrine,

Bittern, several Black-tailed Godwits, Hobbys, Yellow-legged Gulls and some unseasonable records of winter visitors including Goldeneye, Wigeon and Grey Wagtail.

The site is nearly fully open now, with both the visitor trails and the 360 viewing area open. We hope to be able to open the boardwalk, bridge and Beach Hut soon.




