


Make sure to check out Winthorpe village's website to keep up with all the latest news, as well as Holme village's website (Not Secure)!

Seasonal Flu Vaccination Campaign 2020

We will be holding 3 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 26 September 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 10 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 31 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2020 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Due to COVID social distancing measures, our Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Vaccinations will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation.

Face masks must be worn. Please attend alone, unless a family member is also booked for flu vaccination.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

Housebound patients will be contacted by the practice in due course.

These are appointment only clinics. Appointments will be available to book from August. Please contact the number below or ask at Reception.

NEWARK FOODBANK






Thank you all those of you who so generously contribute to Winthorpe's collection in aid of Newark Foodbank. I am told by the Foodbank that the recent months have been very difficult to cope with due to schools being closed, then on the summer break, leading to an increase in demand. This coupled with the warehouse and distribution points losing volunteers who needed to self-isolate or shield made for a double whammy for the Foodbank. Then just as new ways of working were settling down and the Foodbank was keeping up with requests for help, there has been another steep increase in demand in September due to a sharp rise in unemployment. So, I guess you know what I am going to say next....... Please, please help by donating what you can. Donations of food and toiletries can be left at: the black swing bin at the side of my front door, 11 Gainsborough Road. Donations can be placed in there 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is checked daily.

Demand is expected to grow even more over the winter. Luckily Newark has many well run charities, and the Foodbank is currently working with the Salvation Army, Social Services, Framework, the Children's Centre, Emmaus Trust, churches and others to try and ensure that demand can be met.

Because of changing systems and personnel at the Foodbank, I am not able to let you know how much our last two deliveries to the warehouse weighed. I have been promised that these will be sent to me soon, and I will include them in the next Focal Point. Once again, thank you.

-WINTHORPE PRIMARY SCHOOL-

As you know the country has been in lockdown since March which meant that schools closed. The only pupils that have been to school are those with key worker parents. Home-schooling has been hard because the things that teachers have been sending, parents couldn't understand which has slowed down education all over the country. Boris Johnson opened schools back up three weeks ago and now all over the country schools have opened like ours although some people wish they had stayed home to play games.

Being home was very different to being at school. I was missing things I saw at school and so was most people. Not many people did spellings at home. Our first spelling tests weren't very good because we were at home for a long time. Now were getting back into the way of school now with harder sums and different people.

When we were told stay in so called 'bubbles' each child has to stay with their class all the time and people thought we had to literally stay in a bubble. Our outdoor space has been separated into three parts and class one area. Each class has their own area for a day and swaps every day. A lot of the people in this school have friends from different classes which makes it harder for them to talk to each other.

We all leave enter different times and different ways. Some pupils have siblings so you have to be earlier to wait you have to social distance from different classes at the gate. We eat lunch in our class rooms and don't leave them unless you need to go to the toilet. Class Four have to use the boy's toilets even if you're a girl. Secretly, between us it's the most disgusting toilet I've ever been in.

We've been learning about different things and one of the things we've done is moral choices and one question came up and it said you broke one of your mums irreplaceable ornaments what do you do then one of the answer was I will tell my mum that the cat was practising its ninja skills and knocked over the ornament.

School has been great and most of us our happy to be back.

On Thursday 17th September 2020, the Parish Council held its Monthly Parish Council meeting using the power of "Zoom" to comply with the Covid 19 social distancing regulations.

The Chairman introduced Peter Bateson, Chair of the Community Centre, who gave an update on the current state of centre and its position going forward. Details of the discussions will be provided in the September Parish Council minutes

The Parish Council has decided not to hold the annual bonfire this year due to the Covid 19 restrictions that may be in place when the event is due to be held in November.

The Clerk provided an update on Focal Point and its position going forward. It continues to be a success due to the hard work from its editor, Lizzie, and Duncan Richardson. However, it does rely on support from the Parish Council and advertisement sales. If you want to advertise in the magazine, please contact Lizzie who can provide further details

Following discussions with N.S.D.C, the Council voted unanimously to start on the process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan for the future of the village. This will require input from the whole village and details will be provided in due course.

The Council were updated on the proposed "Newlink" business development that is to take place on the A17. The Council have raised its concerns regarding the increased traffic it will bring to an already congested area.

The Chairman received a letter from Robert Jenrick MP, who stated that he would be willing to attend a future Parish Council meeting, if asked. The Council welcomed the offer and the Clerk is to write and invite him to a future meeting.

RSPB Langford Lowfields

- October News 2020



It's been another busy few weeks here at Langford and it's certainly feeling a bit autumnal out on the reserve. Our volunteers have had two main tasks in the last month – the first being reed planting out on Phase 3. You can see this part of the reserve looking south from the Seasonal Trail. We are planting up two islands with seedlings grown in our polytunnel and fencing them off from hungry geese. We have to fence off all our planted reed to protect it from geese that will eat the young shoots. We have already planted around 6000 seedlings this year and aim to plant another 5000-6000 before the end of the planting season in October.

The second big task for our volunteers this month has been recovering the polytunnel with new plastic. Always a big job, this involves digging out the previous plastic that is buried at the sides of the tunnel, stretching the new plastic over the top of the hoops (another hard job), the filling in the sides with soil to hold it down. The volunteers have done a brilliant job on this, which should be good for the next five years. The next job is to repair the leaking reed propagation bays in the tunnel.



As always, we have had some good wildlife sightings in the last month. Waders continue to pass through the site on their migration from northern breeding grounds south. Records include Dunlin, Ruff, Ringed Plover, Common Sandpiper, Green Sandpiper, Spotted Redshank, Greenshank, Turnstoneand Grey Plover. Other birds on passage include Wheatear, Hobby and Garganey. There are still some Great White Egrets about, although some of the six we had in August have moved on elsewhere. Some of our winter visitors have arrived already, with Wigeon, Teal, Goldeneye and Pintail all recorded in the last month. Yellow-legged and Caspian Gulls are frequenting the gull flock on Phase 3. The Bittern and Marsh Harrier have been seen recently too. Look out for the Bittern in reed from the Seasonal Trail and from north of the boardwalk. And perhaps the most surprising record of the last month....two Gannets that flew over the site on the 18th September!

The reserve is still fully open, with a one-way system in place over the floating bridge and boardwalk and the Beach Hut open when there is a volunteer on duty. So please come down and see us for a walk and a spot of birding and enjoy your visit.



WRINKLES



Dear Friends

Masked shoppers clean their hands, baskets and trolleys and keep well away from each other. Thankfully, neighbours and friends have continued to shop for other people and more food delivery services have been set up.
