Seasonal Flu Vaccination Campaign 2020

We will be holding 3 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 26 September 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 10 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm Saturday 31 October 2020, from 8.00 am – 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2020 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Due to COVID social distancing measures, our Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Vaccinations will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation.

Face masks must be worn. Please attend alone, unless a family member is also booked for flu vaccination.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

Housebound patients will be contacted by the practice in due course.

First of all, many thanks to those of you who continue to donate most generously, including a recent generous cash donation which I have paid into the Foodbank's account.

The most recent Foodbank collection from Winthorpe weighed in at **36.6kg.** Thank you. Once again though I would like to use this opportunity to urge you to give whatever you can to help others. If you have not donated before, now would be an excellent time to start. Newark Foodbank is expecting this quarter to be the busiest of the year when the effect of the ending of the furlough scheme and unemployment starts to kick in.

The good news is that we are now back to 3 collection points in the village which are:

The black swing bin at the side of my front door,_11 Gainsborough Road. Donations can be placed in there 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is checked daily.

The church porch, when it is open for services and Thursday afternoon when the church is open for private prayer between 1.30p.m. and 3.30p.m.

The shop at the Lord Nelson. I am pleased to say that Susie and Emma at the pub have very kindly offered to have a Foodbank collection point in the shop, so that is great news, so please think of donating next time you are there, or popping in especially.

There will no longer be a collection point at the village hall.

WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL







On Thursday 15th October 2020, the Parish Council held its quarterly finance meeting followed by the monthly Parish Council meeting using the power of "Zoom" to comply with the Covid 19 social distancing regulations.

The Clerk confirmed that its external auditors, PKF Littlejohn, were happy with the accounts for 2019-2020 and that despite the accounts being published for external viewing, no one had taken up the opportunity to see them.

The Parish Council discussed the future of the Winthorpe Community Centre following the presentation at the last meeting by Peter Bateson, Chair of the Community Centre. The Council took the unanimous view that the Community Centre should remain as an independent body with its own set of Trustees, rather than be amalgamated under the "wing" of the Parish Council.

The Council also discussed proposals put forward by the Cricket Club to fence the cricket ground to prevent public access to the field. This has been brought about by the continued misuse of the field by some dog walkers who fail to clear up any mess left by their dogs. This has been an ongoing problem for many years and despite repeated appeals in Focal Point, the problem remains. I will advise you of the Councils view in due course.

The Council raised the issue of the poor road repairs undertaken by NCC Highways throughout the village with its District Councillor. The Clerk is to formally write to NCC Highways on this matter.

Speed monitoring equipment has been place at the start of the village. The Parish Council requested this due to the number of vehicles that exceed the speed limit along Gainsborough Road.

On the plus side, if you are vegan these recipes are certainly for you! But if you are not, you can perfectly substitute the dairy-alternatives with dairy products.





Work will also be carried out on the entrance to the field in front of the Community Centre, so there may be short periods when it won't be possible to access the Community Centre car park.





COMMUNITY CENTRE CHARITY UPDATE UPDATE - AGM MEETING UPDATE

The Trustees of the Charity met virtually on Monday 5 October 2020 for the Annual General Meeting. The meeting received a report from the Chairman who summarised a difficult year for the Charity with reduced opening, but was pleased to report the finances were satisfactory following a recent COVID grant from NSDC.

The Operation and Maintenance Committee reported that they were dealing with a number of repairs and replacements including the repair of the steps at the Centre that had been vandalised. The bridge over the river at the bottom of the footpath was also being altered to reduce the steepness of the slope over the river, and the grass bank and trees along the footpath would shortly be trimmed. The re-opening of the Centre was considered by the Trustees but this would still be subject to a full Risk Assessment and initially only available to those organisations that were permitted to meet indoors. A further update will follow.

The Trustees all agreed to either stay in their current role for the Charity or remain as a representative for their chosen organisations with the exception of our Treasurer, Duncan Richardson. Duncan had already given notice at the previous AGM that he was standing down after 20 years in the role, beginning when the new Centre was opened in 2000. The Chairman paid tribute to Duncan for his long term dedication and support and Duncan agreed to manage the handover to Nina Adams, the new Treasurer.

- November News 2020



Hi, it's Lizzie here (Editor)! For this month, I would like to direct you to Langford Lowfields website where there are the reserve's monthly blogs, discussions, sightings and more. Here is their website: https:// www.rspb.org.uk/reserves-and-events/reserves-a-z/langford-

And guess what? There is even a page dedicated to all of your recent sightings. There is also another page full of close up photographs of different insects, bird species and the view of the reserve.

Here are a just a few things from their website, there are plenty more on there! October's sightings—written by Joe Harris:

Goldeneye numbers are starting to build up and it'll be interesting to see

if this winter we break the Langford goldeneye WeBS record of 21 birds, which was set last year. The starling mumuration is starting to build up, with over 1000 birds now present each evening, in the past we've had up to 40000 at Langford, sky-dancing at dusk, what will this winter bring? In terms of other wildlife, roe deer are being seen regularly and a recent fish survey yielded good numbers of eels, which are critically endangered and which are presumably coming onto site through the fish-friendly sluice that connects us to the river. This is brilliant news and hopefully the slithery beasts will be very happy in the reedbed. Birds of note seen over the past few days include yellow-browed warbler (last heard and seen on 17th

October), rock pipit, bittern, fieldfare, pink-footed geese (flying over), stonechat, peregrine, golden plover, yellow-legged gull, kingfisher, greenshank, chiffchaff and marsh

harrier.

Give their website a try! Oh and let me know what you think of it. I hope you like it just as much as I do.





CEDRIC TALKS HEDGEHOGS











Hello there!

Remember me - Cedric, the intelligent debonair black and white cat who lives on Gainsborough Road? I wrote an article a few months ago. At that time my friend Bertie the hedgehog had told me of his anxieties at the dwindling number of playmates for him, partly due to their one sided battles with cars.

Well, one moonlit night last week as I patrolled the silent hedgerows of Winthorpe, Bertie called to me. It seems his little friends, the local rabbits, were very soon to be evicted from their burrows around the play park because their compulsive digging was undermining the play area and brick walls. Bertie wondered if I could help. I did point out to Bertie that I, as a member of the feline community, was perhaps not the best mammal to ask. I explained to Bertie that whereas he looked at a rabbit and saw a fluffy playmate, I looked and saw my dinner!

I was just thinking of going home to my snug bed when I heard the unmistakable sound of Bertie on his rounds. Like all hedgehogs he is very noisy as he trundles through the undergrowth looking for juicy worms or snails.

"Thank goodness I've found you" he called. "Terrible news". "My little brother, Arthur, had found himself a lovely pile of leaves and twigs to dig into and make himself a home - somewhere to hibernate and sleep the winter away. Just as he was putting the finishing touches to it, a human came along and set fire to it! Arthur had a lucky escape, but his new home is now just a pile of ash. What's to be done about the humans they evict the rabbits and they burn hedgehog's homes down."















"Now, now, Bertie." I said. Then I tried to explain to him that if the rabbits are smart, they'll simply move on to another grassy bank somewhere close by. It's no good trying to stand up to humans - they will almost always get their way. As for little Arthur's des-res. Well it's a great shame. The human would not have intended to burn his home down the trouble is they don't always think. Not about each other, not about the local wildlife and not about the planet. I told Bertie that I would do my best to publicise the hedgehog's plight, so please humans, when you are tidying up the garden ready for winter, give a thought to hedgehogs looking for a place to hibernate. Please check for any signs of hedgehogs in piles of garden rubbish before burning it. Please be especially careful when strimming. Consider making or buying a hedgehog house. My little hedgehog friends are getting less and less in number. The helping hand of a ready made home for them, with dry leaves or hay inside, the whole thing pushed into the undergrowth out of sight and sheltered from the elements, would be a treat for them just as spending the winter months in Spain is for you humans.

Bertie, by the way, already has his winter quarters arranged, but I am sworn to secrecy not to tell anyone where it is! See you around, but I bet you don't see me!




















ALL SAINTS
