





The First Front Cover. Dec. 1980 - Nov. 1985.





The Second Front Cover Dec. 1985 - Dec. 2000.




The Present Front Cover. Sept. 2020 -

WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL







On Thursday 19th November 2020, the Parish Council, again, held its monthly Parish Council meeting remotely meeting using the power of "Zoom".

The Council also discussed proposals put forward by the Cricket Club to fence the cricket ground to prevent public access to the field brought about by the failure of some dog walkers who fail to clear up any mess left by their dogs.

The Council had sympathy with the Cricket Clubs request but having examined the 2006 lease between the Cricket Club and the Parish Council, the Council took the view that the field should remain open to access for all villagers (as stipulated in the lease).

However, the Parish Council were of the view that all dogs should be on a lead when on the cricket club outfield.

The Cricket Club reported a "break in" to the pavilion and have requested permission to install an alarm and possibly security lights around the pavilion. The Council had no objection in principle but requested further details.

The Council have taken on the responsibility for storing the hard copies of the village scrap book. This has been looked after by Pat Finn for many years and the Council would like to thank Pat for his many years of hard work in keeping the books up to date.

The contents of the scrap books can be viewed "on line" via the village website and I recommend that you have a look as it gives a detailed history of all aspects of the village.

The Council also discussed the Neighbourhood Plan for the village. The Council is looking to hold a meeting for all villagers to get their views on how we want the village to look going forward. Unfortunately, this is on hold until Covid 19 restrictions are lifted.

DECEMBER'S RECIPE: - CHRISTMAS -



SAUSAGE MEAT STUFFING:


(makes a change from pigs in blankets)

TAKE THE POOH IN THE POST TEST

In March, this year, I was diagnosed with bowel cancer. Because I was asymptomatic I had displayed none of the usual symptoms that would have prompted me to see my GP. If it was not for the Bowel Cancer Screening (BCS) that comes through the post every two years, I may have been none the wiser. For me and many others the BCS is literally a life saver. I have just been told by the Consultant surgeon that following treatment my cancer has been reduced to such an extent that I no longer need to undergo surgery. As you may imagine this has been an incredible relief to my wife and I.

NHS bowel cancer screening is only offered to people 55 or over, as this is when you are more likely to get bowel cancer:

- If you are 55 you will automatically be invited for a one off bowel scope screening test, if it is available in your area
- If you are 60 to 74, you will automatically be invited to do a home testing kit every two years
- If you are 75 or over, you can ask for a home testing kit every two years by calling the free bowel cancer screening helpline on 0800 707 60 60
- If you are too young for screening but are concerned about a family history of bowel cancer, speak to your GP for advice.
- Always see your GP if you have symptoms of bowel cancer at any age do not wait for a screening test. For information regarding the symptoms of bowel cancer go to

RSPB Langford Lowfields

- December News 2020





It's been a busy month at Langford Lowfields with some great bird sightings and loads of work by our brilliant volunteers. One of the highlights of the early winter period at Langford is always the starling murmurations. This year they have not disappointed with a maximum count of around 20000 and some wonderful shapes being thrown by them in the skies over the reedbeds. They are still around in small

numbers as I write this on the 16th November, but may not be around for too much longer.

Other bird highlights in the last month have included two marsh harriers – a juvenile and a female, peregrine, great white egrets still on site, pintail, curlew, dunlin, grey wagtail, water and rock pipit, red kite, Mediterranean gull, Caspian gull and stonechat. The wild bird seed crop opposite the car park is looking brilliant, with a huge amount of seed available for birds to feed on. So far it has attracted a number of species including chaffinch, reed bunting, lesser redpoll, brambling and tree sparrow. We are particularly pleased with the tree sparrow sightings as these are our first tree sparrows on site for a number of years.

Our volunteers have been busy in the last month removing willow from the reedbeds. We need to do this every autumn as if we didn't, the willow would take over and we would eventually lose our reedbed habitat that is vital for a range of wetland wildlife. We have also been cutting back the

paths on the Cromwell Trail to make access easier along the stretch from the Beach Hut to the boardwalk and opening up the view from the bench on the public footpath overlooking the visitor trails.

On top of all this, the occupying forces insist on taking a census and in a cruel twist, they don't just call at your door with a form to fill in, but make every man travel back to his ancestral town. The girl's fiancé had to travel about eighty miles, leaving his business behind.

Maybe her parents thought this was too good an opportunity to miss, he could take their daughter with him and she'd be out of sight of prying eyes, and then when she returned home with a baby in her arms, she'd return as part of a new family and no one would question who the father was.

Even though life is different for us now and our expectations around childbirth and family life are not the same all that might not be so hard for us to imagine.

However, try imagining that the girl and her fiancé decide that it's too inconvenient to have a baby far from home and family, so they agree that it just

won't be born. After all, a woman needs to have her mother, friends and relatives about her. She needs to be in familiar surroundings with comfort and warmth. Everything needs to be in place for the baby and they both need time to recover from the birth.

This young woman has none of these things, so can you imagine that she just decides to postpone the birth until a more convenient time? Nonsense, you should cry, that's impossible, once a baby is conceived that baby will be born sooner or later and sometimes it's far too soon, but the birth cannot be cancelled.
















DECEMBER REFLECTIONS CONTINUED


















CHRISTMAS AT ALL SAINTS


