



The items most needed this month are: tinned or microwavable sponge puddings, tinned cold meat, deodorant and shampoo, hand wash, soap bars and washing up liquid.


Also, always needed, are:

SPEED WATCH:

As a Parish Council we have been aware for some time that there are a minority of road users driving in the village who abuse the 30mph speed limit along the Gainsborough Road.

This is disturbing for people walking along the road and potentially dangerous, as well as being unlawful, so we are taking action to deter those who speed in the village.

You may have noticed on a few occasions earlier in June volunteers using an official speed monitoring device to measure the speed of vehicles travelling into and out of the village.

For those who are clearly exceeding the 30mph speed limit, we have been recording vehicle details and passing these to the police, which results in a formal letter being sent to the registered keeper. Repetitive instances of exceeding the speed limit may lead to more formal action by the police.

We have found that the vast majority of people appreciate the steps that we are taking to make Winthorpe safer for all, and this letter is intended to clarify the steps we are taking and the motive behind the initiative.

We will be repeating the exercise throughout the year, being intentionally open and visible, and we would be delighted to have a zero score of vehicles driving too fast in the village.

Thank you for your support in this matter and we look forward to your waves and thumbs up as you drive past us at a sensible speed in the future.

DOG WALKING ACROSS THE CRICKET FIELD:

Dear all,

We are working to make sure that the village facilities can be enjoyed by all safely, including the area for walking around the cricket ground.

You may have seen the "keep dogs on a lead" signs positioned around the cricket pitch. These have been erected by the Cricket Club, with the support of the Parish Council, to advise people that dogs should not be allowed to run freely within the cricket field area.

The intention is to avoid unwelcome fouling of the area which is a health and safety hazard for all.

This step was taken as a reasonable balance to suit everyone, but does require buy-in from residents and visitors to the village for it to work without requiring more formal measures of deterrent.

If you are a dog walker you will no doubt appreciate the beautiful spaces we have in and around the village and will enjoy making use of them.

Please make sure that you pick up any dog mess and use the dog bins provided at various locations so that everyone can enjoy our village spaces safely.

We want everyone to be able to enjoy village life, including the cricket facilities that have been a feature of Winthorpe for over 100 years.

JULY'S RECIPE -BRING ON SUMMER-



Thank you Jane for sending in this month's recipe!

"This super-easy, all-in-one cake only takes a few minutes to mix up and get in the oven and is a deliciously tangy and tasty treat. I have also made a lemon version, which works equally well." - Jane C





Ingredients: FOR THE CAKE

200g self-raising flour 1 tsp baking powder 3 large eggs 200g unsalted butter, softened 200g golden caster sugar 2 tbsp whole milk Grated zest of 1 large unwaxed orange 2 tsp Sicilian orange extract 12 mini orange jelly slices, to decorate

FOR THE FILLING

280g full-fat cream cheese 50g unsalted butter 500g icing sugar, sifted Grated zest of 1 large unwaxed orange

YOU WILL NEED

2 x 20cm round cake tins, greased, then base-lined with baking paper Piping bag fitted with a 1cm round nozzle

FRESH ORANGE CAKE

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas mark 4. Sift the flour and baking powder together into a large bowl. Add the eggs, butter, sugar, milk, orange zest and orange extract and beat everything together until the mixture is smooth.
- 2. Spoon half the sponge mixture into each prepared tin and level the surface with a palette knife. Bake for 30-35 minutes, or until the cakes are firm to the touch and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.
- 3. Remove from the oven and leave the cakes to cool in the tins for 5 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack and peel off the paper. Leave to cool completely.
- 4. Meanwhile, make the filling. Beat the cream cheese and butter together in a bowl until just incorporated, then beat in the icing sugar and orange zest until thick and smooth.
- 5. Use ½ the filling mixture to sandwich the two sponges together, then spread 1/4 of the remaining filling over the top. Spoon the remaining 1/4 into a piping bag fitted with a 1cm round nozzle and pipe 12 evenly spaced blobs around the edge of the cake. Top each blob with an orange jelly slice.













MORE SECRETS OF **ALL SAINTS' CHURCH**















- One of the three stained-glass windows, on the south side of the Chancel, has the inscription: 'Jesus washed the Disciples feet.' This is telling the story of Jesus washing the feet of the twelve Disciples at the Last Supper. This act may be performed in churches Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday. The window is in memory of Rev. Edward Handley's sister Georgiana.
- Clipped to one of the choir stalls in the Chancel is an 8 foot wooded pole with a brass cross on top. This is called a processional cross and is carried by the crucifer leading the procession.
- The pitch pine seats have several embroidered kneeling cushions. Each cushion has a different cross-stitch pattern. Look underneath to see the name of the cross-stitcher.
- The red Devonshire marble top on the Altar has five consecrated crosses engraved into it, one in each corner and one in the centre. These signify the five wounds of Christ made by the three nails, one spear and a crown of thorns.
- On the south wall is a plaque to a long serving Churchwarden which 5 reads:

Sacred to the memory of Robert Hunt Bradley who departed this life January 24th 1954 aged 73 years. Ever a sincere and devout Churchman he acted as Churchwarden at this Church for forty years and was a member of the Church Council from its inception being revered and beloved by all who knew him.

- In 1887 two bells (no's 2 & 3) were added to three from the old church. This was a gift from Joseph Gilstrap Branston and his wife Blanche Marguerite. Joseph Gilstrap's family were maltsters in Newark and lived in The Grange, Winthorpe.
- In the churchyard on the family gravestone of John Edward Walker, his wife Hannah Eliza and their son Ernest, is an additional memorial which reads:

Also. John Edward, son of the above, Sergt 1st Lincs regiment. Killed in Action Oct 4th 1917. Aged 33 years.

John Edward Walker is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial in Belgium.

Sitting on the east window sill in the entrance porch is a welcome plague with the words: 'Enter His wooden Gates with Thanksgiving.' A small brass plaque underneath reads:

'In Loving memory of Hugh Thomas Clarke 1926-1992.





MORE SECRETS OF ALL SAINTS' CHURCH CONTINUED...













- Set into the south wall of the sanctuary is a small lockable steel box with a brass rail and curtain. This box is called an aumbry. It was installed in 1959. Items that could be kept in it would be the reserved sacraments, consecrated hosts of the Eucharist. It is believed to be empty.
- Hanging above the aumbry is a sanctuary light with brass holder and glass fittings, which would have been oil filled. It was electrified in 1978. This lamp is lit when there are consecrated hosts of the Eucharist inside the aumbry.
- During excavations of the old church, steps on which a cannon, that had been brought down from York for use in the Civil War of 1645, and quantities of damaged gunpowder were found. The skeletons of some hundreds of men were also discovered, buried in rows and without any coffins.
- 13 There have been eight patrons for the church. A patron, in this case, is someone who financially supports the church. Roger Pocklington, banker and owner of Winthorpe Hall, Rev. Edward Handley and Keble College, Oxford were all Patrons of All Saints' Church.

The word patron derives from the Latin "patronus," one who gives benefits.

Rev. Edward Handley who had All Saints' Church built using money did not live in the village but lived with his family in Muskham Grange, just outside Newark. His Curate-in-charge was Rev. W.H.

Leader. How things are different today. Now the Rector, Rev. Mandy Cartwright. has a group of 11 churches serving 15 villages.

THINK AGAIN— THE WINTHORPE RESIDENTS' A46 CONSULTATION GROUP

Further progress has been made since the last update. A dedicated village web site is still being investigated which if feasible will allow all information to be available quickly to the village.

We are still pushing Highways England for a meeting to discuss Option 3 and we are hopeful that this will be forthcoming very soon . We have asked our MP and colleagues in Nottinghamshire County Council Highways team for their support with our proposal and we will meet Robert Jenrick before the end of the month to discuss with him further actions.

The Group has responded to the *Newark Advertiser* article on the HE consultation report produced last month, which featured in the newspaper on Thursday 17 June. This specifically highlights the responses in respect to the Winthorpe section of the HE proposals.

Meetings with the village will be set up in the Community Centre to discuss progress with Option 3 and to hear your views once national covid restrictions allow.



On Saturday 19th June we had our first Langford Churchyard community gardening event - thirteen folks arrived with rakes, clippers, spades and strimmers for an afternoon of activity, chatter, communal spirit and homemade cakes.

- July News 2021



The weather seems to have improved from the deluge and cold temperatures we had in May and it finally feels like summer is here. There have been some good bird sightings on site too, with the last of the spring migrants coming through and breeding birds. The last of the passage waders included curlew, black-tailed godwit, little ringed plover and green sandpiper. Our breeding waders include avocet, lapwing and little ringed plover and they have all had chicks on Phase 3 viewable from the perimeter public footpath. 4 pairs of common tern are using the new tern raft installed on silt lagoon 7 and viewable from the viewing platform on the Cromwell Trail. This raft was kindly funded by Nottinghamshire Birdwatchers.

Hobbys have put on a brilliant show over the spring and early summer and can still be seen on site hunting insects in flight. The great white egrets have been showing too on Phase 3 in the last couple of weeks and two common crane dropped in mid-June onto the bund between Phases 2 and 3, enjoyed by birders from the southern boundary path. The bittern has been seen regularly in flight around Phase 1, so keep an eye open when you are on site from the Beach Hut or Cromwell Trail. A purple heron dropped in briefly onto Phase 2 on the 17th June and was seen flying off high to the east. This is only the second ever record of this species at Langford and a little gull was on Phase 3 mid-month, another very scarce bird here. An unseasonable wigeon and teal were also on Phase 3 throughout the month, along with 3 red-crested pochard.

Insect life has been more evident in the last few weeks with the improvement in the weather. Several species of butterfly have been seen including the migrant painted lady and dragonflies and damselflies are on the wing including banded demoiselle and red-eyed damselfly.

The volunteers have been busy as usual with several activities. We are still gradually replacing the old and worn out chicken wire on the boardwalk and now have about a third of the length done. We have also replaced some rotten old gate posts, installed a handrail on the boardwalk where it

crosses deep water and our Monday crew have been busy grass cutting and keeping the site looking good for our visitors.

Whatever July holds, however easy or not this summertime is, let's remember to take care of ourselves and others and to pray for our community. Do remember too, to join in our church services or call in for a quiet, prayerful moment. We are really blessed in Winthorpe, Holme and Langford with beautiful buildings, and they are here for everyone. 




