

A full month of Sixth Form has flied by. So far all of my subjects (Biology, Chemistry and Maths) have been so



As always, the Focal Point is ever so grateful for the time you volunteer to support the local community, so thank





Seasonal Flu Vaccination Campaign 2021

We will be holding 2 Saturday morning flu clinics on

Saturday 18 September 2021, from 8.00 am - 12.30 pm Saturday 23 October 2021, from 8.00 am - 12.30 pm

We are aiming to vaccinate 100% of eligible patients this year, as defined by NHS guidelines. We may be able to open our offer beyond those eligible after 31 October 2021 (dependent on stocks/uptake).

Saturday clinics will focus on patients who are able to walk and stand unaided for up to 20 minutes. No seating available. Flu Vaccinations (and possibly 3rd COVID vaccine once details are confirmed) will be administered with patients stood up and a strict one-way system through the Practice will be in operation. We will continue to wear face coverings to protect your healthcare setting.

For patients with mobility issues we will be holding weekday flu clinics. Our PCAs will triage at the time of booking.

Housebound patients will be contacted by the practice in due course.

These are appointment only clinics. Appointments will be available to book from 1 September 2021. Please contact the number below, book online or ask at Reception.

THINK AGAIN— THE WINTHORPE RESIDENTS' **A46 CONSULTATION GROUP**

Two meetings were held with the village during September to discuss progress and provide further information on the Option 3 proposal. These were really well attended and gave good opportunity for discussion and questions. National Highways (formerly known as Highways England) have not responded specifically to Option 3 however they have said in a communication on the 15 September:

There are a number of steps we need to go through before we can announce a preferred route, and we're continuing to work through these steps, along with the Department for Transport and the Government. We'll provide updates to stakeholders and on our project webpage at www.highwaysengland.co.uk/a46-newark-bypass in due course - we expect to be able to do so later this year or early next year.

While we're not yet able to start the next stage of work or confirm the route we'll be taking forward, we're continuing to prepare for the next stage and will be carrying out further survey work this autumn and winter to collect more information about current conditions along the A46 route.

We understand that once announced a further period of statutory consultation will follow. The Group continues to work on the village's behalf and opportunity will be taken to follow up on dialogue with our MP and local authorities.

We are also working behind the scenes on developing a dedicated Think Again website. This will enable us to have all the Think Again information in one place.

OCTOBER'S RECIPE -HAPPY HALLOWEEN-



Thank you Jane for sending in this month's recipe!

"This Irish fruit loaf was once reserved for high days and holidays, particularly Hallowe'en. As its Irish language name bairín breac (speckled bread) suggests, this tea bread/barmbrack has much in common with the Welsh bara brith; a simple, tasty, moist, yet richly fruited bread that's well suited to a generous topping of butter and is an excellent accompaniment to a pot of tea." - Jane C



Makes 900g loaf tin, greased and lined with baking paper

Ingredients:

300ml strong black tea (if using fruit tea, leave the teabag in) 200g sultanas 200g raisins 50g mixed peel 225g self-raising flour ½ tsp mixed spice ¼ tsp ground cinnamon ¼ tsp ground nutmeg ½ tsp salt 175g light muscovado sugar

IRISH HALLOWE'EN TEA BREAD

Put all the dried fruit into a bowl and pour the tea over. Cover and leave it to soak and plump up overnight.

Heat the oven to 160°C/140°C fan/gas mark 3. Put the flour with all the spices and the large in a large mixing bowl and stir well to combine. Add the sugar and stir again, making sure you break up any lumps in the sugar.

Add the soaked fruit and any remaining soaking liquid to the dry mixture, then add the beaten egg and stir until all the ingredients are thoroughly combined.

Tip the mixture into the prepared tin, smooth the surface and bake for 1–1¼ hours, until the loaf is risen and golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.

Remove from the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes. Then, remove from the tin and place on a wire rack to cool completely. Serve in slices, spread with butter.

Tip:

Use whatever mix of dried fruit and nuts you prefer I sometimes substitute some of the tea with Irish whiskey....sláinte


PPG & CMC UPDATE

Then take the drowsy Mexican He's sleeping in the sun But wearing his sombrero To show us how it's done











WINTHORPE GARDEN CLUB









Winthorpe Garden Club met on September 15th at the Community Centre – the inaugural meeting following lockdown and Covid restrictions. The Club meets every third Wednesday of the month, with an annual membership fee of £12.

This month's speaker was Dr Andrew Ward, of Norwell Nurseries – the holders of the national collection of hardy chrysanthemums and astrantias. The talk was "The Astounding Asteraceae, of which there are 21,000 species, although they are more familiarly understood as the daisy family. Everything from the common dandelion to sunflowers, asters and cornflowers belong to this family, and some have traditionally been used in medicine, e.g. to boost one's immune system.

The sheer variety of astrantias is most definitely astounding, with some varieties looking much removed from the traditional daisy we all know with unusual shapes and even spikes. Cirsium Mount Etna, for example, was likened to the shape of a shaving brush. Google it and you will see what I mean. Some grow really tall; others are more compact. Some are really hard to grow and require very specific conditions, whilst others will even grow in the pavement cracks.

The varieties showcased to the Club are stocked by Norwell Nurseries, and they have some that are really coming into their own at the moment, such as the rudbeckias. Andrew has much expertise to advise gardeners regarding what will work for your particular space and soil conditions.

The next meeting will take place at 7.30pm on 20th October at the Community Centre. All welcome.

Hello from St Giles Church Holme.

As you may well have discovered, the church is open again most days, so please feel free to pop inside now and again and enjoy the beauty, peace and ancient architecture the place has to offer. We are making a sign to show when it's open and we hope that walkers and visitors to the village will enjoy being able to go inside. Our visitors book already has a number of new entries which show that people have come from far and wide, and an open church is an indication of a welcoming community. However we ask that you please keep an eye on the place when you are passing and report any odd activity to the churchwardens or the police.

Recently we have commissioned aerial pictures and footage at high level of the church. It is very interesting to view the shape of the river and the relative positioning of the church and of course how it would have connected to North Muskham pre 1599. It was at this time that the Trent changed its course and divided the two villages. It has to be remembered that Holme church was originally built as a daughter church to St Wilfred's at Muskham. Using this data we can see some carvings high on the tower and detect structural defects which need attention.

The visit by members of Collingham & District Local History Society on 1st September was attended by some 60 visitors, and about half of them had never been to the church before. Needless to say, they were fascinated by the many outstanding features and the connections with the real people who we can relate to who were the founders of this special building as we know it today. This makes Holme church unique in this part of the county.

Our next service will be at 9am on Sunday 3rd October and on Sunday October 17th it will be the Harvest Festival at 6pm.
