













WINTHORPE WITH LANGFORD PARISH COUNCIL

On Thursday 18th November 2021, the Parish Council held its monthly Parish Council meeting in the village hall.

The Council discussed the ongoing works on the Neighbourhood Plan and villagers will be given the opportunity to consider the plan and add any comments via an on line "Survey Monkey". Further details will be provided in Focal Point and on the village website.

The Council agreed with NSDC that signs should be put up upon entering the Spinney giving house number directions. This will assist emergency services and delivery companies. Whether or not house owners choose to identify their property with a number is entirely up to them but the Parish Council would recommend that they do so.

The Parish Council is to purchase its own "speed gun" following the successful trials in the village. NSDC have given the Council a contribution towards its purchase.

At most Parish Council meetings, planning issues are discussed. So that the residents of Winthorpe and Langford are aware of what is to be discussed, it has been agreed to "pilot" the use of a "Twitter" account and a "Next Door"

app. This will give advanced notification of the planning applications that will be discussed and will give residents the opportunity to attend any meeting or raise any issues that may concern them.

DECEMBER'S RECIPE -CHRISTMAS!!!-



Thank you Jane for sending in this month's recipe!

"What's more traditional than mince pies at Christmas? Well, lots of things, in reality. And not everyone likes mincemeat; my husband, Rob, for one. So how about trying this twist on the festive fare? You never know, these could become a future favourite...." - Jane C



Ingredients: For the pastry:

170g plain or gluten-free flour ½ tsp cinnamon 100g unsalted butter 1 tbsp caster sugar

For the mincemeat:

140g semi-dried apricots finely diced

85g semi-dried figs, finely diced 100g toasted hazelnuts

1 tsp each ground cinnamon, grated nutmeg and mixed spice

1 banana, chopped

3 tbsp brandy

grated zest and juice of 1 orange 50g butter

icing sugar, to serve

WE NEED







APRICOT & HAZELNUT MINCE PIES

To make the pastry, put the flour and cinnamon into the bowl of a food processor. Add the butter and pulse until it looks like very fine breadcrumbs. Sprinkle in the sugar and 3 tbsp cold water and pulse until the mixture starts to clump together; about 30 seconds. Tip the mixture onto a board and gently squeeze the pastry until it comes together into a ball; add water if it feels dry. Wrap the pastry in cling film and chill for 30 minutes.

Heat your oven to gas mark 5, 190°C (170°C fan). Roll the pastry on a lightly floured surface to the thickness of £1 coin. Using a 7cm cutter, cut out 10-12 discs and use to line a 12-hole bun tin. Use a 6cm cutter for the lids, or use a 6cm star cutter to make star shapes. Chill both.

Make the mincemeat - put all the ingredients into a food processor and pulse on and off until evenly chopped. Spoon 1-2 tsp into each tart, dampen the edge of the pastry bottom with water and sit a smaller pastry disc or star on top. Using scissors, snip a hole in the lid, if you've made round tops. Bake for 12-15 minutes until golden brown. Lift onto a wire rack to cool and cover with icing sugar.

WINTHORPE GARDEN CLUB







Neil Timm has a fern nursery in the Lincolnshire Wolds, however, he gave us an illustrated talk on his former occupation as a landscaper and garden designer. His strongly held belief was that to be successful, a good relationship between client and designer was essential. Several outline sketches with different layouts would be presented to and discussed with the client before any decision was made.

For those wishing to take the DIY route he suggested making a skeleton model on A4 paper, photocopying this a number of times before applying different layouts to each sheet. Then, rather than making an immediate decision, put them aside before viewing again in a couple of weeks. With hard landscaping he showed how effective different levels could be and the importance of paths which should always be in proportion to surrounding borders etc. Drama and sense of three dimensions could be given using pergolas, statues or a choice single tree. He always considered it important to create areas for relaxation and socialising. The value of mixing plant types, heights and colours was also touched upon.

It would seem that many people are reluctant to gather indoors due to COVID-19 concerns. We have had much smaller attendances at our last two meetings and it was decided that we would cancel our normal social evening in January and meet again on February 16th, when Patsy Rayner will give a talk entitled "The Role of Nature in Japanese Life".

Can I make another appeal to anyone out there with an interest in gardening to come along to this meeting and see what we are about. You'll find a friendly crowd who don't take themselves too seriously. Treat it as a taster, you never know you might enjoy it.

Finally, may I wish all readers a peaceful and joyful Christmas.

This is, of course, absolutely no defence against a one and a half ton car charging down the road at them.

So, please, please, be on the lookout for them when driving through the village, and if you safely can, slow down and drive around them.

Hedgehogs, like much of our wildlife, are in decline, and really need our help to survive, so please help.

LANGFORD CHURCH & CHURCHYARD NEWS


We are delighted St Bartholomew's church will be opening its doors three times in the week leading up to Christmas, welcoming members of the community to join in the following festive activities:






DECEMBER'S REFLECTIONS



We have planted it in the north east corner of the churchyard and hope that it will soon provide apples that can be used to decorate the church at Harvest Festival. We are going to have a plaque made to record that tree was planted to commemorate the Platinum anniversary of the reign of Her Majesty the Queen. There will be a short ceremony next June to observe this. Patricia Richards of Holme gave the other gift which was approx. 500 mixed daffodil bulbs. A small group of us planted these at the beginning of November and we can now look forward to spring when they will look beautiful in front of the church and wall.
